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

DORIS DEWTON'S LEGACY

of Making a Difference

singletree tribute

ingletree lost Doris Dewton, one of its "transformational leaders," to cancer in July. We use the word "transformational" because Doris initiated or participated in most of the significant decisions that made Singletree the unique and desirable community it has become.

Doris and her late husband, Dick Gretz, moved to Singletree in 1994, when our community was about 40% built out and struggling with a variety of issues resulting in part from the developer's exit. Doris and Dick built their home on Saddle overlooking the 11th fairway. From that location, Doris could imagine how Singletree's development, anchored by the Sonnenalp Golf Course, could become a premier residential community in the mid valley.

In 1994, there was no homeowners association and little enforcement of Design Review Guidelines. Doris worked with a small group to revise the existing Covenants and Declarations and after the finalization of those revisions, the Singletree Property Owners Association (SPOA) was formed with Doris being elected as the first President of SPOA, a position she held for six years. Doris and SPOA members worked closely with the Berry Creek Metropolitan District (BCMD) Board in guiding the development and construction of our Community Center, a facility that has served Singletree's needs for over 25 years.

Doris, Chuck Powers, and their colleague, April Milam, at the BCMD, are personally responsible for the wider streets throughout Singletree which provide all of us walking space without impeding traffic. Doris, Chuck, and April approached the County Commissioners when the repaving was to occur in the early 2000s and obtained their agreement to support the widening of our streets by three feet on each shoulder. This alone helped transform Singletree as our residents felt safer walking and hiking, thus allowing residents to meet many of their neighbors they otherwise would not have known.

Doris had the vision and was instrumental in the formation of the SPOA Beautification Committee which interviewed four national firms, ultimately selecting EDAW, a world-class landscape firm that provided a multi-year plan to landscape our primary traffic



corners and the entrances to Singletree. Of course, there were many other Singletree residents involved, but Doris attended and participated in every meeting from the inception of the Committee over the next several years.

Doris also served as Chair of the BCMD and was appointed as the Metropolitan District's representative on the Upper Eagle Regional Water Authority (also becoming Chairperson of that Board), where she looked after our community's water rights and service while also working diligently to guard water rights for the entire Vail Valley.

One could continue: the construction of the bike path from the entrance of Singletree past the Community Center; urging cooperation with the County Commissioners and CDOT with SPOA's and BCMD's "shovel ready" project at the entrance of Singletree which resulted in the roundabout at our western entrance; supporting Peter Bergh's proposal for the installation of an alley of trees along both sides of Berry Creek Road; her work as a Trustee of Colorado Mountain College which has helped many Singletree youths and adults in continuing their educations; not to mention her work on the Castle Peak Senior Care Community, which has become a home for several of Singletree's residents while recovering from an injury or as an elder care facility.

In short, Doris was indeed a "transformational" force for Singletree as it has fully developed since 1994. We can all give thanks for our collective good fortune to have had Doris as a community leader, friend, neighbor, and visionary. She will be greatly missed.

evident that Ms. Plain embodies each and every one of those pieces. "I'm so excited and honored to win this award. I've worked really hard in my career and it's incredibly rewarding to be recognized as Golf Professional of the Year."

Having grown up in South Bend, IN, Alice was exposed to golf at a young age, and as she would say, "I was the last hope within the family

to pick up the sport." Her father intentionally introduced her and her three other siblings to lifelong sports, and while Alice admitted to playing more soccer while growing up, she always came back to

golf because it meant spending time with her dad. When asked who was an influential role model for her, she is quick to share the relationship she had with her father, George Plain, as he became a good friend and mentor while they spent a lot of time on the course.

Growing up as a member at South Bend Country Club, Alice remembers a conversation she had with the PGA Head Professional at the time, John Guyton, who echoed

her dad's philosophy of the importance of lifelong sports. "You can make a career out of this sport," he said, and that always stuck with me.

Entering her 25th year with the Colorado Section, Alice can admit that the challenges she faced while trying to play golf as a female in a maledominated industry prepared her for her career today. She wasn't allowed to play on her high school golf team as they didn't have a women's team at the time. It wasn't until Alice organized a meeting with the President of Hanover College and the roster of the men's golf team that she was allowed to play competitively at a collegiate level.

"They (the members of the men's team) went to bat for me. It was huge - I wasn't alone in my fight, and they wanted me to be a part of the team. It set the

stage for me. They knew I could compete, and it gave me confidence on the course and in life to know that I could compete in a

man's world." After two seasons with the men's team, Plain transferred to Oklahoma State University, where she helped lead the women's golf team to finish third in the 1989 National Championship.

