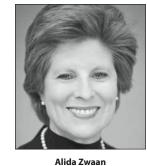
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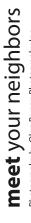

ROB AND AVA Spangler

Hi, neighbors! My name is Rob Spangler and I am really honored that *Inside Singletree* wanted to know about my life and family, so here goes.

I was born in Kenton, Ohio, and grew up on a farm between Kenton and Ada, Ohio. This is about 1 hour northwest of Columbus. The economy was mixed at that time. Probably 50 percent industry and 50 percent agriculture, basically, small town America. My mom's family were big farmers in the area and my dad went into business with my mom's dad, "Grandpa Putnam." We raised corn, soybeans, Hereford beef cattle and sheep when I was little but then transitioned to dairy cattle and hogs when I

The Putnam family goes way back to the founding of this country, coming over from England in 1630 and settling in the Boston area, namely Salem. Oh yes, my family was involved in the "Witch hysteria and trials" although my grandfather John Putnam fought against this travesty in our history. He spoke out vehemently against these trials. He kept a sword at his side at all times and a saddled horse in the barn for a fast getaway. His half-brother, Thomas, was the problem. His daughter, Ann, started the witch hysteria by faking seizures and implicating their slave as a witch. You probably



know the story from there. The family home still stands and is part of the Danvers Historical Society.

Another grandfather, John's grandson, was General Israel Putnam who commanded the Connecticut Militia serving directly under General Washington. He was a tough old coot and also fought in the French and Indian War. You may remember a quote from your history books regarding the Battle of Bunker Hill. "Don't fire until you see the whites of their eyes." That was my grandpa, Israel. Funny coincidence, I was at the bar in the Ritz Carlton on Massachusetts Avenue, in Washington D.C. one evening and was admiring an old oil painting of a Revolutionary War officer. I asked the bartender about the painting, turned out it was of my grandpa, Israel. So, after the War, Israel got involved with The Ohio Company, which opened up the Northwest Territory of our young country. The Putnam Family Museum is in Marietta, Ohio, and the family is known for being the founders of Ohio.

In the '60s my father and a friend, Bill Watson, took up skiing at a small "resort" Mad River Mountain about 30 minutes from our home. You may know Don Watson, an entertainer here in the Valley, who is Bill's son. My Dad was hooked and got the whole family started with this sport. I remember struggling to get leather lace up ski boots tight enough and trying to maneuver the







long wooden skis with Cubco bindings, which weren't step and had leather Arlberg straps. Also hanging on to the rope tow was a real pain and my mom helped me master that. But, skiing was fun and I was hooked, too.

We also had a home on Higgins Lake in northern Michigan so a few times in the winter we would ski Boyne Mountain and Boyne Highlands. My parents took a couple trips to Aspen each winter to experience real skiing and to have some fun. They never took my sister or me which really disappointed us. The first time I skied out west was a six-week break between quarters when I was attending The Ohio State University. My step-sister, Tammy, and I headed out to Aspen and stayed at what is now the Hotel Aspen. Oh, my God ... I was in heaven! Skiing on actual snow with absolutely no ice. Long runs, real mountains, good skiers, clean air, blue skies and great attitudes.

So fast forward 15 years. After stints in Vail, Tampa, Columbus and Washington D.C., my then spouse and I were looking at homes in McClean and Langley, Virginia. We were both self-employed and could live anywhere so we had a discussion about moving out to the Rockies in Colorado. Aspen was too far from a city and their airport was not reliable. Having lived in Vail after college, we took a look at the Vail Valley and settled on looking for a home here. After several house-hunting trips, our realtor found my current home, which was under construction and we closed the last day of 1996.

Both of our children were born in Vail. Coco is 19 and currently enrolled at Grand Canyon University in Phoenix. Ava is 15 and attends Vail Christian High School. Both girls were participants in the Vail DEVO Ski School Program and had great success racing in the YSL program around the state. They are both fantastic and beautiful skiers. Cliff jumping was an event I held my breath on, as both girls and their friends were fond of that excitement. Papa is very proud of helping them reach their skill level in a life

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sport they can continue and enjoy for the rest of their lives and that we can participate in as a family together.

