


## **meet** your neighbors Patric, Shelly, Alex, And Madi Raichart

Shelly and Patric moved across the country after graduating in 1993, to Stony Brook, NY, where



### athlete spotlight







Fresh off his Monday morning training session on Meadow Mountain, Marlin Smickley enthusiastically shares his philosophy on life: "You get out of life what you put into it," he says. Marlin takes these words to heart. "I believe in karma.... You get up every day, and you work hard." As a tremendously affable 77-year-old, (78 by the time this publication is delivered), Marlin enjoys near celebrity status in his neighborhood as everyone recognizes his full head of white hair, engaging smile, and super fit physique.

Marlin grew up in eastern Pennsylvania close to the Poconos and the Appalachian Trail where he spent a lot of time hiking. He graduated from high school and enlisted in the United States Army where he was a cryptographer for three years. Upon returning from the service, he applied his skills during a brief stint with the CIA, but soon determined that was not the right fit for him. As a result, he earned a teaching degree at East Straudsburg University and subsequently embarked on 33-year career in education, teaching 4th and 5th grades in public school.

After what was a very fulfilling teaching career in his home state, he accepted an invitation to visit a friend in Colorado. Having never experienced the Rocky Mountains, Marlin spent a month car camping in Colorado, Idaho, Wyoming, North Dakota, and South Dakota, and ultimately found his paradise in the Vail Valley.

Marlin discovered his passion for running as a young adult. Running is what brings him close to nature. "I get my energy from nature," he explains. "I just love nature; it is what feeds me." He participates in about 12-14 races each year, mostly 10K's, as well as eight snowshoe competitions during the winter. For the most

part, he participates in events sponsored by the Vail Valley Rec District, an organization for which he actively volunteers as well.

Marlin's training regime includes his 7:30am Monday morning interval sessions and trail runs coached by Ellen Miller, Outdoor Fitness Coach and specialist at the Vail Vitality Center and the only American woman to climb Mt. Everest from both Nepal and Tibet 2 (1 of 5 women in the world). In addition to her climbing achievements, Ellen is extremely knowledgeable on the subject of the aging athlete. "I don't miss my Monday mornings!" declares Marlin.

With the exception of a pulled muscle in his back last summer, Marlin has remained remarkably injury-free. His program includes a little yoga and a lot of stretching. He has adopted the practice of starting slowly and turning it up at the halfway point in his races. In addition to a daily walking routine interspersed with four runs each week, he believes exercise, diet, sleep, social interaction, and purpose are all critical to both physical and mental wellbeing.

Marlin has no plans for retirement and definitively asserts, "I am going to keep going. I have a purpose." He operates a small property management company and cares for approximately 10 to 15 homes at any one time. He goes on to say, "Property management is as much a relationship as it is a business; I am very close to the families. I love them, and they love me." There are no written contracts, and both parties rely solely on the strength of their mutually trustworthy relationship.

The residents of Singletree are fortunate to have Marlin leading hikes on the community trails once a month during the summer. About a two-hour round trip, the outings are primarily social, and Marlin loves the opportunity to share nature with people in his backyard. "Singletree is such a beautiful community," he says with all his heart. "I have been here for about 13 years, and I can feel the forces are coming together... all of a sudden, we are coming together as a community." And Singletree thanks you, Marlin, for your role in making that happen.







The start date for the first day of school is quickly approaching, and it is time to get our children back into school mode. As a family lawyer, I often deal with varying

parenting schedules. I consulted Stacey Horn, LCSW, CCH, who is a local co-parenting coach for children and families. With respect to parenting issues. Stacey offers the following general advice: "When children **know** that parents see them for who they are - as opposed to who we think they are, or who we want them to be - it increases the chances that they will listen to their parents more when their peers are pressuring them to make choices that are against their own values and morals."





Stacey and I offer the following considerations that will help transition your children back to school smoothly, to support their success in starting the new year:

**1. Routines.** During the summer, children often do not have a set routine. Parents can help children transition back to school by discussing and setting routine expectations for the school year prior to the first day of school. For example, consider implementing a set school bedtime at least 1-2 weeks prior to the start of school for your children.

2. Consistency. Children do better in school if they know what to expect – especially if you have a child at ECCA or Edwards Elementary. If children are in two separate households, or if parents have different parenting styles in the same household, maintaining consistency between parents ensures stability for them.


3. Communication. One of the number-one issues that causes psychological problems for children is conflict between parents. Effective communication about the expectations of the children's schedule during school minimizes conflicts and sets children up for success in school.