Following graduation, Plain moved to Colorado to embrace the true beauty of The

Centennial State and all it had to offer: golf and skiing, both of which she loved dearly. When Alice was working for Mike Steiner, the PGA Head Professional of Singletree Golf (today the Sonnenalp Club), the light bulb went off and she found herself enrolling in the PGA Apprentice (now Associate) Program. She immediately recognized her connection to teaching during her

> first winter in Colorado - she taught skiing at Vail Resorts and was quick to see how what she was doing on the snow could translate to the fairways.

As the Director of Golf at Vail Golf Club, Alice wears many hats, but one of her favorite roles is the opportunity to mentor future PGA Professionals. "It helps us as an industry," she shared enthusiastically. "You have to challenge them, and you have to teach them. It's important to take the time to spend with them to expose them to everything we do on and off the golf course."

It's clear that Alice's leadership has made a lasting impact and impression on the Club and her peers. Trey Johnson, PGA Assistant Professional at Vail Golf Club, can attest: "She gives you the space and operation to make it your own while providing guidance along the way. She's always great about checking in along the way." Nathan Mead, PGA Head Professional at Vail Golf Club,

reiterated that through her leadership style, she has created a culture that allows for freedom, yet "she always has our backs — to the end, even to a fault. She supports us through and through, and you never feel alone with something or trapped in a box."

That's something Alice has continued to strive for at Vail Golf Club. George Hart, PGA Assistant Professional,

was quick to share that Alice "puts all of her staff in situations to succeed." The culture, impact, and environment she has created during her time is something she would like to be remembered for, as she sees their team, in her words, "as a family. We all chip in to help each other. It doesn't matter what your title is, we're in this together".

A true testament to Alice's leadership was how she and her fellow peers handled the 2020 COVID pandemic. Ms. Plain stepped up to the plate without being asked and led the "Eagle County Golf Council" through the navigation of how golf could be played safely through

uncharted waters.

"We were able to agree all together, which was huge. It was important to be on the same page through all of this, and it was even better that we had the support of the Colorado Section as well." Alice and four of her colleagues

met with Eagle

County Health Officials regularly to determine the safest way for golfers to enjoy the sport while continuing to stay in compliance with CDC guidelines. At one point, Alice received a phone call from Health Officials informing her that five members of her staff

needed to be placed in a 10-day quarantine. "Our staff didn't skip a beat, and they never once complained," Alice recalls. "We had four members of our staff running golf operations for 10 days, and we were completely booked for those 10 days. Our guests didn't notice that we were so short-staffed, and all I could think of was how the culture we've created has prepared us for times like these. This is how we function."

While some might say that 2020 wasn't ideal with all the challenges it brought, Alice found light in the darkness that was 2020. Seven years ago, Alice met a young man by the name of Heivan Garcia, while playing hockey, as he worked at the Dobson Ice Arena in Vail through the Vail Recreation District. "He had such a great personality, he was a soccer player – he won the 2012 State Soccer tournament with Battle Mountain High School, but he had never played golf!" So Alice took it upon herself to introduce him to the world of golf and set him up with clubs, a bag, and, of course, her expertise in the game. As they became friends over the years, Alice learned that he was here on a resident card and didn't have his citizenship.

So Alice did what she does best. "Through working here, I met a retired attorney who was in town to play a few rounds of golf! He was able to connect me with an immigration attorney in Denver." The entire process for Heivan extended over the course of two years, and last September, he obtained his citizenship in a swearing-in ceremony in front of the Colorado National Monument in

Grand Junction. "It was one of the most rewarding experiences of my life – so much so that Heivan and I want to start a non-profit that can help others obtain their citizenship." Alice deems this as her "retirement project" and hopes to have the opportunity to help others in The Valley like Heivan.

The power of golf can often be underestimated or forgotten, but when we meet PGA Professionals such as Alice, we are quickly reminded how incredibly rewarding, powerful, and impactful the sport and industry can be. "She's a role model for everyone – for the industry, Vail Golf Club, and future members of the PGA. She truly is a shining example of a PGA Professional."

Alice would like to give special thanks to all who have helped her get to where she is today. She would like to especially thank Ann Pitts – her Coach at Oklahoma State — "for giving me an opportunity to play and compete on the OSU Women's Golf Team."

time that that would only worsen his symptoms. Again, Jimmie being Jimmie, he refused to accept that, so he founded The Jimmie Heuga Center for Multiple Sclerosis in 1984 in the Vail Valley with the express mission of improving the lives of people living with MS through physical activity, goal setting, and motivation.

And it worked! So well in fact that today, the program of treating the whole person through exercise and activity that Jimmie pioneered in 1984 is now the standard for MS care worldwide.

