













Terry and Tim Benedickt started Riverwalk Wine & Spirits in 1996, taking over the space from the pharmacy on the corner of the Village Market building. Riverwalk, and Edwards in general, was just beginning its transformation from horse pastures to stores and restaurants, although Singletree, the Gashouse and the corner gas station were already well-established. The focus on fine wine and friendly service quickly set the store on the road to success. These qualities are still the pillars of Riverwalk Wine & Spirits.

Last January, the Benedickts sold the store to Jarrett Osborn, the store's longtime wine specialist, and a 9 year Singletree resident. As they say, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it!", and only minor changes have occurred, mainly in expanding the beer program and the resumption of special out-of-store tastings. As far as the many Colorado craft beers and spirits popping up, Jarrett says, "With the current boom in local beers and liquors, we figured we better get as many in Riverwalk as we can fit, not just to support local endeavors, but because these are good! Colorado beers, in particular, are the best in America, with only California and Oregon having a valid argument."

Jerry Weiss joined the store as General Manager in the spring of 2015, finally tiring of the restaurant grind after 20+ years. You may remember him as the long-time owner of traMonti in the Charter at Beaver Creek. His wine knowledge, particularly Italian wines, shows as Riverwalk's Barolo and Barbaresco sections have expanded dramatically in the last year. Hmmm, funny we should mention two great wines for Thanksgiving dinner! Between Jerry and Jarrett, the Riverwalk Monthly Wine Club tends to feature many different Italians, both red and white.







singletree history

SHE KNOWS WHERE The Rhubarb And The Horseradish GROW WILD....

Shelley Miller Sharp Lohrman grew up on the 800-acre cattle ranch in Edwards her parents purchased in 1953. The family moved into the home on the property built in 1892 – a wooden structure without indoor plumbing. In 1958, Ray and Ruth Miller built the family's home where their six children grew up. Forty-plus years later, Shelley Miller and her husband Ernie Lohrman purchased a lot on the same acreage where Shelley lived as a child. That land is now Singletree.

The Miller Ranch was purchased from Harv Shannon who is thought to have homesteaded the property. The purchase price - \$100 per acre. The ranch stretched from June Creek on the east to Charolais Circle on the west, Highway 6 to the south and BLM land to the north.

In 1970, the state of Colorado purchased a large portion of the ranch to build the I-70 Interstate. In the late 70s, all the land that lies north of the interstate

was purchased for the development of Singletree. The remainder of the land south of the interstate was maintained by the Miller family until 1989. The family then moved to Silt, CO where Shelley's mom Ruth still resides. The home her father built was torn down to build Edwards Elementary.

As children, Shelley and her siblings took on the many responsibilities of working on the ranch, lending a helping hand to tend to the sheep, cattle,



horses and chickens. At any one time, the Millers raised about 100 head of sheep, yielding both lamb and wool, as well as approximately 80 cattle, both dairy and beef. The sheep were housed in the sheep shed which stood on the grounds where the golf course club house is now located. Shelley laughs, "the soil there is very fertile!" The Millers enjoyed the milk, cream and eggs they needed and sold the rest to the market.

Shelley's primary chore was caring for the chickens, as well as preparing breakfast for the family and the mid-day meal during the summer. She actively participated in 4-H, showing sheep, cattle and horses; those early experiences in demonstration taught her a lot, and as it turns out, have served her well in her adult career. "It was a great life," she says as she reflects fondly on those days.

At the time, elementary school in Edwards was a one room school house, with one teacher, located on the corner of Highway 6 and Lake Creek where a church is located today. Shelley and her 4 classmates attended grades K through 4 there, which Shelley recalls with a vivid memory, and then junior high school (through the 7th grade) in Eagle. Shelley went on to attend Eagle Valley High school with her siblings and many others from the valley, traveling on the school bus twenty-eight miles, each way, to Gypsum.

Unknown to many, Shelley is a talented baker who worked at the Westin Vail Cascade for years. When the Park Hyatt Beaver Creek Resort opened in 1988, she transferred there as a pastry chef and worked the 1 a.m. - noon shift preparing breakfast pastries for the guests. She loves to cook, starting about the age of six helping her mother feed the family. She was able to use many of her own recipes at the Hyatt. Now she makes her own





The Basics **OF PROBATE**

There are few things as traumatic as dealing with the death of a parent, sibling or spouse. It is a reality that we will all face at some point in our lives, and when we do, the pain experienced is often exacerbated by the legal issues death often brings.

Dealing with insurance companies, locating and reading the will, and coming up with a fair pro-

whelmed by this life event. Looming over it all is the specter of probate, a process that few people understand but is crucial in the tying up of your loved ones' affairs.