4. Input from children. Whether you have a second-grader at Stone Creek Charter School or a ninth-grader at Battle Mountain High School, asking for their input on their schedules and activities helps them to engage. Most of us believe that others experience the world as we do, yet many children experience the world differently than their parents, and many children also have different learning styles. Engaging in communication with children at their developmental levels on schedules and routines helps parents address their needs properly.

5. Discuss relevant issues with children. For example, school bullying has become more prevalent in schools, including cyber bullying. Having a discussion with children about what bullying is educates children about when they need to reach out for help. For more information on bullying, visit stopbullying.gov. It is also helpful to discuss expectations surrounding use of technology. There are tools to assist parents in tracking the technology use of their children, such as the MamaBear app.

6. Community organizations. There are many community organizations throughout the Valley that provide fun activities for children to participate in during the school year. Girls on the Run, an organization that empowers girls through running, have teams at Edwards Elementary and Eagle County Charter School this fall season. Girls in grades third through fifth grade can participate and train after school to run a 5k race in Frisco in early November. Duchess Ride, another local organization started in 2015, focuses on youth development for girls, utilizing skateboarding in the summer and providing a snowboard progression program in the winter/spring. Whether children are in the same or different households, it is important to transition them back to school by setting their schedules. Make the transition fun for children, as they tend to learn and engage more when they are having a good time!

Felicia works in bronze sculpture, all limited edition, and concisely expresses, "I echo the female figure with my work; that is what I am all about." Pointing to a recently completed abstract of mother and child, she explains that she has two styles: one is contemporary, and the other is a southwest style, contemporarily done.

In all her work, she strives to create a piece that is pleasing, interesting, and uplifting, while at the same time characterized by simplicity and elegance. Felicia explains, "I respond to the human figure; my intention is to echo the figure and have in mind a creative vision of a spiritual simplistic form, along with elegance. My end result is to show different texture surfaces, along with high-polish areas, finished with different innovated acid wash (patinas) which make for an interesting image in bronze."

Felicia has been an artist for 30 years. She laughs as she remembers that her mother, an artist as well, would hang Felicia's early work as a child on the refrigerator. With clients in the Vail Valley as well as all over the world, Felicia remarks now that she most enjoys the personable side of her career. ## What's On Your Roof DOBSING AND BR Contributed Harris, Since

If your roof looks like these Singletree roofs, this article is important for you to read.

I have been on a mission to educate both homeowners and realtors about the changes in the insurance industry that might negatively impact anyone with wood roofs and roofs 20 years or older. Walking through the neighborhood, I still see homeowners replacing older roofs with wood shingles, wood shakes, or other materials that don't carry the lifetime warranties. As those materials might be less expensive in the short run, it might be more costly in the long run, or even become detrimental for obtaining or continuing homeowners' insurance.

If your home has a wood roof or is approaching 20 years, please read on.

Many insurance companies won't insure homes with certain roofing materials such as wood shakes, wood shingles, and any overlay over wood shakes or shingles. Some of the issues with wood roofs include warping, brittleness, insects, and fire. The wildfire danger is the major issue in our community, as embers blown from even a distant fire could land on the roof and ignite the home. If your insurance carrier does insure your wood roof, you are likely paying a surcharge, or the roof may be insured for actual cash-value settlement.

Over recent years the claims paid out for roof replacements due to wind and hail losses have increased substantially nationwide. Many older homes have their original roofs, and the likelihood of damage is greater due to older materials that are not as resilient as newer materials. For this reason, many insurance companies are requiring that any roof over 20 years old be replaced unless they have a "lifetime" roof material, such as tile or slate.

You will also see insurance companies settling windstorm or hail losses to roofing surfaces at "**Actual Cash Value**" instead of "Replacement Cost." Actual Cash Value settlement takes the depreci-

ated value due to wear and tear and age of the roof into consideration at the time of loss. This payment will be much less than the replacement cost method of settlement. **Replacement cost** will pay what it costs at today's prices to repair or replace the roof. The trend of denying or restricting coverage for older roofs will most likely continue. If you own a home or are purchasing an older home, you will want to plan on replacing the roof once it becomes 20 years old. Otherwise, you may risk being non-renewed from your current carrier, denied coverage, or paying a surcharge on your policy. If you have replaced an older roof, notify your insurance agent so the policy can reflect the change. Always read your insurance policy to see the limitations or exclusions for coverage on your roof.