Ava currently lives with me pretty much full time. She enjoys school and is gifted athletically in most sports she participates in. You will see her dominating the volleyball court in club volleyball and at Vail Christian High School. She is a setter, outside hitter and right side hitter but can play any position well. She is also a sprinter on the track team running the 100 and 200, plus relays and the long jump. We are looking for big things in the coming years and hoping for a possible scholarship to college in any of these sports.

I have done several things for work in my professional life. I sold insurance as a first job with Northwestern Mutual, I then moved on to selling commercial time in broadcasting in the Tampa, Columbus and Washington D.C. markets. My station was sold in Washington D.C. While there

I had been designing promotions for nationally branded products and chain retailers. I spoke with those clients and let them know I was starting my own company and asked them to come on board. Capital City Marketing was born as an advertising and promotion agency.

After several years designing and fulfilling promotions for clients, I decided to develop our own line of products and sell them via a major bank's Visa and MasterCard monthly statement. We advertised the products on the return envelope and the order form could be torn off and sent in with the customers check to pay their bill. The banks would send the order forms to us to process and fulfill. I have to say, the business boomed and allowed us to buy the house and move our life here.

I sold Capital City Marketing to my stock supplier in 2002. I needed something to do, so I consulted with my father who owned a prison telephone company in the Southeastern U.S. and I started Telewest. I marketed and built Telewest's business in the western states. We provide inmate calling service in county jails and prisons working with state agencies and county sheriff's offices. It's quite a bit different than my previous company but business is business and we are in our 15th year of operations.

As you can see by the front cover of the magazine, I fly the American and rainbow flag above my home in support and pride for our country and for the LGBT community. With this issue, Inside Singletree wanted to focus on the different types of families that make up our diverse community. I am a gay man heading up and supporting my family, just like any other father. Our families are just like yours and love and respect are the primary factors in all of our families. I hope you got to know a little bit about Ava and me. Best wishes to you all.

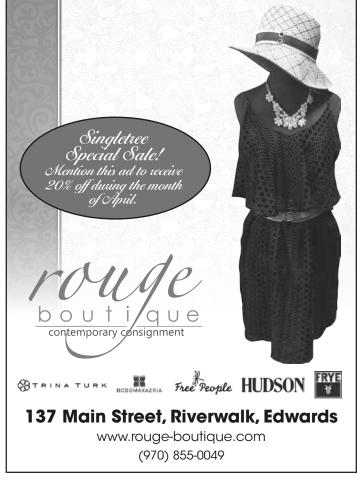

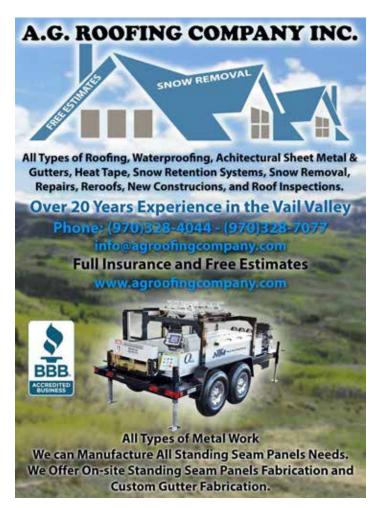

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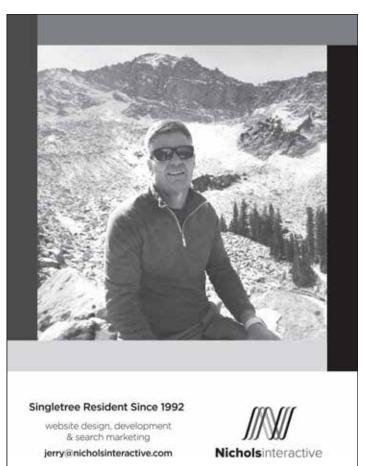

In her research phase, Hannah learned that rats are smart, they can be taught to do tricks and they are very affectionate and sociable. She shares that "Frappie likes everyone we meet." They are easy to care for, they are litter box trained and they clean themselves. Hannah initially thought she wanted a brown rat, but upon landing on the name Frappuccino, her focus shifted to a lighter colored rat.