Fast forward to 2010 when the Heuga Center changed its name, but not its mission, to Can Do Multiple Sclerosis. Over the years, the Can Do MS group has expanded its reach from the Vail Valley to a now nationwide network of over 100 health-care professionals offering virtual and in-person education, coaching, and support to help families living with MS thrive. Just last year, over 77,000 people were impacted through Can Do MS programs on exercise, nutrition, symptom management, and motivation.

To fully understand the Can Do Multiple Sclerosis organization, some historical context is necessary. The 1964 men's Olympic ski team was made up of athletes who would go on to become legends in the sport. Buddy Werner, Bill Marlot, Billy Kidd, and Jimmie Heuga formed the nucleus of the squad, and Kidd and Heuga would become the first two Americans in history to win Olympic medals in alpine skiing at the games held in Innsbruck, Austria, that year. Kidd would win Silver and Heuga would win Bronze in Slalom, and both went on to further success in the 1966 World Championships and the 1970 Winter Olympics.

Not long after this triumph, Jimmie started experiencing vision problems and numbness. In 1970, he was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis at just 26 years old and the peak of his skiing career. But Jimmie being Jimmie, was not about to give in to MS without a fight. Sadly, in the '70s there was not much help available to either motivate or help anyone diagnosed with MS. In fact, the opposite was true. His doctors advised Jimmie to avoid exercise or any physical activity as it was felt at the

I spoke recently with Singletree residents Laura Allen, the Can-Do MS Associate Director of Programs, and Connie and Bill Welch, volunteers and participants in the annual Man Of

The Cliff event, which benefits Can Do MS. Man Of The Cliff is a unique fundraising event that began in Red Cliff in 2009. It combines classic Highland Games events such as the caber toss and the keg toss with lumberjack and lumberjill competitions, including ax throwing, speed chopping, and two-person buck sawing. Add archery, spear throwing, and beer stein carrying to the list of contests, and you have an event with wide appeal, unique



opportunities, and a guaranteed good time for participants and spectators alike.

Connie and Bill have been participating in Man Of The Cliff since 2011 when the event was still held in Red Cliff and benefited First Descents. First Descents provides life-changing outdoor adventures for young adults impacted by cancer and other serious health conditions. In 2014, the event moved to Nottingham Park in Avon, and Can Do MS became the beneficiary in 2019. Connie and Bill made the switch as well. Today these two amazing mountain-skilled athletes happily don their flannel shirts, Carharts, and knit beanies each fall and continue to dominate their age groups in the event. It is important to note that all the Man Of The Cliff events have both men's and







women's divisions, so whether it's tossing the caber or an ax, there are no gender barriers at all.

You can compete as an individual or team of four for \$88 per person, and winners are determined by totaling up points earned in each event. If you can't put your hands on an ax, a caber, a spear, or a keg, don't despair; Can Do MS will provide all the hardware you need. So, if you want to find out what it feels like to compete in flannel, go to www.manofthecliff.com and click on the SIGN-UP button. Admission to the event as a spectator is free, but the good folks at Can Do MS would really appreciate your \$10 donation.

This year's event will take place on October 9 from 8:00 am – 7:00 pm at Nottingham Park in Avon. There will be craft brews available as well as local food trucks galore.

Since its inception, Man Of The Cliff has raised over \$150,000 for local charities, including Can Do MS. 100% of proceeds at this year's event will go directly to helping those with MS lead active and productive lives based on principles and programs developed almost 40 years ago by a Valley resident and remarkable athlete who was determined to not let MS rob him of the life and activities he so enjoyed.

Where are you from originally and how did you land in the Vail Valley?

Case in point, in March 2020 the market was down 37% due to the pandemic, and on the flip side, until mid-July of 2021, it came back 97.6% (that's astounding). So with that comes a whole new array of market momentum in specific sectors and a landslide of ever changing conditions as the climate shifts through an economic recovery.

Start young.


Can you tell us about your family?
















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AND THE WINE COUNTRY with Kirk Smick

love to visit Sonoma the way I used to love to visit Napa. Napa has become very commercialized, particularly on weekends, and in the fall, it is far too busy for me. Sonoma, on the other hand, is the way Napa was 20 years ago. The roads are less traveled and everyone has a more "laid back" attitude. Oh sure, *Morimoto Napa* and *The French Laundry* (the most difficult restaurant reservation in America) both reside in Napa but for my money *The Girl and the Fig* in Sonoma and *Sante Restaurant* at the Sonoma Mission Inn are nearly as enjoyable.

