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
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












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Hello Singletree Residents!

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ative or Local? In Colorado, people talk a lot about being a local or native. It's a place where people are proud to be from, their home surrounded by beautiful mountains. It shows in their faces and their voices as they proclaim their love and their loyalty for their State. But, what does this really mean to be a local or a native? How would you answer the question? The dictionary defines a native as, "a person born in a specific place" and a local as, "belonging to or relating to a particular area."

This family of Brian, Emma and Thomas Judge and Sarah Siegel have an interesting story and diverse backgrounds as 'locals' and 'natives.' Brian was born in Vermont and was raised in another small town in Newtown, Connecticut. In these towns, no one ever asked him if he was a local or a native. To be honest, he said he was not sure he even knew what that meant until he moved to Colorado. Many of his friends still call Newtown home.

Thomas will be taking his first AP classes and working for a position on the boys' lacrosse team as well as running with the cross-country team. Thomas is also an exceptional skier and this past fall he and his father were instrumental in assisting in the start of the Vail Resorts Jr. Ski Patrol. Thomas learned CPR, trail marking, skier safety, evacuation training, sweeping and worked with Henry, the Avalanche dog. Where else in the world can you be so involved as a 14-year-old!

Sarah and Brian are really excited for Emma and Thomas to leave home and explore more of the world. Emma has recently spent a month in central

Europe while Thomas has traveled to Africa. Both are also working with the Children's Global Alliance, serving the children of the world and as this is written, Emma is off to Cambodia. They are hoping the kids choose an exciting destination for college (Brian says "anywhere, as long as it has Division 1A Football") so they can visit and listen to Emma and Thomas tell others proudly they are local and native to the Vail Valley of Colorado!

Skipper, the dog, is central to the family and can be found either sitting captain on the sofa overlooking the neighborhood or at their offices making sure the work gets done. A dog's job is never done, a native and local for sure.

As a family, they frequent the Vail Church and St. Claire Catholic Church in town. Sarah and Brian have





been on numerous Habitat for Humanity builds and Emma and Thomas have volunteered their time for local Habitat Builds in the Valley. Together, they passionately support the mission.

Being the ultimate entrepreneur, Brian started his own business, Vail Architecture Group or VAG Inc., in 1995. Having marked the 20th anniversary of his company a few years ago, he feels fortunate to work with wonderful clients and projects all over across the globe, from Europe to the Caribbean to many US resort towns. Brian's fortune continued as he met Sarah while working on a large scale residential project in Denver where she was the general contractor, and a few years later, they became inseparable.

Sarah was born in Denver and has lived all over Colorado, from early years in Evergreen for elementary school, to high school in Steamboat Springs and then to Colorado State University in Fort Collins. She experienced San Francisco for a few years after college but determined "it just didn't make sense as Colorado is home." The more time she spent in Edwards with Brian, Emma, Thomas and Skipper, and in getting to know the Valley, she was drawn in and convinced Colorado was where she belonged. As Brian designed their new home in Singletree and Sarah constructed it, the project became symbolic of building this new family together.

She makes it look so easy to get involved and really make a difference here — both a true native and local for sure!

When they were looking for a new home, they wanted to find a house that could be renovated, making it "their" home. They chose 11 Buckboard for many reasons. "We loved looking out the windows and seeing the park, the kiddos playing soccer across the street, the golfers on the tee box. The Singletree lifestyle." Although it took a lot of vision and work, they were the ones who could see the potential when they first walked the house. Having a home where one can walk to the athletic center, the kids can ride their bikes to the high school, the Edwards fields and into town at a moment's notice is a huge bonus. The bike paths that connect to Avon and soon to Eagle are also important to them. They all agree, "We love the house!"

Well, Emma and Thomas are certainly native and local, Sarah is a native and becoming a local and Brian after

27 years, has earned the local status. There are no native stickers on their cars and even if Brian wanted one, Sarah and the kids wouldn't let him as they want it for themselves! Brian and Sarah will be empty nesters here in a few years and although they have no plans set in stone, they have been starting to plan an adventure to South and Central America and possibly even moving to Spain or Italy for a few years. Maybe they will never know for sure if they are local or native but for now, these natives and locals are very happy to be calling Singletree home.

