


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Singletree's MAN of the SEA



ne year was 1964, and Ian Koblick was enrolled in a post-graduate course at the Stanford University Marine Lab. Ian, who had been diving since 1960, was criticized by his professor for collecting samples by diving rather than the more scientifically accepted method of combing the beach. Ian was struck dumb by his professor's reaction, thinking how can we possibly understand the oceans if we never venture farther into them than the coastline!

From that moment on, Ian Koblick, who divides his time between Singletree and Key Largo, FL, was determined to make it his life's work to not only understand the oceans but to do all he could to advance the cause of protecting them. Not only did he want to explore the world's oceans he wanted to live in them. Over the course of his still-active career, Ian has fulfilled all these goals in a lifetime of aquatic advocacy, activism, study, and innovation. His accomplishments are legion, and his contributions immeasurable.

In 1964, Ian and his wife Tonya, also a marine biologist, moved to the Virgin Islands to pursue their dreams of ocean exploration and study. As fate would have it, Ian was in the right place at the right time. The director of the newly formed Caribbean Research Institute was looking for a talented (but affordable) person to build and run the institute's first facility. Ian was that person. He had the skills and was willing to work cheap!

Shortly after the facility was finished, a group of government, military, and corporate leaders came to the Virgin Islands looking for a site to carry out an underwater living project to be known as Tektite, and Ian was asked to host the group. Tektite was to be an advanced underwater habitat designed to house a team of aquanauts conducting research as well as a NASA facility for training astronauts to live and work in a confined, weightless, and difficult environment. Because of Ian's impassioned sales pitch, or, in his words, "Maybe the availability of cheap rum," the site of the new

Caribbean Research Institute facility was chosen for the habitat. In addition to selling the team on the site, Ian applied for and was chosen to be one of the aquanauts who would occupy the new project.

Fast forward a number of years and a number of iterations of the Tektite project, including an allwoman team headed by renowned ocean explorer Dr. Sylvia Earle that occupied Tektite II, and Ian was becoming increasingly frustrated by what he saw as a number of technical shortcomings that plagued the Tektite program, not the least of which was a toilet that refused to do what toilets are supposed to do best.

Because of another serendipitous twist of fate, Ian was approached by the governor of Puerto Rico with an offer to design and build a state-ofthe-art underwater habitat in the island's waters.

He accepted the offer and partnered with John Perry, a successful submarine builder in Florida. The pair went on to build the habitat that they christened La Chalupa. La Chalupa was a fully submersible, yet fully portable facility that had the ability to not only house divers, but house them in water-free rooms. Oh, and the toilet actually worked.

La Chalupa was launched in 1972 and continued to operate as a research facility off the coast of Puerto Rico on the edge of the continental shelf until 1976. The habitat was then moved to the Miami River where it sat idle until 1986 when Ian and his partner bought it and moved it to the seafloor of the Emerald Lagoon in Key Largo Florida, rechristened

it the Jules Undersea Lodge, and opened it to the public as the only underwater hotel in the world. The lodge is still in operation today, and if you have either PADI, NAUI, or SSI dive certification, you are welcome to book your stay! By the way, the Yelp reviews are off the charts.

After a decadeslong career in ocean research, today Ian is dedicating 100% of

his efforts to educating and training a new generation of aquanauts committed to combating the ravages of climate change on the world's oceans and protecting a resource without which life on earth would be unsustainable.

Ian is especially proud of the Marine Resource Development Foundation that he created in 1970 to develop La Chalupa. In 1976 he moved the foundation from Puerto Rico to Broward County Florida and began to focus on undersea education and research. From 1985 until now, he has operated the foundation's marine education facility in Key Largo, which has housed and taught up to 5,000 students a year the importance of ocean conservation and management. About a year ago, he partnered with renowned Florida artist Guy Harvey who also had a foundation committed to protecting the ocean and the species that depend on its health for survival. Guy Harvey's artistic career has focused on his uniquely dramatic depictions of sea life, notably sharks, so starting his foundation, the Ocean Research Foundation, was a natural extension of his artistic milieu.

The goal of the Koblick/Harvey partnership is to develop an immersive educational program known as MarineLab that combines classroom

instruction with practical undersea experiences with the ultimate goal of creating a new cadre of Ocean Ambassadors committed and prepared to battle climate change and save the world's oceans. The Koblick/Harvey team is raising funds to provide scholarships to train teachers and support deserving students. Many of the teachers will be from Caribbean Island nations and will go back to

their homes and participate in country-wide marine conservations programs coordinated by the team.

