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

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Spring is Home Project Season

When planning home projects for this spring and summer please remember Singletree has adopted Design Guidelines, Rules and Regulations, and Declaration requirements for your home and lot. These can be found online at www.singletreetoday.com.

Homes and lots shall be maintained in good repair and in a neat, attractive and safe manner. Design Review Committee approval is required prior to exterior work being completed.



Roofing

There are several approved roofing materials in Singletree and there is a re-roofing application online.

All door, window, deck and garage door replacements, including color changes, shall be approved prior to the commencement of the work.

Air Conditioning Units

All mechanical equipment and air-conditioning condensers installed on the exterior of the home shall be installed as close to the home as possible and screened from view with evergreen landscaping.

Fences



Fences should be an extension of the architecture and used only where absolutely necessary. Fences are allowed in Singletree, provided they have been approved prior to construction.

Exterior Maintenance

Doors, Windows, Deck and Garage Door Replacement

Vegetable gardens can look out of place if they are highly visible, so it is important to site them carefully. Gardens on the hillsides should be avoided, where possible, or terraced into the hillside.

All exterior lighting should direct light downward, and the light source should not be visible from your





Carol Calinoff Captures Life's Beautiful Moments

"I want my photographs to be something that I can look at and smile. Everything I look at I want to look at and feel happy; none of that depressing stuff." Carol laughs as she looks at all the photographs around her in her Singletree home. The light-filled living room is a perfect reflection of Carol herself: compact and full of conversation. Her photography was just something she wanted to try around 1975, and it now defines those impactful moments in her life. "I run around like a maniac for the sole purpose of taking pictures," she quips. "A man I was working for at the time (1975) gave me a Nikkormat and I just started."

I asked her why she chose photography over painting. "See, I can't paint. I would love to paint, and I just can't. I gave my mother a painting that I did once, and she said, 'Sweetheart, stick with the photography." From then on she knew she had found her medium, though it wasn't always easy. Though she didn't carry an easel and paints, she recalls times when she carried all of her bulky equipment around throughout her world travels with a laugh.

"I had Nikon equipment, a manual and an automatic camera. I carried them with me all the time, with the lenses! Red Mountain Spa is an amazing place to vacation, and I would always bring my cameras with me lugging them during hikes and setting up my tripod but not really enjoying the views!" She knows that this sweaty endeavor was a catalyst to switch over to digital. "Then finally I just gave up and went digital with a pocket camera. It's top of the line, but I can't enlarge them the same way that those larger cameras can."

To Carol, the digital limitations don't matter. If she finds a subject that is truly worthy of being blown up to extremes she

takes that photograph with her old school equipment. She wants to always do the piece the justice it deserves. "It (photography) makes me appreciate the beauty around me. Sometimes the pictures come out just as your eye sees, and sometimes it doesn't. You never know really what's coming out. It makes you very aware. You look at it from the art point of view, the colors and the shadows...that's why I'm partial to landscapes."


I can see landscapes from across the world scattered throughout her collections. Her travels to 3rd World countries have produced photographs with human subjects against a wild landscape. She says that those people are the most interesting subjects because they still dress indigenously; something she can't capture while hiking through Antelope Canyon in the USA.

Carol is part of the Photography Club, a branch of the Vail Valley Art Guild. They have about 100 members, some of whom showcase their work at the annual Colorado Mountain College Art Show. "I took home 1st place in Photography last year, and this year I took home 3rd place," Carol proudly announced. "To me, winning a ribbon is worth more than winning \$100 prize. I do it for the competition." She also appreciates that the Club has a year-round location to showcase art at the old Avon police station. "I like to show just for the fun of it sometimes too, like a new opening", she states. "People walk around with their wine and I like to sneakily stand behind them looking at my photos and hear what they have to say" she giggles.

"It kind of keeps you going, you know?" She looks me in the eyes as she gently pets her beatific little Shih Tzu, Rosie. "We meet once a month and we have an assignment. We also have a 'best shot of the month' that we send in. That's our personal choice from what we've taken. Every Monday we submit a black & white photograph. The Club has had some outstanding field trips. My photos of Piney Lake and Antelope Canyon you liked so much in the hallway are on field trips."



A painter and a photographer take the same subject and put it into their respective mediums. "We did the Old Cabin on the Beaver Creek Golf Course, and we collaborated. 

