Vail Mountain RESCUE

Saves the Day with Dedication and Teamwork

Imagine that it's a beautiful summer day, perfect for a hike along Shrine Pass to see the incredible blanket of wildflowers that nature is showcasing. With lunch, water, sunblock and a few extra layers in your backpack (just in case), you are prepared and set out for a great day in the beautiful wilderness. But as you're hiking along the ridgeline, the unimaginable happens: you twist your ankle. It quickly balloons up and turns an angry shade of purple. You're unable to stand on it. You're unable to hike back out. You're upset with yourself for such a stupid accident, but you resort to doing the only thing you can do, you call 911 for help.

The local authorities immediately contact Vail Mountain Rescue to launch into action. Vail Mountain Rescue has someone on call 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, to respond to backcountry emergencies. A team is quickly assembled, and it is they who will arrive to safely bring you out of the wilderness and to a medical facility for treatment.

There are many reasons why Vail Mountain Rescue is such an important part of our community. A local nonprofit that is familiar to many of us who live here in the Valley, they are responsible for saving the lives of many locals and visitors alike who have had the misfortune of getting injured or lost in our beautiful backcountry.

Over the past year, as a volunteer for Friends of Mountain Rescue, I've had the privilege of getting to know and better appreciate the value of their work. Friends of Mountain Rescue is a separate nonprofit dedicated to building a \$2 million endowment to fund Vail Mountain Rescue's annual capital and operating expenses, helping to ensure that they have the equipment they need to safely do their work.

Vail Mountain Rescue's dedicated 40-member volunteer team donates their time away from their families, and their jobs, to perform rescue missions in all seasons and all weather. That time equates to approximately 3,000 man-hours of training each year to prepare them for the more than 2,500 man-hours required to perform over 125 rescue missions annually.

The White River National Forest is the team's primary area of coverage. With the National Forest Service reporting 12 million visitors a year and increasing annually, it's no surprise that the number of rescue missions the team is called on to perform has also been trending upward.

The geographic area covered by the team is comprised of 1,700 square miles of high altitude and rugged mountain terrain, including three wilderness areas, two major waterways, and several 13,000+ and 14,000+ foot peaks. Additionally, they sometimes provide support to rescue teams in other regions of Colorado, as they do ours when necessary.

I had the privilege of joining them on one of their training missions last fall. While role-playing the victim of a mountain biking accident on a steep hill behind Singletree, I laid in the dirt while they splinted my "fake" broken leg, placed me in a litter (the latter folds in half and has straps to carry it as a "backpack" into the wilderness). The team then proceeded to carry me part way down the hill, only to then practice setting up a hoist and hauling me back *up* the hill. It was a truly amazing experience to be part of their training exercise. What I observed was incredible teamwork supported by the demonstration of strong individual skills, the combination of which results in the amazing outcomes they provide for those they rescue.

What's your favorite movie of all time? I like *Storks*. We saw it on the airplane. We went to Hawaii, Kawaii.



Carrie Benvay Brings Passion To YOUTHPOWER365

I first visited the Vail Valley as a 7-year-old on a family vacation from Florida. My love of Vail increased each year during our family's ski vacations. I have called the Vail Valley home for more than 25 years now, first residing in East Vail, then Homestead, and now having lived in lower Singletree for 15 years.

My daughters have been well served by the public schools of Eagle County, pre-K to present. I have witnessed, first-hand, the efforts of remarkable teachers and administrators come to fruition but have also been given a clear view of the disparity in opportunities available to our students, based on their family's income level.


Since I believe that the future success of our community relies on how well we educate our students and promote family involvement in their children's education, it is no surprise that I love my work as the Director of Development for YouthPower365.



YouthPower365, the education arm of the Vail Valley Foundation, provides year-round extended learning opportunities that empower and educate youth and families in Eagle County from cradle to career. I raise money to fund our extensive pipeline of programs that serve needs in early childhood, K-12, and post-secondary readiness support for students. Because of the vast scope of YouthPower365's work, I receive many questions from community members about our programs.

YouthPower365 supports local students and families through three key arenas of programming:

PWRUP. PwrUp early childhood education programming takes a two-generational approach to learning for children in need so that every young child (0-5 years) and every parent is kindergarten ready.

