





Marcelle was completing her degree in Biology while I was initiating a master's and doctoral degree in Neurobiology at Laval University in Quebec City. Afterward, we moved to Montreal for me to complete my first post-doctoral research fellowship at McGill University and my second fellowship at the University of Pittsburgh in Pennsylvania, USA. We moved to Pittsburgh in 1994 for a period of one year and we ended up staying in Pittsburgh for a period of 20 years. I went through the rank of assistant, associate, and full-time professor in the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at the University of Pittsburgh during that period.

Marcelle was working with me as a laboratory technician but after a while she moved in the direction of the fashion industry as a personal stylist. Marcelle started to work at Nordstrom and became a top seller and received multiple awards for her work and often said, this was her second career. During our time at the University of Pittsburgh, we often had faculty dinners and on many occasions, numerous faculty members jokingly told me to keep my wife away from their wives because they always ended up spending money the next day at Nordstrom.

We were blessed with two sons, Matthieu and Charles. Matt was born in Quebec City in 1990 while Charles was born in Pittsburgh in 1999. Matthieu obtained his bachelor's degree (Forensic Science), at Edinboro University in Erie, Pennsylvania while Charles is pursuing his bachelor's degree in biomedical science at Texas A&M in College Station, Texas.







In 2015, my entire family moved to Houston, Texas, where I was appointed as a distinguished Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery at the University of Texas medical school. I was working 50% of my time in Houston and the other 50% here in Vail at the Steadman Philippon

Research Institute (SPRI) and The Steadman Clinic (TSC). At SPRI, I was appointed as the Chief Scientific Officer (CSO) and the Director of the newly established regenerative medicine program. In fact, the phone call that came in 2014 from Dr. Marc Philippon, MD, the Managing Partner of SPRI and TSC, asking me if I knew someone who would be interested in directing the research program at SPRI, was one of the most important phone calls of my life. Of course, I suggested myself as a potential CSO and Director of Research. The rest is history. Marcelle was working in the fashion industry and as a personal stylist at Nordstrom and Saks Fifth Avenue in Houston.

In 2019, we all moved here full time to Vail where I work at SPRI and TSC within the Vail Health system. I am currently running the research program at SPRI which includes over 50 people and most of them are residents of Singletree. Our research program is currently funded by the

National Institutes of Health (NIH) and the Department of Defense (DoD). We are currently performing clinical trials on novel therapeutics for not only musculoskeletal disease but also for cardiovascular disease and even cancer.

We purchased our new house over here in Singletree at 1130 June Creek Road on April 15, 2019, and we soon fell in love with the neighborhood. The easy access to numerous bike trails and the proximity to ski slopes has made our transition from Texas to Colorado extremely easy. In fact, Marcelle and I were both born and raised in small villages surrounded by mountains so for us, this is like coming back to our origin. The Huard family loves hockey and our favorite hockey team when we grew up was the Quebec Nordiques - who became the Colorado Avalanche in 1995. We were heartbroken when our team left Quebec City, but we fell in love again with our former hockey team (now



the Colorado Avalanche), and we usually say that we followed our favorite hockey team from Quebec all the way to Colorado.

I also established another research laboratory in Fort Collins, and in collaboration with Colorado State University (CSU), to conduct animal research (pre-clinical models). My eldest son, Matt, emerged as our lead technician in the animal laboratory. My youngest son, Charles, spent the last two summers as a research intern in the regenerative medicine laboratory at SPRI. In fact, Charles will be joining us here in Colorado after graduating at Texas A&M. I am excited that I am soon going to have my two sons working with me and as a father, I consider it a blessing.

Marcelle is now employed at Axel's in Vail, where she works as a personal stylist, but she has also developed another passion for art. She says that art is her third career that began in our Singletree house where she transformed the basement into a studio; she often spends countless hours even after her workday at Axel's to create original paintings and innovative pieces of art.

Although I developed a real passion for medical research along with my sons, Marcelle developed her own passion for art and fashion.

I like to share some personal anecdotes about our family. When I first told Marcelle in 1994 that we were moving to Pittsburgh just for one year and consequently, she did not have to learn English, we eventually stayed there for more than 20 years. Hence, she does not believe me now, when I say we will be staying in Colorado until I retire and return to Canada afterward. Her reply is, "You love skiing too much and you fell in love with your former hockey team, therefore



we are going to retire together right here in Colorado." I think she likes Colorado as well.

Usually, we always spend our vacation in Canada visiting our family and friends, though my vacation is extremely limited. I always promise Marcelle that we will go on vacation in Florida spending days on the beach, but we never have time to do it. I recently told her that we will start going for vacation in Florida and she says, "Well, you are going to tie our vacation with one of your meetings and after your meeting is complete, you will say, let's go back to Colorado for the rest of our vacation." She clearly knows me.

I have also told Marcelle that when we get settled into life, we will welcome a little dog to our family. But, with my extensive traveling and her work, we have never had an opportunity to get a little dog. It turns out that our house in Singletree has a little door for pets and now I hope she will believe me when I say, "Now is the time to get a dog!" But I am not sure if she really believes me. Time will reveal that, but I have a strong feeling that







a new member will be added to the Huards' family in 2021.