A Life Beyond Fine:

My Journey Toward Freedom And Vitality

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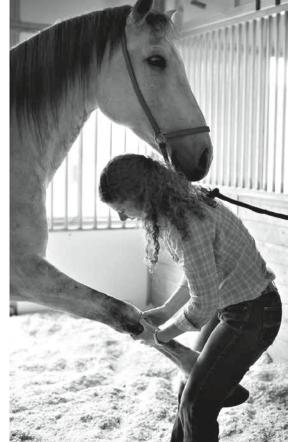

Dr. Elizabeth Dooher Brings Greater Meaning To I C.A.R.E.

What are integrative therapies and how do they complement more traditional western veterinary medicine? Sometimes known as alternative treatments or holistic care, these therapies include chiropractic, acupuncture, rehabilitation, massage therapy, laser therapy and herbal medicine.

Dr. Elizabeth Dooher, veterinarian at Integrative C.A.R.E., prefers the term integrative. This facet of veterinary medicine is not an alternative to western medicine but rather an integral part of maintaining the health and athletic performance of animals. Combining the best of all worlds gives animals the greatest opportunity to live long, active lives.

Elizabeth works with canine athletes to help them achieve peak physical condition. She also enjoys helping aging dogs maintain their quality of life. As dogs age, they can develop lamenesses due to arthritis and nerve degeneration. They can also experience decreased energy, changes in appetite and even dementia. These changes can significantly inhibit their ability to enjoy our

active mountain lifestyle. It is most rewarding when owners report improved comfort and renewed vigor in their dog friends with the help of these therapies.

Horses are also recipients of integrative care. Working with owners and primary care veterinarians, Dr. Dooher takes a team approach to identify and treat subtle movement asymmetries in performance horses. Back pain in horses is a common problem that is often successfully treated with integrative therapies. Like all athletes, equine athletes suffer from occasional injuries. Custom equine rehabilitation plans can improve the quality of injury outcomes and hasten a return to athletic performance.

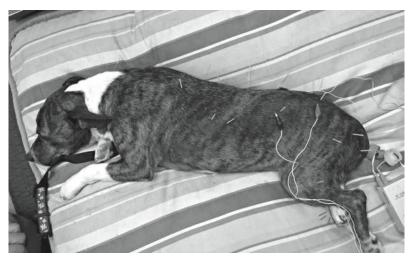

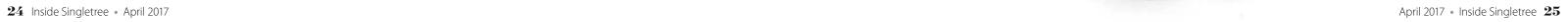

Here, their daughter, Lindy, recalls with fond memories what made this house a special home for Lorian and Jesse, their seven children and 34 grandchildren.

When asked what makes the house unique, Lindy replies, "the location for sure. It sits on an amazing lot, overlooking all of

Singletree, with 365-degree views of the Valley below. Also unique is the décor which is all red, black & white." According to Lindy, her parents wanted something very different from their very traditional home in Golden. They wanted the Vail house to be modern and it certainly was! As Lindy describes it, "Mother always had decorators." The color scheme was unique and exciting, fresh and distinct. The Carraways wanted the house to mimic Vail's fun, ski town character.

Lindy goes on to share other unique aspects of the home, including the private quarters of a double master bathroom with a walkthrough shower connecting the two. "My parents loved their private quarters and had that set-up in all of their homes. And, *a hot tub* downstairs in the family room, for the kids, of course! All in all a fun and family friendly home!"

The kitchen, of course, is the favorite room in the house. "It's always the kitchen, that's where the family always gathers, it was Mother's favorite." And most special to Jesse was his collection of art, over 100 paintings, illustrations and photographs of barns, which grew from a fascination with the red barn atop Lookout Mountain in Golden, right next to the family church. Lindy remarks, "He just loved that barn."

