




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Wine, it has been said, is "alive and well," and to state the obvious, so are we. Because of that, we dream, we grow, we love, we experience life, and we hopefully meet others who share these same thoughts. We were lucky enough to have done just that in 2009 when we first met Steve Steese and Jayme Henderson, who were then the sommeliers at Shanahan's Steakhouse in Denver. We were sitting in the lounge and had the wine list open, searching for our favorite wine at the time, Opus One. Steve saw us perusing the list and came to sit with us. He asked casually, "Are you set on that wine, or are you feeling adventurous?"

We hit it off immediately and talked about food and wine at length. This is how it all began.

From then on, we made Shanahan's our go-to spot in Denver whenever we were there. The more we learned from Steve and Jayme, the more we desired to learn: rainfall in Napa, soils in Burgundy, or the various chateaux of Bordeaux. It didn't seem to matter - any topic regarding wine was in their wheelhouse. The stories, details, and passion about the topics that they passed on to us kept us enthralled each and every time we were there.

As time passed, we attended many private wine dinners with many notable vintners, and one of our most frequent comments to Steve and Jayme was, "You two are more excited about this wine than the actual winemakers who made it!" 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
The Imperial Palace Museum in Petropolis After years of trepidation about traveling to Brazil (the crime, the favelas, the poverty, the corruption), we decided it was time to go when we learned that Azamara Club Cruises (our favorite cruise line) was visiting Rio de Janeiro during Carnaval and would stay in port for three full days. This would allow us to experience Rio and Carnaval without the hassle and risk of having to navigate the city on our own. An added bonus was that the cruise departed from Buenos Aires, giving us the opportunity of visiting that city and Iguazu Falls, which was also on our bucket list.

The Iguazu Falls, on the border between Argentina province and Brazil, make up the largest waterfall system in the world. The falls are most easily reached via a two-hour direct flight from Buenos Aires. The area consists of 275 falls stretching for almost two miles. Two-thirds of the falls are in Argentina, the most dramatic of which is the "Devil's Throat," at 270 feet high and 1/7 miles wide. It's definitely worth spending two days to visit both sides: the Argentinian for the drama of being up close to the thundering waters and the Brazilian to enjoy the panoramic views of the vast cataracts. The area surrounding is a largely uninhabited jungle, and the climate is steamy and often rainy, which isn't a problem because you are guaranteed to get wet at the falls. The town of Puerto Iguazu is relatively uninteresting; most visitors stay at one of several resort properties tucked away in the bush near the Iguazu River.

There could hardly be a greater contrast to the majesty of Iguazu Falls than the chaos of Carnaval in Rio de Janeiro. It is the biggest carnival in the world, with two million people per day on the streets. The highlight of Carnaval is a two-day spectacle performed in the Sambadrome, the permanent open-ended stadium designed by the famous Brazilian architect, Oscar Niemeyer. The parade takes place over two days, from 10 p.m. until nearly 6 the next morning. On each of the two days, the top 12 samba schools parade to compete for the top prize, six schools per evening. We were fortunate to have reserved seats on the second day, when the top six schools paraded. Each school is comprised of around 4000(!) participants and is given 70 minutes to parade through the Sambadrome.

Samba schools are actually guilds and are associated with a particular town or neighborhood, often in shanty towns. These guilds promote and support the Afro-Brazilian heritage of dance and drumming and spend months designing a theme, composing a song reflecting the theme, building the floats and rehearsing. The preparations, especially producing the many different costumes, provide work for thousands of the poorest in Brazilian society. The participants are graded on their theme, their song, their dancers, their costumes and their floats and are penalized if they do not complete the parade within the allotted time. The parade overwhelms all five senses with colors, singing and drumming (we were given earplugs and needed to wear them!), crowds, heat, and delicious foods. It was a peak experience, for sure, but there was still more to see.

Carnaval isn't just about the Sambadrome parades. The real action takes place in the streets throughout the city and goes on for days. Called *blocos*, these street parties take place anywhere there is an open square. There can be more than 300 blocos taking place at any given point in time, and they can pop up at any time, filled with music, dancing, and general merriment. We were fortunate to locate a *bloco* very near where we were docked and spent a delightful time with revelers in various states of dress and sobriety. I asked one of our guides about the proper attire for Carnaval, and his reply was "as little as possible." These photos prove that he was correct! Never were we concerned about our safety, but at times our sanity may have been in question.

Because we were in Rio for three days, we were also able to visit the famous statue of Christ the Redeemer and the iconic Sugarloaf Mountain that overlooks the harbor and Copacabana Beach. Both were very crowded during Carnaval but were not to be missed. Finally, we discovered another destination of which we were ignorant until our trip: the royal city of Petropolis. Who knew that Brazil had kings? Portuguese King Juan fled from Napoleon to Brazil, and his descendants founded Petropolis, only 35 miles from Rio in a beautiful mountainous area. It served as the summer residence of the Brazilian emperors and aristocrats in the 19th century. Emperor Pedro the Second (Juan's grandson) ordered the construction of


the Imperial Palace and other government and related buildings in 1843 and, because he hired German immigrants to do the construction, the city still has a large German population.

It was in Petropolis that Peter's daughter Isabel signed the decree emancipating all slaves while acting as regent in her father's absence. The decree, called the "Golden Law," is displayed in Petropolis at the Imperial Museum of Brazil, which was once the royal palace. The museum has been restored with original furnishings and artifacts from the royal period and is a must-see. Because of its German connection, Petropolis is also home to the oldest brewery in Brazil, another must-see, and hosts an annual "Bauernfest." It was also a center for gambling until the sport was outlawed in 1946, and the beautiful casino has been converted to condominiums. Don't miss Petropolis if you visit Rio. Its beautiful architecture and fascinating history make for an interesting side trip. We only wish we had more than a day to visit this charming city.


Our one regret is that we had not visited Brazil sooner, and we wouldn't hesitate to return to this vibrant and fascinating destination.

She bolted out, and of course, I panicked, but by the time she reached the end of the street, I knew she was mine as she looked back and ran as fast as she could back to her new home.


The one "project" that stuck out the most to the creative couple was Eleven Buckboard. The previous homeowner had planted so many trees around the property that you could barely see through to the amazing views. The home that was unoccupied for some time was in real disrepair yet had a mostly wide-open floor plan including a main floor master with potential for a walk out to grade. All musts for the young and active couple.

On the day the property closed, the demolition crew went straight to work. "It looked like a bomb went off on day one," Sarah recalls. The new design created by Judge and Associates





Architects and Planners was one of an open family floor plan; it created new bedroom suites for the two teenage kids, an enlarged master bedroom and bath, a central family/chef's kitchen and the installation of major large windows to that stunning view. The new modern exterior



of cedar and stucco, complete with concrete and landscaped patios as well, was created to bring that outside in. The home was to reflect the fresh and new start for Sarah and Brian.

Sarah spent the next 8 months recreating the family home with the sub-contractors. She managed the daily challenges of finalizing finishes and coordinating the custom cabinetry. She took the entire house down to the studs and replaced all the mechanical and electrical systems. Although the project was more than they initially expected, like so many remodel/renovations, the process itself wasn't. It built a strong foundation for the family and has created new and exciting opportunities for the future.

The inside was designed around a beautiful 1950's antique pool table and the dual living and family

rooms with the dining and kitchen all in one large open space, making it perfect for entertaining and family game night. The home hosted a Singletree get together of almost 125 people and felt ready to take on an even larger event. The kids have held pre-prom get togethers and team dinners for many of their classmates and Sarah and Brian host a weekly Thursday get together in the summer.
