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
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Singletree residents Tom and Sandy Gaylord personify the spirit of the Vail Valley. Although both came to the sport of sking and to the Valley later in life, they serve as shining models for how to live an active life of sport, sociability and service. Both Tom and Sandy originally came to the Valley through their association with the Over the Hill Gang (OTHG), the legendary ski group founded at Copper Mountain in 1976 for skiers aged 50+.

Neither Tom nor Sandy had much skiing experience before joining OTHG. Although Tom grew up in Massachusetts near the Bousquet Mountain ski resort, he had little interest in skiing as a young man and later was too busy working in Chicago in the landscaping business until his children pressured him in to take them to learn the sport at a ski are anear Lake Geneva, Wisconsin.

to learn the sport at a ski area near I 8 Inside Singletree • October 2018 Sandys experience was similar. She also grew up near a ski area in Harrisburg-Pennsylvania, but had little interest in skiing at that time; instead, she focused on figure skating at the Hershey Ice Rink and on nearby ponds during the winter months. Her experience on the ice proved extremely helpful when she discovered skiing in her 50s, finding herself single and an empty nester. By chance, she was renting from a woman who was a ski instructor at the Roundtop Mountain Resort and was gently pressured into taking lessons from her and to make her proud.

Both Sandy and Tom grew to love the sport and signed up for an OTHG trip to Vail in 1983. It was this trip that marked the beginning of their great adventure. Sandy, who was proud of her fashion sense, complimented Tom on how well his ski sweater suited his coloring, and things moved forward, albeit slowly, from there. It wasn't exactly love-at-first-sight, however— they initially connected only once a year on the annual OTHG trip to Vail. The attraction must certainly have been there, though, because when Sandy decided to move from Pennsylvania to Colorado in the spring of 1990, Tom followed shortly thereafter.

Sandy first lived in Breckenridge, whereas Tom settled in Eagle Vail. However, they both worked at Pepis. Sandy, with her strong interest in fishion, worked in the ladies' boutique and Tom worked in the ski shop. With that proximity and with the aid of many shared lunch breaks, their romance moved into high gear. By the winter of 1990, they moved together to the Sun Ridge (now called Liftview). Condominiums in Avon and lived there until 1996 when it had doubled in price, which allowed them to move to their current home in the Stonehaven Condominiums in Singletree.

The team of Tom and Sandy would quickly become a force to be reckoned with in the Vail Valley. Each of them brought a wealth of experience with them when the relocated. Sandy had carried a degree in physical education at Skidmore College and with many years of teaching experience in both private and public schools in Pennsylvania. Sports had always been a part of her life. Tom, a graduate of Syracuse with a degree in Environmental Science and Forestry, used his training to work with the U.S. Forest Service in Oregon and with five crews in Arizona before relocating to Chicago to start a land-scaping business. He also founded a Chicago chapter of the OTHG. Sandy's lowe of sport and Tom's love of the outdoors became the drivins forces behind the teath their lives would take in Vail.

Both Tom and Sandy rapidly became active participants in local life. Tom volunteered as a Redeoat (now "National Ski Patrol Mountain Hosts") on Vali Mountain while working fulltime for the Vali Reversation Department at the Nature Center near Ford Park for 20 years. While with the Nature Center, he started the hiking program, which continues to this day, and worked to stage the very first Rubber Duck Race as a fundraiser for that organization. The Duck Race was later turned over to the Vali Rotary Club, which is still using the finish-line funnel that he built. Meanwhile, Sandy continued her cerei in retail fashion moving from Pepi's to Scotch on the Rockies and finally retiring from the Golden Bear after working the Beaver Creek store with friend and manager Joan Packer.

