
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
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


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




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Hello Singletree Residents!


hunting, biking, golf and spending precious time with our family.

Takes to the Stage for "The Laramie Project"

Last fall, VMS presented "The Laramie Project", a show that was both academically and emotionally challenging. In October 1998, Matthew Shepard, a gay University of Wyoming student became a victim of a terrible hate crime that left the town of Laramie, Wyoming, and the entire country reeling for answers. In the months following Matthew's death, members of the Tectonic Theatre Project traveled to Laramie and conducted over two hundred interviews with the residents. Their work became a reading, and eventually a play, "The Laramie Project", using these interviews, as well as journal entries from members of the company.

The characters in the play are based on real people, using real, often rough and homophobic language. The play authentically conveys as well the opinions on all sides of the conversation without additional commentary. Combining these artistic components makes for an extremely moving and emotional experience for the audience and cast members alike.

This tragic story marked a legislative turning point in the United States with the institution of the Federal Hate Crime Prevention Act of 2009. Further, the recent twentieth anniversary of Matthew's death offers a "teachable moment" for the students of VMS to examine the issues of inclusion, diversity, the changing norms of our times, and the historic significance of this unfortunate event.

In an interview with Quinn Kelley, a 10th grader at Vail Mountain School and actress in the show, she shares what it meant for her to be part of this important project. "Late last year, I participated in a show called "The Laramie Project" at my school. Now, this

story is not particularly light or uplifting as I thought our first play of the year may be. In fact, it was brutally honest, real, and painful; but I am so happy that I was able to be a part of it and touch as many people as I did with this emotional, true narrative. One man emailed me how touched he was by our performance and how well high school students were able to portray such a hard topic. Matthew was a gay university student who was brutally beaten, tied to a fence, and left to die by two fellow Laramie boys named Aaron McKinney and Russell Henderson. This hate crime and death left so many in pain, yet, so many more came together to protest this kind of hatred."

Quinn continues, "I questioned a lot why my director, Tony Bender, would choose to do such a dark show. His response was extremely touching. He said, 'When I first approached Mr. Imperi, the Head of School, and the school board, I told them what the play was about, and they said, 'Do you really think this is a lesson we need to learn?' And I said yes, this is a lesson everyone needs to learn; and all agreed, then do it'."

"One of the specific characters, Sherry Johnson, was a part I had to play which took me out of my comfort zone from traditional roles I had played in the past. Her ideas were not those that I believed in, and a lot of the cast went through some of the same

challenges," Quinn shares honestly. "How do you play a character who you can't relate to at all? But we did it and with great pride. I was so proud to be a part of this performance and to share this powerful message with others. We had an amazing cast and each member put their heart into the performance."

Other Singletree residents that participated in 'The Laramie Project' included Mel McCalley and Rachel Snyder. In total, 13 students played up to 11 roles each and every student delivered an outstanding performance.

Vail Mountain School will be showcasing the play "Chicago" on April 5, 6, and 7. Come see Quinn Kelley as Roxie Hart and all these other tremendous kids as they take on this critically acclaimed musical in the spring!





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
When you walk into the living room at 110 Lariat Road, you are immediately captivated by the soaring windows, the views across the valley and the sun drenched warmth of the room. Upon first seeing the house in 2005, George and Genevieve Peirce were wowed by those views and delighted with the location on the Lariat Road cul de sac. Fast forward 13 years, the couple is ecstatic about their 'new' home, having taken their time in considering how exactly to go about updating the house to not only replace the dated finishes and improve the floor plan, but to truly create a home to fit their lifestyle.


As the chef in the house, George was initially concerned that the small kitchen would not accommodate his love of cooking. George chuckles as he confirms that it really was the stove that started it all; the previous range had no hood and it really only heated to one temperature: boiling. Not ideal for the cook. So if you need a new stove, you really need an entirely new kitchen!

Additionally, the couple knew that the south facing windows were ultimately in need of replacement. While already about 15 feet high, the windows were created by multiple smaller panes. The windows had not worn well over time and it was becoming

increasingly difficult to maintain them. Not surprisingly, replacing the wall of windows and increasing the size to reach the nearly 18 feet ceiling was no minor undertaking. Structural engineering and reinforcement involved installing a lot of steel and beams. George and Genevieve enthusiastically agree that the new windows were well worth the effort and expense as the result

opened up the views even more to the Eagle River below, the top of Arrowhead, and even to the tip of the New York Mountain.





folding glass door that accordions open to the south facing deck. The deck was updated to a clean and simple look by eliminating bulky posts and installing horizontal iron railings to minimize any view obstructions. The result is additional living space that brings the outdoors in... be it January or June!

Formerly indeed small and dark, the kitchen today is a light and bright gathering spot where family and friends converge around a gleaming white quartz island which is complemented by adjacent countertops in a subtle shade of gray and all tied together with bright white cabinets and a stacked stone backsplash. Genevieve is quick to interject that she wanted a "white white" kitchen but credits Ken Jones from Thurston Kitchen and Bath, and Tim Trout, their contractor, for helping them complete the vision.