- MAGIC BUS MOBILE PRESCHOOL PROGRAM provides early childhood education for 3-5-year-olds from Avon to Dotsero whom would otherwise enter kindergarten with no formal educational experience.
- PARENT MENTORS educates and engages parents through training and volunteerism in primary-aged classrooms and provides a structured early childhood education experience for their young children.
- SUCCESS AT SIX provides kindergarten scholarships to low-income families to mitigate the fact that Colorado is one of the few states that does not mandate kindergarten and families are required to pay \$250 per month (per child) to have their children enrolled in full-day kindergarten. Youth Power 365 has provided Eagle County Schools with over three million dollars in kindergarten scholarships since the inception of the program in 2002.

PWRHRS. PwrHrs K-12 programming empowers youth to achieve their potential through engaging academic and enrichment opportunities.

- PWRHURS AFTERSCHOOL serves 1,800 students across all 19
 Eagle County Public Schools, primarily utilizing day-school
 teachers as program instructors. Inspiring fact: PwrHrs participants achieve 3 times the literacy growth as non-participants.
- **PWRHRSSUMMER CAMP** will serve over 700 students for four weeks in 2017, a 20% increase in the number of enrolled students from 2016. Summer PwrHrs focuses on STEM, with engaging, outdoor activities and project-based learning activities designed to negate the Summer Slide.
- OTHER PROGRAMS UNDER THE PWRHRS UMBRELLA INCLUDE: Girl PowHER, Anti-Bullying, Celebrate the Beat (dance), Very Young Composers (music), KidSTRONG & COPA (soccer).

PWRON. PwrOn Career & College programming supports youth in their pathway toward post-secondary education and career opportunities.

- INTERNSHIPS AND APPRENTICESHIPS, available to high school and college students, offers the opportunity for students to earn credit and/or pay while gaining valuable career skill-building and career exploring experiences with local businesses
- COMMUNITY COACHES provides high school and college students that are PwrHrs alumni the opportunity to work for YouthPower365, serving younger students while developing leadership and career readiness skills.
- DOLLARS FOR SCHOLARS provides about \$200K in scholarships to graduating high school seniors annually.
- COLLEGE & CAREER READINESS CAMP is a new initiative beginning in the summer of 2017 that will teach a cohort of 40 incoming high school juniors and seniors about college applications, financial planning, career tracks, leadership and more! YouthPower365 will also be piloting a career and college mentorship program in the 2017-18 academic year that will strengthen the support students receive.

YouthPower365 supporters who file taxes in the state of Colorado may benefit from being eligible for the Colorado Child Care Tax Credit (CCTC). This tax savings, in addition to providing opportunities that positively impact a student's academic trajectory, is a great incentive to learn more about YouthPower365 and the students we serve. I value the opportunity to meet any interested community member for coffee or a program visit to let you know how you can make a difference in the lives in the next generation of our community.

BOXCAR Delights and Box Box Box Believers

On a snowy evening in mid-May, Singletree residents had the delightful opportunity to experience one of Avon's most delicious and unique eateries, Boxcar Restaurant & Bar. The valley's only "upscale gastropub" is owned by Chef Hunter Chamness and Chef Cara Luff. The two originally met in Seattle, at the James Beard award-winning restaurant, "Crush", before opening Boxcar in 2014. Chef/Owner Hunter Chamness welcomed diners with graciousness, professionalism, and a captivating story regarding his restaurant and how it came to be. A local valley resident since 1998, Chef Hunter understands the importance of giving back to the community and has one mission: providing seasonal ingredients and working closely with local purveyors to deliver a quality dining experience.

The name "Boxcar" was chosen as a representation of the history of Avon, as many of the valley's produce and materials were transported via train before I-70 was constructed. His natural

progression of passion and love for the local community has helped Boxcar rise to become one of the valley's greatest restaurants, and the delicious food tastings provided were no exception to why Boxcar remains at the top.

For those who have never experienced Boxcar, the overall restaurant concept is a sophisticated pub specializing in unique, locally sourced cuisine. The menu is composed of bar bites and a la carte sides, small plates meant for sharing, incredible house-made charcuterie, a selection of protein entrees grilled to perfection, and remarkable desserts. One impressive concept that sets Boxcar apart is their sourcing of authentically local proteins from Colorado Meat Company, located just a block down from the restaurant in Avon. Chef Chamness was more than generous with a variety of menu samplings, and diners were delighted with an assortment of outstanding flavors and textures throughout the evening.