The Vail house provided Lindy's parents with a ton of pleasure in the summer. Although they skied and loved to take everyone snowmobiling in the winter, they weren't avid skiers themselves. Christmas Eve was always very special in the home but it was the summers that truly stood out, largely due to the fact that the home was used to host the famous Carraway Clan Classic.

An annual family tradition for over 25 years in Singletree, Lorian and Jesse sponsored the annual trip, making it feasible for everyone to be there, no matter what. Lorian loved to golf and she loved her family, to the degree that, "in fact, every kid in the





family got their first set of golf clubs from mother ... and there are 34 grandkids."

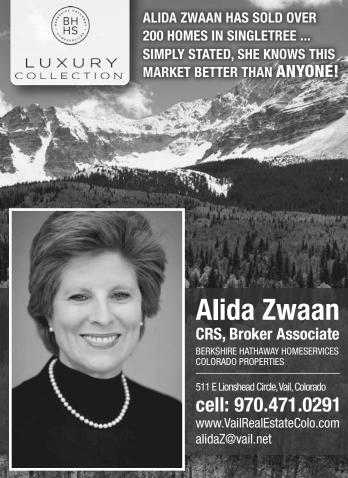
Lindy recalls, "Initially I didn't play, so they made me the babysitter. I decided then that I'd better start. And, now it's my boys, who were babies when the tournament started, that are the best golfers in the family! Mother influenced all of us tremendously."

The weekend would start with a pizza party on Friday night. There were anywhere from 20-28 golfers. Time to pick your teams and the competition was always fierce. On Saturday morning, everyone would arrive at the Singletree Club, and then we were off! The first round was drafted, it was serious. The second round was more fun, you could play with whomever you wanted and after all, the Carraway Clan Classic was, still more than anything, a family reunion. Afterward, all the spouses and little ones would join the golfers for a huge awards night and celebration dinner, catered by Fiesta's.

Jesse and Lorian held over 25 annual golf tournaments in Singletree and although they are no longer living, it's a ritual the family will always enjoy. Lindy appreciates, "This was Mom and Dad's gift to the family. It was quite an event and a tradition that will continue forever."

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who's making a difference

"B"-ing The Difference In Singletree: The Merritt Family's Dedication To Their Son





"Singletree is such a great community. I love living here," states Debbie Merritt during our interview. "And I want the people of Singletree to know that it's so special here because people with disabilities and handicaps are accepted." Her blonde curls frame a face full of passionate determination and shining eyes and I know in that moment that I am in the presence of a mother who has loved and lost a precious child. The loss of Brandon prompted Debbie, Ralphie and their daughters, Jessica and Stephanie, to found *B The Difference*, The Brandon Merritt Charitable Foundation in 2011. The Merritts are on a mission to preserve their son Brandon's memory and gift a gentle reprieve to other families and their loved ones suffering from Neurofibromatosis.

Making their home in Singletree was no accident: Brandon Merritt was happiest here in the Vail Valley during his 22 years



that he enjoyed life. "Brandon loved being here because no one treated him differently," recalls Debbie. "He got the same opportunities as other people. His bosses would make accommodations for him, for his needs. They would work with him so that he became successful at what he did." He worked as a Guest Service Red Jacket at Beaver Creek during the ski season, and at The Cordillera Valley Club and later the Sonnenalp Golf Club in the summers.

Brandon loved taking time in his daily routine to literally stop and reflect on these surroundings we take for granted. One of Brandon's friends, Lindsay, recalls these moments with Brandon. "Often when we were skiing we would say Brandon, hey what are you doing, c'mon! And he would say, 'I'm just enjoying the view.'...I never knew anything was wrong with him, I just knew that he appreciated life and the things he was doing."

Brandon's slow and easygoing attitude is memorialized as the logo for *B The Difference* in the form of his favorite animal, the turtle. "Just like our logo, he had a tough outer shell," says Debbie. "We have his whole turtle collection: hundreds." After Brandon passed away in February 2010, a childhood friend named Alex visited and was given one of Brandon's turtles. A few years later when Alex was married, his best man held that stuffed turtle during the ceremony as a symbol honoring Brandon's place at that momentous occasion.