Probate is the process a legal court takes to conclude all of your legal and financial matters after your death. If a person dies with a will, the estate needs to go through the probate process in Colorado to determine if the will is proven to be valid or invalid. A person can also be determined to have died intestate, meaning without a will.

In any probate process, a personal representative is appointed to be responsible for administering the estate. The probate process can be informal and unsupervised; most of the estates that are administered in Colorado are without supervision.

Following is a summary of the basic definitions and steps involved in estate administration:

- 1. **Opening the Estate** Opening the estate and appointment of the personal representative.
- 2. **Information of Appointment** A copy of an "Information of Appointment" must be sent to each heir and beneficiary under the Will.
- 3. **Notice to Creditors** A newspaper notice must be published to notify claimants of the decedent's death and the commencement of the probate administration.
- 4. **Disallowance of claims** If the personal representative decides that a particular claim should not be paid, a copy of a Notice of Disallowance should be sent to the claimant and the original must be filed with the court.

5. **Inventory and Asset Information** - A personal representative must assemble, collect, and value all of the estate assets as well as prepare an inventory of the assets that were in the decedent's name alone.

- 6. Accounting and Financial Records A personal representative must maintain complete records of all cash and investment transactions of the estate.
- 7. Ancillary Probate If the decedent owned any real property, including timeshares or oil and gas interests, in his own name in states other than Colorado, probate proceedings may be necessary in those states to transfer title.
- 8. **Estate Taxes** If the value of all property in the decedent's name, including joint assets, and life insurance

owned by the decedent, exceeds the federal exemption amount, a federal estate tax return must be filed.

- 9. Inheritance Taxes Colorado does not have its own estate/inheritance tax.
- 10. Income Tax Returns In addition to a Colorado fiduciary income tax return that is generally required, there is a final individual return and possibly a federal estate income tax return reporting income received by the estate.
- 11. **Final Accounting and Closing the Estate** After all known debts, administration expenses, and taxes have been paid or provided for, the personal representative will need to prepare a Final

Accounting. The personal representative may close the estate informally or formally.

New Wildfire Program

Offers Incentives And Advice for Homeowners

The REALFire® program offers seasonal mitigation advice, free assessments, and insurance coverage tips for local property owners.

Fall is the time of year when kids return to school, holiday planning begins, football kicks off and many of us starting dusting us off our ski gear. As the air turns crisp and the leaves dry out, it's hard to keep wildfire threat front and center. However, it's exactly this time of year when fall weather conditions can prompt new wildfires across the state.

Singletree residents have the opportunity to take action on preparing their homes. This summer, Eagle County and the Vail Board of REALTORS® co-launched REALFire®—a voluntary wildfire mitigation program that offers in-depth, property assessments conducted by experienced local fire professionals. The program helps homeowners identify actions they can take to measurably reduce wildfire hazards on their property.

As an incentive for Singletree residents to sign up, the program enrollment fee (\$50) has been waived for 2016. All residential properties, including single-family, duplex and condo/townhome, are eligible to apply.


Many "fall cleaning" activities already fit well into home wildfire maintenance, such as raking leaves and cleaning out gutters. However, homeowners should also be aware of additional risks they may incur if not well-planned.

"We all want to move our firewood piles next to the house this time of year, but this creates a big fire risk for homeowners, especially areas in the dry part of the valley," cautions Eric Lovgren, REALFire® Program Coordinator and wildfire mitigation specialist for Eagle County. Instead, Lovgren and other local fire professionals recommend that homeowners store a smaller pile near the home in an easy-to-transport device, such as a wheelbarrow or wagon. The main woodpile should be located 30 feet away from the house—what fire professionals refer to as "Zone 1".

Keeping grasses moved to less than six inches in Zone 1 is also important. "This time of year it's easy for a wind-driven fire to


move quickly across our community, and keeping those fine fuels around the house maintained is really important to reduce your individual property risk," adds Lovgren.

Another incentive that the REALFire® program offers is promoting insurance coverage. Owners that successfully complete their required mitigation actions receive a certificate that can be shared with insurance providers or would-be home buyers. RE-ALFire® is modeled after the success of Boulder County's Wildfire Partners Program, where program certificates are already being accepted by many local insurance providers to ensure continued coverage.

"We're thrilled to see this program in place. Residents can be empowered to take action to reduce their own risk and even benefit their neighbors," said Mark Bergman, Association Executive for the Vail Board of REALTORS®.

Mike Budd, VAIL BOARD OF REALTORS® Government Affairs Committee Chair, also adds that the REALFire® program benefits the local economy. "A local voluntary mitigation program, as opposed to a mandated state program, puts our homeowners in a positive position with insurance companies, an advantage in selling their property, and gives home buyers peace of mind when purchasing a property."