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


FIRST PLACE: SAUCY SWINE -KEVIN CALABRESE

INGREDIENTS

- $2\frac{1}{2}$ 3 lbs pork ribs
- 1/4 cup white vinegar
- Salt

FOR THE MARINADE/SAUCE:

- 1 tbsp hoisin sauce
- ½ cup soy sauce
- ½ cup sugar
- ½ cup ketchup
- ¼ cup lemon juice
- · 3 tbsp honey
- · 1 tbsp ginger, diced
- · 1 tbsp garlic, diced
- Garnish: sesame seeds and chopped green onion



INSTRUCTIONS:

- Fill a large pot halfway full with water. Stir in the vinegar and 2 tsp of salt, then add in the pork ribs. Bring to a boil and cook for 20 minutes. Drain and set aside.
- In a medium-sized bowl, combine the hoisin sauce, soy sauce, sugar, ketchup, lemon juice, honey, ginger and garlic. Whisk to combine.
- Place the cooked ribs in a large zip-lock bag and pour on the marinade. Marinate for 4-6 hours, turning occasionally to mix.
- · Barbecue the ribs till slightly charred, reserving the marinade.
- In a medium-sized saucepan, bring the marinade to a boil, then reduce the heat and let thicken. Drizzle over the ribs. Serve hot!

2ND PLACE: STICKY FINGER RIBS – JOANIE SCHOENING

INGREDIENTS

• 2½ lbs pork ribs (season with salt, pepper and garlic salt)

SAUCE:

- ½ cup soy sauce
- ½ cup red wine vinegar
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons dry mustard
- 2 teaspoons grated ginger
- · 4 cloves garlic, pressed

INSTRUCTIONS

- Cook sauce until it begins to thicken and caramelize (leftover sauce is great on chicken and hamburgers).
- Wrap ribs in aluminum foil. Place ribs on cookie sheet and bake at 350 degrees for 1½ hours.
- Uncover ribs and continue baking for I hour at 350 degrees.
- Reduce heat to 275 degrees and baste ribs every 15 minutes for an additional 1½ hours.
- Spoon sauce over ribs rubbing it in with a spoon.



3RD PLACE: NASTY PIG – ROB SPANGLER

INGREDIENTS FOR THE DRY RUB:

- ½ cup Hungarian sweet paprika
- · 1 cup brown sugar
- · 1 tablespoon celery salt
- 1 tablespoon black pepper
- * 1 tablespoon granulated garlic
- 1 tablespoon granulated onion
- ½ cup Kosher salt
- 1 cup freshly ground Expresso Roast Coffee
- 1 tablespoon wasabi Horseradish powder
- * 1 tablespoon Cayenne pepper

FOR THE SAUCE:

- · 1 cup Masterpiece Original BBQ Sauce
- 2 to 3 cups apple cider vinegar
- 1 tablespoon ground black pepper
- ½ cup lemon juice
- Hot sauce to taste
- Honey to taste

INSTRUCTIONS

- Coat the ribs with the rub and let cure in the refrigerator for two days. Smoke on indirect heat with hardwood charcoal.
- Use Applewood and Hickory for the smoking woods. Serve with sauce.

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



IT STARTED WITH A BIT OF KINDLING. AND THEN A SPARK.

The kindling was a young family — the Nashes — who were beloved in the community. They had a beautiful two-year-old and their lives stretched out in front of them. Before Cindy got sick. It was a terrible disease. Friends, as friends do, rallied around them.

Then there was the first spark. Why not, we thought, do more than hold a bake sale or a car wash? Why not think **Big**? I called the national company of *Miss Saigon*. I spoke with someone who has become a lifelong friend ... whose name caught me off guard.

"Would you come up to Vail," I asked, "and put on a show for us? We need your help."

"You'll have to call backstage and speak with our cast liaison. His name is General MacArthur."

I called. I asked for General MacArthur. He answered the phone. I told him what we needed. The cast and production company of *Miss Saigon* came to Vail, forty of them strong. The community transported them for free, housed them for free, got them on the hill for free and fed and pampered them for free. They put on a show to remember at the old Battle Mountain High School auditorium. This was in the days before the VPAC was more than an idea. As it turned out, General MacArthur Hambrick, besides having the soul of an angel, had the voice of one as well.

Cindy was too sick to come so we videoed the show for her. The last song that the ensemble joined in was Anita Baker's "It's Only for A While." Go home and play it in a dark room. It'll make you cry.



Then there was the second spark. What if, we wondered, people were in need and were not as well ingrained in the community as the Nashes? Didn't they deserve a hand up, too?












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Savina's Passion for THE ARMS

What are your hobbies? Well,



"We tried to stick on budget but ended up getting shattered," laughs Alex Biegler in response to my query regarding the cost to renovate their entire 30-year-old single-family home at 61 Chaparral. Two years following their purchase, the small-town famous newlyweds, Alex and Adi Biegler, have finally moved from their condo in Vail Village to their dream home. Adi is on business in Denver so Alex welcomes me into their rustically modern home, as pleasant and casually comfortable as its owners. Perhaps it's because we share the same generational tendencies in design and

open-concept entertainment areas (where no part of the home is off-limits to guests) but I feel very at home surrounded by a certain Colorado country charm.