Contemporary *meets* **Tuscan Villa** at 531 Winslow

As I drive up Winslow Road, I am unsure of which house is 531, but upon siting a particularly spectacular home, I know I have found my destination. Dave and Debbie Irwin's house stands atop its land similar to a Tuscan villa, overlooking lower Singletree and the Arrowhead slopes like a king upon its throne. Initially, the exterior is intimidatingly masculine with iron and stone rising from the ground, topped with deep-set windows and a dark metal roof. However, the avuncular nature of its creator is mirrored in the subtleties as the villa, once entered, becomes a home.

"I've always wanted a home to feel like a warm hug," Dave remarks as we walk around the living room and I experience the vastness that is a delightful surprise to the senses. Pure white walls with rounded edges are so divine it seems as though only Mother Nature could have created them. Every element just seems to fit perfectly and I am in awe as to how this home could be so big and yet feel so comfortable.



That's not an easy task," says Dave. "This home is a combination of a lot of different feels, designs, and styles I have learned over the years. I wanted it to have a feeling of warmth and at the same time, always be functional and without putting anything into it, be a work of art in itself." He has a wealth of experience in home design, with over 80 homes in the Vail Valley to his name, 15 homes throughout the United States and 2 in Australia.

Dave and Debbie Irwin created with each other a house that mirrors themselves and their relationship in a symphony of architectural senses. "We had fun putting this home together," remarks Debbie. "I just loved that our visions were the same." As we walk into the white quartz kitchen, she remarks further on how much she learned during the process of building. "I am a broker with Berkshire Hathaway and I sell homes in this valley, including of course, those built by The Nova Group (Dave's design and development company); it's great industry knowledge to really understand why finishes and prices differ, from the unseen footings to the kitchen countertops."



"Check out that cabinet over there!" laughs Dave. I open up what I think is going to be a modest pantry cabinet with cool shelving and am instantly overwhelmed by a humungous room with its own refrigerator and pantry shelving from floor to ceiling that rivals most master bedroom closets. "We like to have a place for everything," Dave begins, "so that we can enjoy the clean lines of the home," finishes Debbie.

The home was completed in January 2016, but Dave has owned the lot for 35 years. "I just knew when I met Debbie that I wanted to build our home together in Singletree," says Dave as he looks fondly at his wife. Of course, there were some bumps along the way in the build. The staining on all of the alder doors had to be sent back and redone because it "wasn't quite right". Ultimately, the Irwins effectively used dark coffee and grey tones to achieve a successful marriage between a contemporary style and the stature of a Tuscan villa.

"The beam across the living and dining room is 54 feet long," points out Dave, "and the lumber truck almost tipped over when it was being delivered!" All of the beams and exposed woodwork in the house are just that: beautiful and exposed to create an architectural detail that enhances the overall feel and design of the home rather than covering those beams in sheetrock and plaster.

Dave prides himself on his home building expertise and never asks anyone who builds his homes to do something he himself doesn't know how to do. "I can do electrical, plumbing, plastering, woodworking, the works," he explains as we stand in their second floor living space with the pool table overlooking the formal living area below. "He found this light fixture and took it apart and sprayed it from chrome to a more subtle color to match the pendant over the pool table!" exclaims Debbie.

"I feel I need to eliminate the overworked or overdone," Dave pauses as we move towards the master entrance. "For instance, I don't like hallways unless the design necessitates one, and I don't like unnecessary doors." Their first floor master suite is warm and welcoming, with rounded arches that take the place of doors as you move from the master to the bathroom and the enormous closet. "There's no reason to have a lack of storage for clothes, gear and personal items, when you live here," says Dave.



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As I prepare to depart, I ask Dave and Debbie if they have any final words and Dave does not disappoint. "I designed this home to be warm and functional. There should not be more than three elements in a room: simple and clean and calming. Just like a beautiful lady in a black dress."

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



A First **AFRICAN ADVENTURE**

When Dave and I retired and became full-time residents of Singletree in 2014, we had quite a long list of far-away places we wanted to visit. We had managed to see most of the United States and many wonderful places in Europe, but with corporate jobs and kids, we had never been able to travel for more than a week and a half at a time. Along with trips to China and Japan, and Peru and Ecuador, a safari in southern Africa was at the top of our list.