The Huard family is all bilingual and can speak French as their native tongue. So, don't be

surprised if you stop by and say hi to us, your first reaction might be, is this English? After a while, you will get accustomed to our accent!

Finally, 2020 has been a challenging year but I never stopped working and went to my office every single day during the pandemic. I was strongly motivated to identify potential therapeutic approaches to alleviate COVID-19 symptoms, especially for our elderly people. In 2021, I am even more motivated by the accomplishments that we reached during the unprecedented days in 2020.

We have been truly fortunate to find our home right here in Singletree where we can create a wonderful life in the Valley enjoying what Colorado has to offer in terms of mountains, river, which make it an outstanding place to enjoy life in nature. The best quote I have ever heard regarding Colorado is "In Colorado, we don't only think outside of the box, we think outside period."




If you could change one rule, what would it

Go To School; Do the Work

Words to Live By for My Future Pathways

Singletree resident Ron Davis has been involved in providing educational opportunities for foster children and first-generation high school students since founding the Guardian Scholars program at Cal State Fullerton in Fullerton, California in 1998. The Guardian Scholars partners with public colleges and universities to provide scholarships, mentoring, and life coaching to disadvantaged high school students with a goal of graduating those students from college free of debt. Since its founding, Guardian Scholars has grown to be affiliated with 70 colleges and universities.

In 2003, Ron moved to the Valley and brought the concept with him, eager to offer local foster kids and first-generation students the same opportunities.

To his (pleasant) surprise, he found that there were actually no foster care kids that fit the mission of Guardian Scholars, but there was a tremendous need among first-generation students, kids that would be first in their family to attend college. Rather than change the mission of Guardian Scholars to fit our situation, but still wanting a program that could help disadvantaged youth, Ron started an entirely new program in 2019, which he dubbed My Future Pathways focusing exclusively on first-generation students.

He teamed up with Bratzo Horruitiner and brought him on as the executive director. Bratzo is an inspiring leader with 18 years of experience in creative and positive youth development, sports coaching, and youth-centered program design. Bratzo brings a level of passion, experience, wisdom, humor, and skill that imbues My Future Pathways with an atmosphere that screams success.

So who, specifically, are the kids that My Future Pathways helps and how, precisely, do they help? Well, 80% of their youth are Latino and a majority of their parents were not born in the US and, statistically, they fall far below national educational figures. Nationally, 26% of college students that start college graduate with a degree in six years or less. Among local first-generation youth, that number drops to 7%, largely because of costs as well as a lack of social and emotional support.

Although they are eligible for the Pell grants, a federal program that provides grants to students with financial need as well as other Colorado programs that also provide college grants, these programs by no means cover all the costs of a modern college degree. That's

where both Guardian Scholars and My Future Pathways come in. Using relationships developed with Colorado Mountain College and Colorado Mesa University and programming developed over the past 20 years, Ron and Bratzo have seen the graduation rates of local kids in the program rise to an incredible 90%, and each and every one of those kids graduate with no college loan debt to burden their lives.

So, how does My Future Pathways achieve those incredible numbers? Well, as you may have guessed, it's not all about money, for merely providing money without a strong support system would never accomplish what Guardian Scholars and My Future Pathways has achieved. My Future Pathways youth are identified while they are in middle school and followed through high school, into college and beyond.

They use a three-pronged approach to give the kids what they need: social support through mentoring, educational support through individual tutoring, and physical support through organized sports programs. Those aspects are coupled with instilling an entrepreneurial spirit that stresses owning your problems and, therefore, the solutions to their problems. All of this is distilled down to six words that the kids live by – go to school; do the work.

All of these programs and principles are delivered at their youth center. At the center, the kids can study, eat, or simply hang out in a safe, family-oriented environment.

Ron Davis explained that they have no fundraisers and no campaigns. When potential donors see the results, they open their wallets. Education was their pathway and they easily and enthusiastically embrace the mission.

My Future Pathways' ultimate goal is to see its graduates gain seats on town boards, school boards, and not for profit boards in their communities and to begin to debunk the notion that not everyone can realize the goal of a college degree due to financial hardship. These future leaders are walking among us now and they will not be ignored.


But it's not just the youth that are involved in My Future Pathways. Their families are as well. Parents are asked to buy into the mission and allow a student to balance school and work in order that they achieve the kind of educational success that is the ultimate goal of the program. In addition to striving for a successful, debt-free college education, participation in the program often continues after graduation. Many of the participants continue to be involved as mentors to younger students ensuring a continuity of service and success.

Perhaps one of the most unique features of My Future Pathways is its website. Not because of what it contains, but of what it does not. In this writer's experience, every not for profit website has one thing in common: a DONATE NOW button. Oftentimes this button is front and center on the landing page, hard to miss. Not only does their website, **myfuturepathways.org**, not have this button displayed on their landing page, they do not have one at all!