Neurofibromatosis, or NF (pronounced neuro-fibroma-tosis), is a term for three distinct medical disorders: NF1, NF2, and Schwannomatosis. NF causes tumors to grow on nerves throughout the body and can lead to blindness, bone abnormalities, dermal, brain and spinal tumors, deafness, disfigurement, learning disabilities and excruciating and disabling pain.

Neurofibromatosis affects 1 in every 3,000 births in the United States. "It's so prevalent but no one has ever heard of it because no one famous has had NF," states Debbie. "Brandon was diagnosed as a baby. But what I've learned since we started the Foundation was that he had it so much easier than so many others." Tumors can be anywhere there is a nerve ending, but Brandon's were located along his spinal column and his brain. "He had tumors on his C1 & C2 that were removed in one surgery and he was able to walk, drive and snowboard. We caught it in time. But then he had a tumor in his brain. When they opened him up, they couldn't remove it." His sisters, Jessica and Stephanie, were living with him here in Colorado and just knew that they had to get involved in spreading the word and creating funding for the fight against NF for other families like their own.

The Brandon Merritt Charitable Foundation fundraises in support of the fight against Neurofibromatosis in a very unique way. The Children's Tumor Foundation[1], the world's largest non-government organization dedicated to finding effective treatments for the millions of people worldwide living with NF. B The Difference wants to help make the lives of those living with this disease enriched beyond raising funds for research. In Florida, where they hold the annual Cheers To B! fundraising event, the Merritts knew that they wanted Brandon's legacy to extend to lifestyle. "When we first formed the foundation, we didn't know which way it was going to go," recalls Debbie. "But it was formed, and we truly make a huge difference in the lives of sufferers."

B Happy was established as part of B the Difference in 2013 with the goal to provide all-inclusive trips throughout the year to Florida or Colorado for selected NF recipients and their families, similar to the Make-A-Wish Foundation. The B the Difference Board works with highly regarded NF doctors to select NF patients to be considered for this opportunity. The funds raised for B Happy allows participants the chance to escape hospital beds, routine tests, MRIs, chemotherapy and more: The goal is to forget their everyday worries while embarking on a journey they will never forget.

During Brandon's battle with NF, the Merritts learned that simple diversions go a very long way as they provide anticipation, participation and memories that last a lifetime. "I realized that we had to do for others what we did for Brandon, to make their lives special, too," states Debbie. For Brandon's 21st Birthday the family was able to get him tickets to a Boston Red Sox game at Fenway Park, and Brandon was a huge Red Sox fan. Debbie remembers the joy in Brandon at that time. The Merritts saw the value in that experi-





ence and added the B Happy program as an active and quantifiable representation of where the donations make a difference. "I knew that we had to spread Brandon's love of Beaver Creek, Colorado and the surrounding valley since it has so much to offer that we would like to share with others," states Debbie.

Since every trip is fully paid for by the foundation, they rely on local sponsors and partners to create the perfect experience, which is one reason the foundation sticks with sending NF patients and their families to Colorado and Florida. "We have a strong network of partners and sponsors who make this possible, in addition to donations. We are about to launch volunteer opportunities!" reminds Debbie. To ensure that the experience is as perfect as possible, the foundation sends a host with each family who is with them from the moment they come out of the airport to the time they get back on the plane.

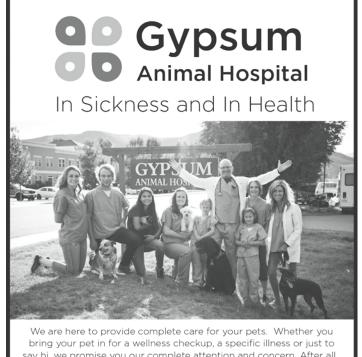
In a way that no other foundation does for Neurofibromatosis, B The Difference creates an escape from the horror of living with NF through *B Happy*. Families really appreciate being away from doctors and appointments for a whole week of their lives. Debbie smiles as she recalls what good they have done so far. "The patients reflect on those trips when times are hard, during surgery or recovery. We can, and do, make a difference one family at a time. He was our gift for 22 years, and this is our home. And it all started because this community welcomed Brandon."