Bev Trout pronounced the house made sausages as the "best of the show". The unique trio of boudin blanc, smoked chorizo, and corned beef served with whole grain mustard, relish, and cherry ancho chili ketchup was described by Wendy Groover as "thick, rustic, and a celebration of herbs". Another house favorite for Lai White was the indulgent bacon wrapped chicken liver pate served with grilled bread, pickled mustard seed, pickled vegetables, and fig mostarda. Wendy described the pate as "rich with a yummy depth of flavor ranging from red wine essence and herbs to a warm Indian finish".

Boxcar's buttermilk fried chicken, vadouvan yogurt, fried kale, and harissa honey glaze stole the show for Buckner Matthews, praising the dish as the best fried chicken he has ever indulged in. "The fried chicken is airy, with a perfectly crisp exterior with a hint of sweetness, and a juicy, flavorful, briny inside. The light crispy kale balances the sweetness from the honey with the tang of the yogurt, creating a unique and well-composed dish". The chicken was also a favorite of Cynthia Kruse, admiring the chicken's "fabulous batter and moist center."

Cynthia's other favorite dish was the famous Boxcar pretzel roll, served with horseradish crème fraiche, beer cheese sauce, and whole grain mustard. The pretzel roll has always been my personal favorite item on the menu, and the texture can be compared to a fresh homemade yeast roll: soft and pillowy on the inside with a crisp, buttery, salty exterior. The beer cheese sauce is exceptional with the pretzel and makes for an outstanding pairing with my favorite house cocktail, the spicy jalapeno margarita.

Phil, one of the friendly Boxcar bartenders, handcrafts their margarita to perfection. The margarita is strong, made with fresh lime juice, never from concentrate, and has the perfect gentle amount of heat from the jalapeno, making it astoundingly light and refreshing. They also boast an impressive brew selection, with 10 craft beers on tap. Another outstanding accompaniment to the cocktails is the house made popcorn, dashed with brewer's yeast and sweet jalapeno. Typically popcorn is a basic bar snack, however, Boxcar elevates this common treat to a different level with the jalapeno dust to make it not only intriguing on the palate but highly addictive.

Another mouthwatering bar bite is the roasted cauliflower with black garlic and gremolata. Chuck and Connie Powers describe the cauliflower appetizer as "innovative and delicious with a balance of textures". One of the Powers' favorite dishes was the PEI beer mussels, pork sausage, garlic, and sourdough bread as they were a "nice change from your typical wine and garlic flavors". The mussels were also a top choice for John Milligan and Linda Gilles. The pork sausage in the mussels is large, meaty, and full of flavor.

Boxcar stands out with their homemade sausages and interesting meats, however, their salads are equally noteworthy. The spinach lentil salad with almond, avocado, tarragon cardamom vinaigrette has a diverse texture, and the hearty lentils and creamy avocado make it extremely satisfying for a salad course. The grilled asparagus salad, spring peas, roasted golden beets, and rye croutons is the ideal light spring dish, and the "combination of fresh crispy vegetables create a terrific crunch, much more robust than a typical salad", according to Tom DiVenere.

To end on a sweet note, Boxcar's incredible pastry chef Monika impressed us with an outstanding warm blueberry crisp with lemon mascarpone ice cream, banana cinnamon roll bread pudding with bacon maple ice cream, and the decadent Boxcar Brownie with strawberry, white pearls, and mint chocolate chip ice cream.

Overall, the exceptional food, gracious service, and welcoming ambiance of Boxcar made for a textbook evening for socializing with neighbors. Chef Chamness charmed the Singletree residents as a proud and dedicated chef/owner who knows and loves his food and truly cares about the customer experience.

I encourage all to visit the impressive outdoor garden patio with a beautiful hops-covered trellis in the summer, with happy hour specials from 4-6 p.m. and live music on Thursdays. Large groups of up to 60 people can be accommodated for private parties as well. Thank you to the Boxcar staff for providing our neighborhood with a delightful experience; we will be returning very soon!







VAIL JAZZ WORKSHOP DIRECTOR WING MAYER **Looks Back on 15 Years** OF FOSTERING JAZZ MUSIC'S FUTURE LEGENDS

Austin "Wing" Mayer is renowned as a business strategy and valuation enhancement consultant to the likes of Apple, Intel and Pfizer for the last 25 years, but here in the Vail Valley, Wing is the resident jazz aficionado. His work as founder and managing partner of the MDMC Consulting Group has been recognized by

Financial World Magazine, a five-time winner for Best Business Communications and the National Association of Investors, a three-time winner for Best Investor Communications Program.