Ken drew a number of potential designs - down to the detail of where to put the silverware - which proved to be hugely helpful for George and Genevieve in their process. The couple openly admit to their challenge in making decisions, but knew they were on the right track when they each, independently, selected the same quartz pattern for the countertop! From there, the pieces started to fall into place, even though they laugh together as they recall many nerve wracking decisions coming down to the last minute.

Tim Trout was extraordinarily helpful with many design ideas and particularly with respect to the fireplace: at 7 feet high, the massive fireplace is a breathtaking work of stone with a custom wood mantel which serves as the focal point for the living room. second only to the views.

In the end, there was a lot more to the project than just appliances and windows as there were many opportunities to modify the house to better meet the Peirce's needs. So, like many remodels, the scope 'creeped' to include a few modifications here and there: take 4 feet out of the garage, relocate a powder room, create a proper mud room and install a wall of kitchen storage. Additionally, the look of the late 80's was modernized by replacing dark finishes with white, removing crown molding, installing match-


ing trim, upgrading wooden stair






railings to iron, creating an upstairs landing and reworking the master bath with a steam shower and updated tile.

Genevieve and George did an impeccable job of blending their personal taste with the look of a light and bright mountain home. With roots on the east coast, it was important to the couple that they not lose sight of that influence in their background. After much deliberation and 8 months of construction, they could not be more pleased with the outcome. A new stove, new windows, and a whole lot more make home for the Peirce family a very happy place to be!





TON STOFFEL SETS AN EXAMPLE FOR THE N E I G H B O R H O O D


The Good Neighbor of the Month Award goes to... Tom Stoffel of Rawhide Road!








And your favorite book? In 3rd and 4th grade, I liked the Harry Potter series. I read the Maze Runner series and I like the Spy School series.


What's your favorite thing about living in Singletree? I like how I am so close to all my friends.

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Sometimes friendships sprout up where you least expect them. Several of your neighbors in Singletree either met or became closer friends after traveling miles and miles away on Habitat for Humanity International build trips.

Nancy Broder was volunteering for Habitat for Humanity at Fox Hollow in Edwards every Thursday for two years and heard about a build trip to Paraguay from the construction manager. She went home and told her husband, Ben, about it and they were both game to fly down to South America to help others. That was in 2010 and since then, the Broders have been on two more Habitat for Humanity International (HFHI) builds in Nepal and El Salvador.

"For me it was a life changing experience. To be able to travel across the world, help build a home for such a wonderful family, and work with people from here who are now lifelong friends is just amazing," Nancy says.

Brian Judge first took a Habitat for Humanity International Build trip to Paraguay in 2009. It was the first time the local Habitat for Humanity chapter took a team on an international build. That experience stuck with Brian and six years later, he and his girlfriend, Sarah Siegel, both of Singletree, decided to travel to El Salvador on another build.

"Sarah and I talk about that trip all the time. The entire International Build experience from preparing here in Vail to meeting our El Salvadorian team







members is just remarkable, the process is so well planned and is very exciting," says Brian.

The Habitat for Humanity International Builds have been a big part of Tricia Swenson's past decade. "I went on my first build in 2010 to Paraguay, followed by a trip to Malawi, Africa in 2014 and a build trip to El Salvador in 2015," Tricia shares. "All three trips gave me a different perspective about travel. I got to experience the people and culture in a different way than just going on a vacation."

When a team arrives on site, they never know what stage the house will be in. Some houses are being built literally from the ground up. Volunteers may be tasked with digging trenches or working with unusual materials. "Nepal was an assault on the senses," recalls Nancy, who went on a large HFHI build with hundreds of volunteers from around the world. "Here, the houses were made of brick, cow dung and hay. There was lots of traffic, cows in streets, mobs of people. Such a totally different culture from anything we've experienced," she continues. Even though the work days were long, she said the drive from Kathmandu to the job site was worth it. "We could see glimpses of Everest on the bus ride," Nancy marvels.

Traveling to areas in need brings the hardships up close. "In Malawi, we were building a home for a woman whose husband died and she had a few kids of her own and was taking care of a few more. Their house was tiny and the thatched roof was dilapidated. During the rainy season, one of the daughters said that trying to do her homework was hard because everything would get wet," Tricia remembers. "They had no beds and their mom, who was around my age but looked about 15-20 years older, slept on a burlap bag on the floor. It really hit me when I thought about how old she was and the hardships she and her family endured."

But through it all, there is also an amazing display of hope. "One of our favorite parts of the trip itself was meeting and interacting with the children of the community and the promise of a better life for them," Brain says warmly. "Their pure innocence, spirit and joy just lit up our days while they visited our build site. Their interest to learn more about us and our team's desire to share will never be forgotten."

"You do more than build a home on these trips, you share a lot with the people you are shoulder to shoulder with digging foundations or laving rows and rows of bricks," Tricia concludes. "You build lifelong friendships."



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
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