Upon retirement, Tom's involvement with the Nature Center expanded as he worked with Kim Langmaid to merge the Nature Center into the Walking Mountains Science Center and served on its first Board of Directors. Not one to be left behind, Sandy also became involved with the Nature Center and Walking Mountains and was their #1 volunteer. She especially enjoyed using the skills she developed as an elementary school teacher by working with the younger students in such activities as Kids' Day Camps, fly fishing school and beaver pond tours. They are particularly proud to report that every elementary school student in Eagle County had been to the Nature Center by the end of third grade. Years ago, Tom, along with Ken Neubecker, was also instrumental in starting the River Clean Up Volunteers, which is now in its 20th year.










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Eagle County BMX is a local race track that is located in Eagle and hosts a race every Monday night throughout the season, along with several other statewide competitions. We are very fortunate to have such a great venue in our backyard. Along with the races, they offer practice every Thursday and camps throughout the summer to allow anyone to come out and work on their skills.

Now 7, Jay Holton (116) has been racing BMX since he was 4 years old and intends to continue for many years. He enthusiastically proclaims, "My favorite thing about BMX is getting big air and learning from our coaches Bjorn and Jonah." Big brother, Knox (137), is 11 years old and recently won his 10th first place trophy, moving him into the Intermediate category. He echoes his younger brother's enthusiasm, "I love BMX because it pushes me to get better on my bike."

So what all does Eagle County BMX entail? The races consist of three heats, two qualifying rounds and the MAINS. The racers are split up by age and ability which are called 'motos,' and there are three rounds per moto. The first two qualifying rounds are raced to determine who makes it to the third race, the "MAINS," where the overall winners are determined.

There are races all over the state ever week that allow the riders to earn points for their overall standing for the year and even qualify for a "State Plate." Each competitor has a race plate, and the number is determined by their overall rank for every male or female competitor, no matter the age, and the State Plates are awarded for the top 10 in the state within their age and ability category.

When asked about his favorite thing about BMX, Zander Coleman (142), age 6 and in his second year, wraps it up in a nutshell: "Going fast and having fun with my friends!" Zander's BMX career is already off to a great start with a win at his opening race this year, which was the inaugural year of the Go Pro BMX event, and he has since gone on to win three additional local races. Zander is super excited to get his 10 wins to move on to the Intermediate level!

Eagle County BMX is a great way for all kids to get out and have some fun. They all support each other throughout the ages and classes. It's great to see the older ones helping and inspiring the younger ones to go out and have fun and become better riders. Tucker Larson (568) is already enjoying all aspects of BMX as he just gets into the program at age 4. "Um, I really like the riding and trying out the helmet that covers my face. We also go to Moe's!" It's all good with Tucker!

Palau, Micromesia. Many have never heard of this beautiful, island aution. Located several hundred miles was of the Philippines, Palau is a mesca of marine biodiversity with which five other island paradises can compete. I was privileged to join Casey and Emily Zwaan, owners of Beaver Divers, who organized an amazing adventure to this island paradise in April 2017. The long journey proved to be worth the effect, as this was an incredible SCUBA diving adventure that I will never furget.

Why travel thousands of miles and several days to go SCUIIA diving? The answers are simple, Palau is rich in World War II history and only attracts roughly 136,000 tourists per year. Fighting the crowds that plague other tourist destinations is happily missing. The native people of Palau are friendly, the beaches are sparkling and pristine, the rock islands surrounding Palau are measurering, and the underwater net system is alive and well.

Our adventure began at the Palau Facific Resort, a little casis nestled in lush tropical gardens with a gorgeous private beach out its back door. This luxury, world-class resort offers an array of accommodations from beachfront rooms, garden rooms and the newly built over water bunglatws. With un array of activities right at the resort, aur group kept busy anorheding, paddle-hoarding, playing tennis, and SCUBA diving and just plain relaxing before we boarded our dive vessel, the Rock Islands Aggressor. Our time at the Palau Pacific Resort was meant to unwind and recover from jet-lag before our busy week of diving five dives a day on the liveaboard dive beast.