Life will always give us challenges, and how we respond to the individual challenges is part of the makeup of what makes us who we believe that we are, and who the rest of the world believes that we are. as Willy Wonka, Pirates of Penzance ... Living up here, it's a huge honor to be able to perform on a stage of the caliber. It's something I looked forward to doing all of the time."

Nicole was both singing soprano in choir and dancing, but her true passion was ballet. "My favorite is Adagio." Nicole sighs wistfully. "It's about beautiful leg extensions and delicate arms, and me being a pretty flexible person I really liked to master those moves. I really got to feel each movement as they came, vs. just rushed dancing. There was a lot of balance too, I like finding your balance and finding a point to watch on the stage." When Nicole hit middle school, she realized that she wanted to take the risk and pursue her passion for dance.

was admitted in 6th Grade. Maria was so committed to her daughter's dream that they rented the house





school to high school and was a Dance major. "Going to Denver was definitely a shock," Nicole states. "It's such a small town here; being in Denver opened my eyes to a bigger world. Part of me loved it and was also intimidated by it." After a few years of dealing with the pressure of 5 hour a day practice plus full academics, Nicole decided to attend a smaller private high school that offered more of a balance. "I continued to dance, and the school had a really nice musical theatre program where they put on three performances a year." Her favorite moment there was when she was cast as Audrey in Little Shop of Horrors. Despite the fun, Nicole really wanted to try to raise the level of her performance and was searching for the next step.

A fun fact about the Gustafsons is that Maria is Swedish, and the two of them would travel back and forth to Sweden quite often to visit family and friends. Her cousin called and said there's a new school here for musicians and singers, and Nicole should come and audition for a spot. Nicole was very honored that her talents gain her acceptance and applied for her Student Visa. Since Maria had to give up her Swedish citizenship for her American status years earlier, both ladies had to apply; but the dream was not meant to be. "Because it was 2016, there were a massive amount of refugees flooding into Sweden at the time and my Visa kept getting pushed back," Nicole laments. "We sold the house in Denver, and all of the furniture, and were all packed up. But we couldn't get there."

Not about to give up, Nicole decided to take the wait with maturity and aplomb. She was ready to reach for the stars. The family decided to move to Los Angeles, where Nicole had secured an agent for commercial auditions. "We moved to El Segundo, which is an incredible little neighborhood with a great high school," says Nicole. "It was an incredible experience, because the Choir Director, Giana Summers, does so much for the kids there in terms of getting them to perform on a global scale." Her favorite memory was the trip to Paris, where the choir performed at innumerable museums and public places, culminating at a performance inside Notre Dame. "She managed to get us, this little choir from California, to be the first American Choir to sing within Notre Dame," Nicole muses.

When her time in Sweden was up, Nicole decided it was time for college. She attended The Young Americans College of Performing Arts, intending to make dance her primary goal and path in life. NATALIA'S PASSION SPARKS A COTTAGE CRAFT BUSINESS

In Russia, it was my pleasure to teach World Literature and the Russian language for over 20 years. It was my destiny that I married Michael, a Colorado resident, who was the reason for my move to the USA. It is not easy to start your life from scratch when you are over 40. In Russia, I had a successful career, here I had to start something new. From my youth, I had always had a hobby of baking cakes and cookies, and of painting also; however, while I was teaching there was less time for this. Here, I again found time to develop my creativity. I thought, it would be great to bake again and perhaps make a little money doing what I love. My daughter, Lisa, shares my love of European and American pastry creations while also working with me in this cottage craft business.

Thus, in the summer of 2020, we started our small business. We graduated from courses on painting gingerbread cookies and learned the secrets of mastering old Russian recipes for this pastry. Although Great Britain is considered the birthplace of this sweetness, gingerbreads have been known in Russia since the ninth century from which they were called "honey bread" - eaten only on major holidays. Since the 15th century, gingerbread has become an integral part of Russian national culture and is present in all spheres of life: everyday life, festivals and fairs, and folklore.











The word "praynic," the Russian name of gingerbread, comes from the word "spicy." Initially, the process of making gingerbread presupposed the addition of various aromatic spices such as ginger, cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, coriander. We also use natural honey in the dough. The cooking technology and highly specialized ingredients allow the gingerbread to be stored for about six months. But the test has a drawback; in a dry high-altitude climate, gingerbread quickly becomes hard. Luckily, we have a secret on how to deal with this dryness. If you put the cookies overnight in a closed container with a glass of water and an apple cut into wedges, the gingerbread cookies will be soft in the morning.

After completing the Cottage Food Safety courses and receiving the Colorado State University Extension certification, we began





to manufacture our products to sell at the Knapp Ranch Needle Market. For Christmas, we prepared gift boxes with assorted cookies from different European countries and the USA, as well as hand-painted gingerbread houses. We use not only the original centuries-old recipes for springerle,





gingerbread, and European cookies adapted to the American taste, but also invent our own recipes, utilizing old books of the last century.

What surprised us is that our products are loved by the people of Colorado. As the Manager of Knapp Ranch Cary Hogan said, "I'm so happy that your cookies are such a hit! Thank you so much and it is our privilege to sell your marvelous works of art!"

Now, we are looking for more places to sell our products. We also accept individ-