In three years, their goal is to have 20 percent of the world's youth connected to the MarineLab program either on-site in Florida or virtually via the World Wide Web. 
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Bijou Lucas in Her Own Words



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Eager Beavers Work Space is Ready for You!

Allie Decent Offers Entrepreneurs a Reliable Launch Pad



Back in the August of 2018, local Singletree resident and realtor Allie Decent purchased a run-down set of commercial spaces in the heart of Avon, with the intention of converting it to a glittery masterpiece of shared office spaces for local entrepreneurs who wanted to get out of the house. Tired of seeing that there were limited options for nice private offices in a shared space, and far too many of them outdated and masculine in taste, Allie decided to focus on what she herself would want in a co-working space. "I wanted the idea of white, black, chrome, and comfort within the offices," she says. "I wanted the spaces to call out to female entrepreneurs to fill the void I found in our valley; a pretty and safe space for community and growth of all these small women-owned businesses."

With a limited budget and only three months, she and her team of contractors had transformed the place from a convoluted brown mess to an artsy fun set of 7 offices and a conference room. "I really wanted to make the space feel like a home, with black doors and trim and bright white walls," she recalls. "With help from P. Furniture & Design II in Avon, the lighting and furnishings really completed the vision." A private office started as low as \$350/month and included high-speed internet, a conference room, bathrooms, kitchens, and a large printer. "I really wanted to have it all set up for anyone, to make it as easy as possible to be successful."

Committed to keeping costs for budding businesses as low as possible, Allie priced the offices with just enough room to spare for her own bills. "My goal is not to profit from this business, but to bring much-needed revitalization of the Avon downtown and making the path from a kitchen countertop business to a full-fledged office a realized dream for men and women in the Vail Valley."

With so many commercial spaces for lease around Avon, yet none for just small spaces without overhead, Eager Beavers was full within a month of opening. "My leases are not traditional, it's just month-to-month for an office so people can really just try it out and not risk their entire lives over starting a business

Though Allie has a website for her shared office spaces, it's still a little bit of a secret. "You can't really find me online, and my






sign is simply a pin location, but that's on purpose," says Allie. "It's not about Eager Beavers. It's about the small businesses within it. Then they can make a Google location for their customers to find, and their work shines."

From 2018 to early 2020, Allie's plan was working out for those businesses: Green Valley Landscaping, Majestic Cleaning Services, and M.E. Design Studios all shifted within the space to larger offices as they grew in clientele and success.

Like everyone else with a small business in the Valley and around the world, 2020 was a tough year. "Because I am a bare-bones operation without employees, I was able to keep the doors open throughout the pandemic for my businesses. I reduced rent and started pulling out of the business savings just to pay for heat, and I managed to keep everyone in there until August 2020," she says. "Then, when it looked like this wasn't going away anytime soon, people struggled to justify an office outside of their home, so I lost a few in the last half of the year."

Determined to keep the dream alive, Allie just kept plunging into her savings. That struggle was a real eye-opener, and Allie realized that she would have



to pivot and adapt to what businesses wanted and could afford. Local Artist Jami Nix took over the conference room space for her painting, and luckily Allie was able to accommodate her needs and still have a conference space. "It's not like anyone was really holding conferences until a few months ago," she jokes. "But it's nice that Jami can hang her beautiful art and we all appreciate her energy in the space."

Eager Beavers is still open for operation, with two offices available at

the moment of this interview. "I rode through the pandemic and kept the space alive, and so now I know that I can do anything and grow this business model anywhere," says Allie. "I want Eager Beavers to continue to be a space for the little home office growth and a first step, and also as a space for that larger office that needs an Avon satellite."

"Actually, Eager Beavers can become anything and transform for almost any need, and I'm excited to see what 2022 can bring in terms of opportunity and growth."

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


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
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MEET ALANA POLATTY:

Old Edwards Cemetery and Dead End / View from the Edwards Cemetery

osted by the Vail Valley Art Guild, Side by Side is a special exhibit that entails the pairing of a photographer and an artist working on a "common subject matter" of their choice. Here we showcase the work of Melissa Nelson, the painter, and Raymond Bleesz, the photographer.


Raymond's photographic style is to hop in his truck and head out looking for interesting or historic sites around Eagle County and beyond. Once he finds something of interest, he may revisit the site for days to get exactly the right lighting or perspective. He feels that his photo should have something to convey that is perhaps ironic, humorous, stoic, or familiar. He prefers black and white images because they show the strength of his composition and message without the distraction of color. I, on the other hand, love color and can change the lighting or perspective with the stroke of a brush.