After researching Lonely Planet, Frommer's, etc, I had a good idea of what we wanted to see - safari camps in the Kruger area of South Africa, Victoria Falls and the Zambezi River in Zimbabwe, Chobe and the Okavango Delta in Botswana, Cape Town, and maybe Namibia. Friends who had used "Africa specialists" to plan their trip had told us it was possible to do a custom itinerary at about the same price as a package trip. I worked with a specialist in New York who planned out the most amazing trip to four camps plus Cape Town, advising us that we could do most of our list on our budget and time constraints, but to leave Namibia for another trip.

Fall and spring seemed to be the best times to visit, with our fall being dry but not terribly hot. When it's dry, the animals congregate at the few water holes so viewing is very likely. Our spring is more lush so the animals may be spread out. So off we set in October, flying from Denver to Frankfurt and then another equally long flight to Johannesburg.

Our custom trip included all transfers and personal escorts from place to place, since we were certainly no experts on traveling in Africa. It worked seamlessly with someone meeting us on arrival and whisking us over to the other side of the airport where the tiny "bush" planes take off from. One spectacular flight and scary dirt airstrip landing later, we were met by staff from our first camp in the private reserve area called Motswari near Kruger National Park. No time to rest, our first safari drive was in an hour! Fortified by an amazing lunch, small groups of about six people per vehicle set off to see how many giraffes, antelope, zebra, lions, rhinos, etc, etc, etc we could see.





Each camp we stayed at was somewhat different, with some having African-style huts and others with luxury tented "rooms", but in general, the routine was the same. Wake up before dawn with coffee and a small bakery item, then into the vehicles for a three to four-hour game drive. On return a sumptuous breakfast followed by a nap in the heat of the day with maybe a dip in a small pool. A light lunch, maybe at a remote picnic spot, then back into the vehicles for a late afternoon into dusk game drive with Sundowner cocktails at a picturesque spot at sunset. Another hour of night viewing for a different perspective. Dinner was usually fairly late and very delicious with plenty of local delicacies like Kudu steak, fried crickets, or crocodile as well as beef and chicken. South African wines were in plentiful supply.

After a drive and a flight to Zambia, and a meet-up with our trusty escort, we crossed the border into Zimbabwe to stay at Elephant Camp, an elephant rescue preserve with an orphaned Cheetah named Chester that was right outside Victoria Falls. We had close encounters with the elephants, Chester, and a family of baboons as well as a visit to Victoria Falls. A highlight of this segment was an all-day whitewater rafting trip down the Zambezi River from the bottom of the Falls through eighteen rapids, twelve of which were Class Five. Terrifying and exciting at the same time! Nothing we had ever rafted in Colorado or Arizona had prepared us for this.

At first concerned that we wouldn't see all the animals and birds we wanted to see, it soon became apparent that there was no shortage of "Big Five" and many other creatures and that we would become almost blasé about seeing yet another awesome lion or hippo or leopard. Unfortunately, rhinoceros have become very rare due to the huge amount of poaching that is happening. We did see one female high-tailing into the bush with her baby and wished her luck

Another escorted drive into Botswana and we were at the fabulous Chobe Game Lodge. The great thing about this lodge is its location right on the Chobe River. This allowed them to do two vehicle game drives and one riverboat game drive each day. We lost count of how many animals and birds we saw. It was also the largest place we stayed and more of a lodge than a camp.

Another tiny plane and dirt airstrip and we were at our most rustic tented camp in the Okavango Delta. Totally remote and off-the-grid, with some solar power and hot water, we had animals right in the camp many times. A group of five mature female lions took a liking to the campfire and dinner area. We went out in traditional dugout canoes with a driver polling us along like a Venetian gondolier. Talk about up close and personal with the hippos and elephants!

After twelve days in the dusty bush, we were ready for some luxury at the beautiful Cape Grace Hotel in Cape Town. Situated on the V & A waterfront at the base of Table Mountain, it was the perfect location to explore the whole Cape. A driver took us to the Stellenbosch wine country for tastings and lunch, with the same Guide driving us the following day to hike out to the Cape itself, tour the coastline, visit the penguin colony, and stroll the Botanic Garden. A third day was spent exploring the city, riding the cable car to the top of Table Mountain, and then a sunset cruise on a catamaran. Cape Town quickly became one of our favorite cities. Too bad it is so far away.

This trip was truly a "trip of a lifetime" but we hope to return to Africa to see a few more of our favorite animals. We met people who return again and again and it is easy to see why.

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

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

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


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