After three days of relaxing on the beach, we boarded the Rock Islands Aggressor. Everyone was excited to start diving, as this was the main purpose of our adventure. We were ready to explore the WWII wrecks, channels that are hume to hige schools of Jacks, barraeuda, sharks, rays and a variety of tropical fish, coral and sponges. We were all prepared for strong current, which brings important nutrients to the coral reef. Armed with reef hooks, we were prepared to hook ourselves into the reef and watch the action effortlessly, and without harming the reef.

Where many places have suffered from environmental sabutage, including pullution and overfishing. Palan has established an incredible conservation effort. Bottom trawling, for example, was banned to protect the sex floor from commercial fishermen who use giant nets and clean out everything in their path. Palau has created a shark sanctuary, banning shark fishing and finning, thereby protecting shark species that inhabit its waters, as well as protecting dolphins and ruys.

It is very encouraging that a marine ecosystem which suffered an El Nino that wreaked havee back in the late 1990s, through strict conservation, has actually revived and is healthler than ever. Palau has made a remarkable comeback, and is an example to other nations that assured destruction of the world's coral reefs is not a certain conclusion.

Palau is one of the few places in the world where you can still encounter large populations of a variety of sharks on almost every dive. We commonly encountered Grey Reef sharks, which are harmless to humans, but are very agile and are a dangerous predator for smaller fish. We also encountered the smaller Whitetip Reef shark, which are also harmless to humans but can be very curious. Never did we feel in any danger, but experienced great awe at the majesty and power of these ocean predators that are so crucial to the health of the reef system.





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



















Ever wonder what it really takes to build, maintain and run the race course for the Birds of Prey World Cup Ski Races every year at Beaver Creek? Ask a member of the Talon Crew and you will learn it takes both physical strength and mental tenacity to bear the elements of ice and cold on steep slopes. Why do it? Because at the end of the day, the experience proves to be tremendously rewarding on many levels.

The Talon Crew consists of approximately 350 men and women who dedicate time, energy and financial resources to join a team of volunteers who strive to produce the best FIS Men's World Cup Ski Race in the world. About 80% of the crew are loyal veterans who return every year to share in the work and camaraderie over a $10~{\rm day}$ period beginning Thanksgiving weekend. Volunteers are required to participate at least four of the $10~{\rm work}$ days to earn the coveted jacket, hat and lift ticket. Typical days begin at 6:30 a.m. and finish at 4:00 p.m. or later, depending on how long they socialize at the Beer Tent.

As the largest workforce crew involved with the event, the Talon Crew, in conjunction with the Beaver Creek Race Department, is responsible for all aspects of the race on course. Days 1 - 4 are devoted to physically building the course, which entails installing the safety features to protect the athletes, including the A net, the slip skirt, the B net, the airbags and the flat stock. Additionally, the Talon Crew assists with literally watering the course to

prepare a race-ready surface. Ironically, from that point on, the crew hopes it doesn't snow because in the race world, you don't have to shovel sunshine!

Days 5 - 7 are dress rehearsal days, AKA training days which allow time for the athletes to inspect the course first hand and actually run the course in preparation for the Downhill races During this time, the crew moves into course maintenance mode: getting snow out of the way, slipping the course and getting the snow surface to consistently resemble an NHL ice rink, which can get a little exciting in the face of cold, snow and steep.

on Friday, the course is built and everything is in place. The race officials reset the gates for each specific event (Super G, Downhill and Giant Slalom), and with each move, the Talon Crew needs to move the snow and reposition equipment to accommodate the newly set course. And finally, they tear down each course once

Sounds like a lot of work! So what is compelling about the opportunity to join the Talon Crew? Crew Chief Steve Holden answers the question: "What it takes is someone who has a passion for the sport and enjoys the camaraderie of the event. It's not about the jacket; it's about performing at your best and working in a World Cup environment. This is the premier sporting event in Colorado.



Thank You, Knob Hill Volunteers!