A few years ago, I was paired with Raymond as a painter in the Vail Valley Art Guild's Side by Side show. I hopped into his truck and off we went in search of something interesting to photograph and paint. After visiting several places I'd never before seen, or rather noticed, we settled on a view of the Gypsum Gun Club from I-70, a rather odd view of a gun club because it appeared to be a church. Indeed there is a facade of a church in the middle of a gun club — suggesting perhaps the Old West town of Tombstone. Raymond hauled out a 15' ladder to obtain the best angle on the photo and that's what we photographed and painted. My oil painting was later purchased by the former director of the Boulder Museum of Contemporary Art.

This year I suggested that we photograph/paint the small cemetery Raymond had shown me years earlier. Most people do not know it exists — directly across I-70 from Singletree to the west of the charter school. The cemetery originally overlooked the Eagle River to the east and west with tall mountains to the south. Today's views are Beaver Creek's ski runs and I-70. I had wandered amid the neglected graves, most dating from the early 1900s with occupants born in the late 1800s.

Raymond again loaded his 15' ladder onto his truck and off we went. He turned onto a small dirt spur off the paved road to the school and we were back in time amid remains of ancient farm equipment with the sagging cemetery fence ahead. Raymond's photo contains what he calls an old manure spreader and several axles and tires in the foreground with Beaver Creek ski runs visible in the background. If you look closely, you can see a few of the grave markers behind the simple fence.

I titled my painting "Dead End" since it contains the end of the dirt road, the end of the farm equipment, and the end of various

Eagle County souls of all ages. I started by dripping bands of colors down my canvas, then brought the details out of the underpainting, keeping colors I liked and painting over others. I chose to emphasize the grave markers which were picking up the light in the distance.

All art is first about seeing. As you photograph or paint, you notice details that may escape the casual observer. The details you choose to include give meaning and life to your work. So perhaps the remains of this neglected cemetery again sprout life.



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Beware the Challenges of

Baking at Altitude...

Ingrid Dampier Offers Valuable Tips to Assure Success!

I used to bake. Cakes, bread, cookies...then I moved to Colorado. My first major mishap was a few months after we moved into Woodland Park, CO at 8500 ft. elevation. I found the most adorable Easter bunny cake molds at Williams Sonoma, where you bake two halves of a bunny, then glue them together with icing, stand the bunny up, cover with chocolate ganache, and voila — typical chocolate Easter bunny except it's a cake. I even bought the bunny cake mix from Williams Sonoma – so what could go wrong?

Well, the cake batter rose very quickly to an amazing height, and then to my horror, the dough collapsed and spilled out over the cake mold onto the bottom of the oven. So I was left with a hollowed-out bunny – a bunny without any innards. I tried to fill the hole with icing and then glue it together, but the bunny did not have enough physical structure to stand. So I laid it on its side on the cake platter. My grandkids said it was the dead Easter bunny. Devastated. I am including photos here of the perfect bunny – my bunny didn't have a basket, but it was designed to stand up like this – and the molds.







I promptly gave away all my cake pans — and gifted my beautiful-in-law Betsy with the bunny pans. No more family Puffers, studded with either raisins or chocolate chips (or both, each having their own half) – a Sunday tradition growing up.

So I did some research about baking at elevation. The first thing I learned was that elevation means 3,500 ft. to a lot of the baking world. To learn more, I had to dig a lot deeper and consult cooking guides from Colorado State University Extension and New Mexico State University.

This is what I have learned and now apply to my baking endeavors in Edwards, which stands at an altitude of 7,200 ft. These numbers are specific to the 7,200 ft. elevation, which needs to be adjusted for lower or higher elevations. I used these algorithms to adjust the recipe for the apple focaccia for *Sliding Into Fall 2021*. I can see this for Christmas decorated with a wreath of airy greens and cranberries!

- 1. **Increase the flour** called for in your recipe by 5 Tbps. The additional flour helps to slow the rise of your baked good and adds structure. When doing this, keep in mind my structureless bunny.
- 2. Decrease the sugar by 1 Tbsp per cup. As we can all attest, liquids evaporate faster at altitude, so the sugar concentration goes up, resulting not only in overly sweet baked goods, but also the tendency for collapse under the weight of the condensed sugar.