As Workshop Director and Contributing Editor with the Vail Jazz Foundation, his work led to two Hermes Creative Awards for Best Overall Publication and helped manage the workshops that were cited in Downbeat Magazine's Jazz Education Achievement Award for 2017. As we head into the 23rd summer of jazz in the Vail Valley, the Vail Jazz team is thrilled to recognize the hard work and dedication of your neighbor in Singletree, Wing Mayer.

Twenty-three years ago, Wing was living in Aspen when he heard that the legendary Dick Gibson Labor Day Jazz Party was returning to Vail. He bought a ticket, drove over Independence Pass and has only missed one Vail Jazz Party since. Several years later he relocated to Vail, traveling the country and the world as a management consultant by day and moonlighting as an integral part of the Vail community, helping to establish the Vail Jazz Party as a one-of-a-kind event for artists and fans alike.

In 2002, he began assisting with the Vail Jazz Workshop, the signature education program that invites the top 12 high school jazz musicians in the nation and the six greatest jazz educators in the country to Vail for an intensive immersion experience. In 2005 he took the baton as Vail Jazz Workshop Director. This summer will mark his 15th year with the Workshop and the impact of his influence is demonstrated in the quality of an alumni network that includes Grammy® winners, Tonight Show band members and award-winning educators among its ranks.

The Vail Jazz Workshop is unique both in its curriculum and its format. Two students for each instrument (saxophone, trumpet, trombone, piano, bass, and drums) work directly with a world-class instructor, with no sheet music! The program is built entirely on the method of "ear-training," which involves learning songs through listening, or "by ear," rather than reading from written notation. High school students from across the country arrive in Vail and work from dawn until dusk on their craft.

The culmination of the program is a series of performances at the Vail Jazz Party, where 12 total strangers transform into a world-class jazz band. This monumental feat requires that personalities, styles and backgrounds coalesce, both musically and personally. "It's understood that a guy like John Clayton can play the bass and teach a bass lesson at the highest level, but when you witness the way that he listens, demonstrates and coaches - that's what really makes the difference," Wing says. "Watching the transformation in these students over such a short period of time is incredibly rewarding."

Workshop alum Grace Kelly (class of 2008) has been featured on CNN and NPR and can be seen weeknights on *The Late Show with Stephen Colbert* as a member of Jon Batiste & Stay Human.



During a return visit to Vail to join the Vail Jazz Alumni Quartet in 2015, she recalled, "I learned so many important lessons musically at Vail and the most important thing is they didn't teach out of music books -- they taught right out of their life experience." In a letter, fellow saxophonist Logan Strosahl (class of 2006 and member of the Gibson/Baldwin Grammy® Band) wrote, "Some of the best things I learned were not regarding the actual playing of the music but rather about the life and philosophy of the artist."

In 2011, Vail Jazz founder Howard Stone dubbed the venue for the Late Night Jam Sessions of the Vail Jazz Party, "Wing's Place" in appreciation for his years of dedication to the Workshop. Over Labor Day Weekend, the First Chair Cafe at the Vail Marriott is transformed into "Wing's Place," an alpine jazz club, and is the final highlight of the program for students. Trading fours and riffing alongside their jazz heroes, the students sit in with legends of the genre -- the headliners of the Vail Jazz Party. "The kids are shaking as they walk up there, but they deliver," observes Wing, "and the audience loves it!"

The Workshop, Party and the Vail Jazz Festival would not be possible without the generous support of dedicated volunteers, donors, sponsors and patrons. Wing is quick to note that "Single-tree is home to many members of the Vail Jazz community," including Nancy Gage and Allan Finney, Will and Paula Verity, Gary and Patty Thornton, David and Linda Wilson and a collection of families who have graciously hosted Workshop students during their time in the Vail Valley.

The Vail Valley is a special place to live for so many reasons -- the natural landscape, the culinary offerings, and cultural organizations like Vail Jazz among them. It is the contribution by truly passionate individuals like Wing Mayer, that maintains and evolves this experience. Heading into his 15th year with the Workshop and 6th as Contributing Editor of the Vail Jazz Festival Program, Wing's fingerprints are indelible on the fabric of the Vail Jazz Foundation and the Vail community at large.