Because the two famous wine districts are situated adjacent to each other, it is possible to criss-cross the mountain range separating them and visit wineries in each district. For the rookie wine country visitor, I offer this piece of advice: make your dinner restaurant reservations early and don't overdo it. I wouldn't visit more than 4-5 wineries in one day and take time to enjoy each winery and learn a little about each varietal that you taste.

California Hwy 101 is the main road through the Sonoma Valley. I typically divide my wine visits into two major geographic groups (lower Sonoma and upper Sonoma). Headquarters for the lower Sonoma region would be the city Sonoma itself, and from there, one can easily visit the sparkling wine house of Gloria Ferrer. And just next door, try Schug's Pinot Noir. After a relaxing lunch at Maya in Sonoma (Mayan food, of course), head out of town in the opposite direction and visit some of my very favorite wineries.

The cave at Deerfield Ranch is a must-see, and you should definitely allow an hour for that stop. In the same area are several wonderful possibilities: Ledson, with its castle-like appearance; Chateau St. Jean; Kenwood; and finally, the tram tour of Benzinger Family wine estate. Enjoy dinner that evening at *The Girl and the Fig*. My secret tip for this area is Robert Hunter Winery. This destination is not shown on most wine maps but the view and tour of their botanical gardens are wonderful. I



wouldn't miss it. A reservation is a must and you will want to have a mixed case of their wines sent to your home. You won't find RHW wines in any wine store or restaurant, there just aren't enough.

Now, let's head northwest. The town of Healdsburg is our camping out location for this end of the valley. Healdsburg is a little more sophisticated than Sonoma but just as relaxed. Splurge a little and stay at the Healdsburg Hotel. It is a very contemporary facility located smack in the middle of the town. *Spoonbar*, attached to the very modern H2 Hotel is very attractive and one of my favorites.

OK, time to get wine tasting. There are so many to choose from, I hesitate to suggest. Ferrari Carano is the most attractive and a good starting point. Rafanelli (not for looks, but incredible wines), Kendall Jackson for a great tour to really understand the winemaking process, and Rochioli for another small but amazing winery. Finally, the best winery at the end of the day is the small little farm tucked in the hills that you discover on your own. Keep me posted on your discoveries!

The food is just as important as the wine when it comes to visiting Wine Country. This is one of my favorite recipes: Pappardelle with Duck Ragu, courtesy of Mario Batali. If you love to spend a relaxing



Sunday afternoon in the kitchen enjoying a glass of wine and cooking up a storm, this is it.

Paymardelle With Duck Ragu

NGREDIENTS

- A supply of pappardelle noodles (hopefully fresh but not necessary)
- · 4 duck legs and thighs, skin removed
- 4 Tbsp. virgin olive oil
- 1 medium Spanish onion, chopped into ¼" dice
- · 1 medium carrot, peeled and finely chopped
- · 2 cloves garlic, peeled and thinly sliced
- 1 stalk celery, chopped into ¼" dice
- 8 oz. red wine (preferably what you are going to drink with the meal)
- * 1 pound canned to matoes (I prefer San Marzano when I can get them)
- 1 cup chicken stock
- · 1 oz. dried Porcini mushrooms

DIRECTIONS:

Wash duck legs and remove all fat. Pat dry. In a thick bottom casserole or Dutch oven, heat olive oil until smoking. Add duck legs and cook until brown on all sides then remove, about 10-12



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minutes. Add onion, carrot, garlic, and celery and cook until softened, about 7-9 minutes. Add wine, tomatoes, chicken stock, and dried mushrooms and bring to a boil. Add duck legs and return to a boil, lower heat, cover and allow to simmer for 1 hour. Remove duck legs and allow to cool. Pull all meat off the bones and return to the pot without the bones. Simmer uncovered for 30 minutes or until quite thick. Season with salt and pepper and set aside.

In a large pot, bring 6 quarts of water to boil and add 2 Tbsp. salt. Boil the pappardelle until cooked al dente and drain well. Place hot pappardelle into a pan with 2 cups of the ragu and toss well. Pour into serving bowls and serve immediately. I sometimes add just a little finely chopped Italian parsley for looks and freshly grated parmesan for flavor.

For the wine pairing, let's enjoy the 2010 Carneros Pinot Noir from Schug. This Sonoma favorite of mine is made in the tradition of the finest red Burgundies of France. When I retired from the SECO Board of Directors, I was presented with a magnum autographed by the winemaker. This is a complex wine with a rich bouquet of cherries, berries, and hints of spicy new oak. It has flavors reminiscent of black cherry, currant, and strawberry, followed by a rich, spicy texture and a long silky finish. Bon appetit!

So what is your superpower? I'm a great fighter and I used to be in the Justice League and Avengers.


If you could have a superpower, what would it be? Mostly invisibility.



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
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