Note: I suggest doing this only if the recipe calls for at least 1 cup. The focaccia recipe only needed 1 Tbsp so I did not decrease by .00625 Tbsp!

3. Increase liquids 3 to 4 Tbsps. It's all about compensating for faster evaporation at altitude to keep things from drying out and crisping up before they can rise (and we are also managing the rate of the rise, so this works hand in hand with that adjustment). Additional liquids can be water, milk, oil, or eggs, depending on your recipe. For the Focaccia, I increased the warm water amount.

4. Decrease the leavening to reduce the amount of rise. At altitude, leavening causes dough to rise more rapidly and then collapse. Remember the poor bunny rising so high that the batter spilt out over the pan.

If using baking powder or baking soda, decrease by 75% If using yeast, decrease by 25%

Note: If less than 1 tsp of baking powder, baking soda, or yeast is required to begin with, I do not decrease it very much.

- 5. Raise the Oven Temperature 15 25°F because of the more rapid evaporation of liquids, you want to bake a bit faster.
- 6. Decrease the baking time by 5 8 minutes per 30 minutes baking time because you are baking at a higher temperature.

I also learned that flours with higher protein content could be better at altitude, but I don't yet understand that piece as to why. A friend suggested using King Arthur's flour, which happily is sold at City Market, so that is an easy fix. I would love to hear about your baking experiences.

Decorated Focaccia Bread At 7,200 Ft.

Makes one 17" x 11" half-sheet pan

Ingredients calculated for 7,200 ft elevation:

2 cups warm wate

Slightly less than I package active dry yeast

1 tablespoon granulated sugar

 $5~{\rm cups}$ plus $3.5~{\rm Tbsp}$ all-purpose flour

1 cup grated apple, excess water removed

tablespoon kosher salt

1 cup extra-virgin olive oil, divided

Decoration suggestions

Assorted apple slices

A few green onions with green stems

Fresh herbs, such as sorrel, thyme, chives, and dill

Dried cranberries

Curly Parsley


Chopped nuts

Flake salt for sprinkling

Directions

- In a small bowl, combine warm water, yeast, and sugar. Set aside for 10 minutes or until yeast is bubbling and aromatic.
- 2. In the large bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a dough hook, combine the flour, grated apple, salt, ½ cup of olive oil, and the yeast mixture. Mix on low speed. Once the dough comes together, continue to mix for 5 minutes on medium speed until the mixture is smooth and soft.
- 3. Transfer dough to a lightly floured surface. Knead by hand 3-4 times. Coat the inside of a bowl with a little olive oil and return the dough to the bowl. Cover with plastic wrap. Let sit in a warm place until doubled in size, about 60 minutes.
- with the remaining ½ cup of olive oil and place the dough in the pan. Press the dough out to the edges. Flip the dough, coat the other side with olive oil, and continue to stretch the dough to fill the pan by pushing your fingers into the dough causing divots or holes.
- 5. Place the pan in a warm place until doubled in size for a second time, about 1 hour.
- 6. Preheat oven to 430°F degrees.
- 7. Decorate the focaccia with any of the items above – or with anything that will represent the occasion.
- 8. Sprinkle with flake salt. Drizzle with olive oil. Bake for about 22 -25 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from oven and let cool. Cu into squares. Serve warm.

It was Christmas break 1962, and my fraternity brother, who was head of the Kansas University Ski Club, asked me to join them for a ski trip to Breckenridge and Vail. I said, "Hey, I'm from Kansas City; I don't ski!" He said he had 11 ladies and four guys on the

trip so far. I said, "Count me in!"

So off we went to the Ski Ball Lodge in Breckenridge for lessons with Ski School Director Trygve Berge at Breck and two days at Vail. At the time, the only lifts open in Vail were gondola 1, chairs 3, 4, and 5, and, of course, Bridge Street. It was the same gig when I returned in 1963.

I moved to Denver in 1965 and bought a season pass to Vail for only \$150. I could have bought a lifetime pass for \$500 but I did not know then if Vail would actually make

it. I often stayed the night at Poor Richards Dorm or Short Swing Dorm on Meadow Drive

for \$10 per night. Of course, I would frequently make it to Donavon's Copper Bar for apres ski on Bridge Street.

Later in 1972, my wife, Linda, and I bought a condo at the Lodge at Lionshead as a second home and then swapped it in 1999 for a townhome in Las Vistas. Singletree then became our permanent home in 2011. Linda and I started our kids, Robinette and Brent, skiing at ages 4 and 6.