The couple had their choice of places to live in the Vail Valley but Singletree became their go-to neighborhood for a number of specific reasons. "We originally wanted something in Minturn but the more we looked at the homes there, we realized it just didn't fit our lifestyle," Alex laments. "We are members of the Sonnenalp Club, which really drove our decision to





buy here more than anything. And a lot of our friends live here. Then it came down to the house, really. We found this older house with original finishes. Nothing had been done to it and it was rough. The price point allowed us to get into a single-family home in Singletree. We wanted a yard; we wanted a place to call our own."

They originally projected a renovation timeline of three months for the entire home but it ended up taking closer to six months. Alex lived here throughout the whole process so that he could be extremely involved. He is certain he drove people crazy coming home from work and asking what had been completed since earlier that day. "But that's what it takes to do something this big — you really have to be on top of every detail." As I was guided through the home, I admired the choices of finishes and the 'just do it all at once' attitude.

"We wanted to bring together the stuff we love about Colorado and we wanted to start our marriage off in a house we could live in forever," says Alex as he settles into the dining room chair across from me. "The old mining history of Minturn is really cool and we included pieces of our cabin up in Gypsum Creek in the renovation." The wood he references serves as both decorative and structural elements in the kitchen and main floor bath. Those textural touches throughout are truly what make the space so homey. The kitchen itself now serves as an open-concept keystone between the entryway lower staircase and the two living spaces. Clearly, some serious walls were removed and a designer must have done the space, right?

Alex corrects me with a shake of his head. "I did most everything myself actually. I didn't use a general contractor and I coordinated all the layout. I had a guy I played hockey with who was a do-it-all guy who helped with the serious stuff. We sourced everything locally, which, of course, was more expensive but it's worth it. We got a lot of help from Beth, too (Adi's mother and the founder of Slifer Designs) — we ran a lot of ideas by her."

The roof was one of the first things to go and Jeff Sokup from S&H Roofing installed the new metal roof before interior construction began. The cabinets and kitchen were designed by New Box in Edwards. "The kitchen was a complete gut and several walls were removed. They completed the design and the visualization process and we were really happy with the result." The countertops throughout the home were done by Valley Stone; Ruggs Benedict provided all the carpets in the bedrooms. And the beautiful dark gray floors and white quartz stone wall accents were bought and installed by Alex and his friends.



Renovation and Construction in Singletree



Are you thinking of making changes to the exterior of your home or landscape? The Design Review Committee (DRC) meets on the first and third Thursday of each month at 8:30 AM. Complete submittals are due the Thursday prior to the meeting by Noon. You can find DRC applications online at www.singletreetoday.com/design-review.



It's warm outside and if you are thinking of installing air conditioning please remember all mechanical equipment and air conditioning condensers installed on the exterior of the home require DRC approval prior to installation. The equipment shall be installed within the setbacks and as close to the house as possible. Equipment shall be screened from view with evergreen landscaping.



Remember that all outdoor construction and other construction activities are limited to the time period between 7 AM and 7 PM during the week, between 8 AM and 5 PM on Saturdays and are prohibited on Sundays and holidays.



Considering a new garage door, windows, front door, paint colors, etc.? Remember, these changes must be submitted to the Design Review Committee prior to work commencing. Many changes may be staff reviewed and there is no application fee. When in doubt, please submit an application for review. It will save you time and effort in the long run!





an EPIC JOURNEY HOME

Lai White Joins The National Geographic Mekong River Expedition To Return To Her Native Vietnam

Time stood still! I was beyond excited! Words could not describe the feeling I had: after almost fifty years, I was going home – to my beloved country, Vietnam. I had been asked to speak to approximately 40 guests who were participating in the National Geographic Mekong River Expedition which sailed from Cambodia to Vietnam. It was an offer I could not refuse.

My heart was full of joy and my mind was overwhelmed with questions and wonders. Would I be able to find my relatives who survived after the war and who would I meet that would remember me? I knew it would be an epic journey home.

I departed Denver for Siem Reap, Cambodia, in the early morning on January 5. On the first day following our arrival, our group was led on the first of many learning trips, this one to the Angkor Wat area. What a sight to be seen! The temples of Angkor Wat are very unique – truly one of a kind. It is no surprise these temples were named one of the Wonders of the World.

After our tour, we settled at Banteay Samre temple for a private dinner complete with Cambodian music and

dance. It was enthralling. We then left Siem Reap and drove east toward the Mekong River to embark the Jahan, our home for the next several nights, at the town of Kampong Cham.