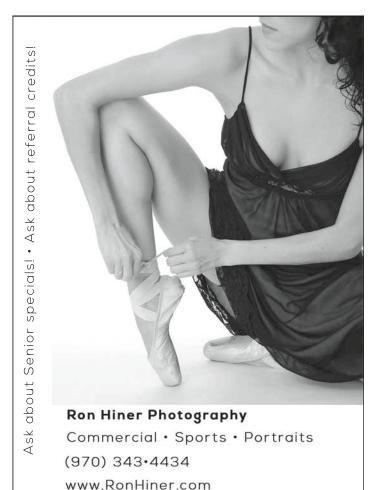


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FITNESS CLASSES AT COMMUNITY CENTER

Ainsley Proffit Has The Taste For Speed

Name: Ainsley Proffit

How long have you been skiing for and when did you first start? I have been skiing since I was two. The first time I went skiing was during a family vacation at Crystal Mountain, Michigan.



When did you decide you wanted to race? When I was seven years old, all I wanted to do was ski fast. While vacationing at Keystone, I saw a Nastar course. I begged my parents to let me go race it. I raced down the course and ended up scoring gold. Once I felt the taste of the speed and the rush of excitement while racing down that little Nastar course, I knew ski racing was the sport for me.

What compels or inspires you to continue racing? I race to feel the rush of emotions. The excitement, the joy and most of all the fear hook me into ski racing to see how far I can push my limits.

What kind of time commitment does your skiing require? For me, ski racing is year-round. I usually get about two months off a year, May and August. I train six days a week.

What competitive ski racing events have you participated in? Last season I competed in U16 Nationals at Snowbird, UT. I finished third overall. Just last week, I competed in a children's FIS race called Pokal Loka in Kranskja Gora, Slovenia. There, the top three athletes from 30 different nations all raced against each other and I was lucky enough to be one of them. I came to the race hungry. I knew this was a great opportunity to assess my skiing to find out if I am on the right track to racing the World Cup. I finished twelfth in the GS and fourth in the SL out of a field of 80 girls. It was good skiing but I still have a long way to go if I want to make it onto the World Cup.

What are your best results? The day after I got back from Europe, I competed in a four-day race series that held the stakes of who qualified for Junior Championships. I finished three out of the four days of racing, finishing first and second in GS and third in SL. These finishes qualified me first overall for Junior Champs.

What is your favorite moment in skiing? My favorite part of skiing is a powder day solely reserved to just shredding up a mountain full of untouched powder. I don't think anyone could top that.

What is the most challenging aspect of ski racing for you? I believe the hardest thing to do in this sport is to make a perfect run. I most often find myself having an incredible run but then I will make one or two mistakes that slow me down. Right now I am working on finding my limits. Often when I make a mistake, it is because I pushed my limits a bit too far.

Who do you idolize in this sport? I really look up to Lindsey Vonn and Aksel Lund Svindal the most. Both of them are so dominant in this sport and overcome so many challenges. I admire their passion and determination to always keep racing no matter what might come their way.

What have you learned from ski racing? Ski racing has given me the opportunity to explore the world.

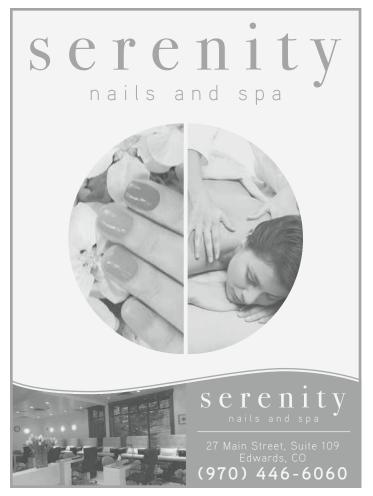
What are your racing ambitions? My ambition in ski racing is to compete in the Winter Olympics.