Along the Mekong River, we visited the Wat Hanchey – a large temple complex of the pre-Angkor Chenta period. We continued our expedition with a visit to Koh Dach, which has a lively and active monastery and also an extensive community of silk weavers.

The rich Mekong River that runs through small towns and villages is the life source for the people. Next, we learned to ride the oxcarts thru Kampong Tralach, where pottery is still made of traditional methods. We tasted the palm sugar from palm trees that the locals have made for thousands of years.

The expedition continued. The next day we arrived at Phnom Penh, the capital of Cambodia. It is situated at the confluence of the Mekong, Bassac and Tonle Sap Rivers. We began with a cyclo (bicycle taxi) ride to the magnificent Royal Palace and Silver Pagoda, home and place of worship to Cambodia's kings. We visited the "killing fields" and left with a heavy heart.

As we sailed along the Mekong, we saw life along the river with traditional ships, barges and freighters plying the waterway. We ate Cambodian signature dishes that were prepared by the great chefs of Jahan. We then crossed the border into Vietnam and there I was, home at last.



The markets of Tan Chau

There were too numerous experiences to mention. It would take an entire novel. I will just be brief in sharing the highlights of my time in my home country. We visited Tan Chau, the most interesting market with an astonishing variety of tropical fruits, vegetables and other goods. We saw floating markets and floating fish farms on the river. We stopped at Sadec/Cai Be, a hamlet where the villagers grow, process and fashion water hyacinths into floor mats and rattan baskets – an authentic slice of life in the Mekong Delta. We visited a rice "factory" where varieties of rice-based candies are made; rice husks are reused as fuel for the cooking and ash is sold to farmers for use as fertilizer.

We disembarked the Jahan in My Tho and visited the Vinh Trang Pagoda, built in 1850. The bus took us to Saigon, Vietnam's greatest commercial center, now known as Ho Chi Minh City. We saw the Grand exteriors of the 1911 Opera House, the former City Hall and the Notre Dame Cathedral. We visited the General Post Office, designed by the French architect Gustave Eiffel, who created the Eiffel Tower in Paris.

In the morning, we saw some of Saigon's historic landmarks, which include a rich selection of fine colonial buildings. We continued to the Reunification Palace, headquarters of the South Vietnamese Government during the Vietnam War. We squeezed into the Cu Chi Tunnels, part of the huge network of tunnels used by the Viet Cong during the war.

I left the National Geographic Group and traveled on my own for an extended visit to my home village in Vinh; to Hanoi, the capital of the North; to Quang Tri, where Project Renew was born to help with removing bombs after the war ended. We stopped in Hue to see where our king and queen had lived for centuries; I felt such a tremendous sense of loss as I contemplated a glorious time in our history. My favorite place is Dalat, up in the high mountains where the weather was perfect. Dalat exports the most beautiful orchids in the whole wide world and has started to produce very good wines. I was so impressed and dreamed of a day when I can stay in Dalat for a long time.

If you are considering a visit to Vietnam, please feel free to call me for insight and advice. And don't worry about missing McDonald's and Starbucks! These two American institutions are easily found in Saigon. I am so proud of what my people have accomplished after many years of war-torn sorrows; I would love to share more with you.

Yawning kids and tweenagers lounge in sweatshirts next to the empty pool at the Sonnenalp Club in the wee hours in the morning. Moms and dads with their coffee wave goodbye and head off to their day, and Coach Adele bellows: "Okay guys! We have some drills today to start off with in teams. Let's get in the water!" These kids have a sweaty morning ahead of them, starting off with 8 lengths of warm-up swim followed by multiple drills. The Vail Swim School has three swim meets scheduled this summer, representing the Sonnenalp Club Sharks, with the first meet the upcoming Friday at the Avon Recreation Center.

Adele has been coaching the School for the past four years, and loves every minute of it. "I took over the swimming school last year; I love that the kids are so excited when they accomplish their goals or do better than they did last season," she quips in between reminders to each group of kids when to go during the drill. Children must be able to swim two lengths of the pool and know the basic strokes in order to be on the team, "but if they don't know, they can take the Swim Prep Class," Adele finishes. Vail Swim School offers 6 training sessions each week and members are required to attend 4 of those practices per week.

Laughter ripples from the pool as the kids are entertained by each other's antics, goggles are lost and feet hit each other's hands. Adele and her assistants stand at the end of the pool with a white board outlining the drills for the day; and while some swimmers appear very serious about their training, others are just there to have fun with their friends.

The kids all have their individual reasons for joining and staying on the team. "I love that I can be free in the pool!" says Piper Sassi. Maggie Mae Rotheberg explains "I love Vail Swim because we play games; Adele makes swimming fun". And little sister Hazel simply says "I love Vail Swim because I love Adele!"








