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

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Mike and Laura

When most adults move to the Vail Valley, they do it with a pretty clear plan. Generally, they are familiar with what we have to offer in terms of recreation, housing stock, weather, and all the other variables we all know so well. They make a couple of trips to get the lay of the land and decide on what neighborhood they want to move to and what the current housing market looks like. They engage a local REALTOR® to show them around and narrow their search. They try to determine what sort of housing is within their budget constraints. Then they head back home and put their house on the market. If things go according to the plan, their

house sells, they find a home here that suits them, and they call a mover, pack up, and head this way. Pretty much in that order.

Laura and Mike Kelly certainly qualify as adults, but their plan didn't unfold exactly like that. In fact, to most of us, it would appear that they had no plan at all! But what they did have was an unquenchable desire to live here.

In February of 2021, they moved from Kansas City into Mike's brother's condo in Lionshead, having sold everything: their house, their furnishings, one of their cars, everything. The whole thing sounds more like a 20-something packing some stuff into the back of a battered Toyota and hitting the road with little or no idea where the road will end!

But Laura and Mike are well past 20 something, and they did know that they wanted to be in Singletree. In 2013-14 they had rented a duplex on June Creek Road just to see if they could handle the winter and its many joys and pitfalls. Much to their delight, they found they loved every minute of it, and that spurred the great sell-off and the "don't look back" move. They found a house they loved, bought it (and a whole bunch of furniture), and moved in last fall.

But just because they didn't look back doesn't mean that we can't. Time to rewind.

Laura was born in Mexico, and in 2002, she was working for an international company specializing in industrial safety products based in her hometown of San Luis Potosi. Her job was to open up the American market for the company, and that meant lots of travel between Mexico and the United States. It was a position she was well suited for due to the years she spent here in her youth. When she was 14, her family enrolled her in the Academy of the Sacred Heart in Grand Coteau, LA, with the express goal of English fluency. That plan succeeded spectacularly.

Laura was in Kansas City on a business trip, eating dinner alone at the bar at McCormick and Schmick's, on a Tuesday evening in June of that year. Mike was working at an ad agency on that same Tuesday night when two of his friends tried to talk him into going to O'Dowd's, a neighborhood Irish pub. Mike was reluctant because of his workload, but he was also thirsty and Irish. His caveat, however, was "just two beers."

Because the "just two beers" limit did not apply to his two

friends, they wandered into McCormick and Schmick's for a bit of a warm-up.

They couldn't help but notice Laura at the bar and struck up a conversation. It took some doing, but they talked her into joining them at O'Dowd's, where Mike was patiently waiting, nursing the first of his two beers. The three of

them made the short walk down the street to the pub and strode in. Initially, Mike thought one of his friends had a new girlfriend, but he was soon disabused of that idea. Three hours later, Laura

and Mike left the pub and went their separate ways. The next morning Laura headed back to Mexico, but they did manage to exchange contact information.

Oh, and Mike was left with the pleasant thought that he could "happily marry this girl."

Fast-forward to September 2002, and Laura invited Mike to join her and a girlfriend in Puerto Vallarta for a vacation. Mike had just started his own boutique ad agency and was working harder than ever to get it off the ground, but an invitation from Laura to a short vacation in Mexico was not to be passed up. Well, the beach, the sun, and the atmosphere managed to work

their collective magic, and the relationship was off and running. After eight months of long-distance love, Laura and her friend moved into an apartment in Kansas City. Eventually, Laura and Mike married, and Laura began to hatch her plan for getting them both to Vail.




As a girl, she had been coming

here for years with her family and loved every minute of it. So much so that she dogged Mike mercilessly until he agreed to a visit. Well, the rest, as they say, is history.

Fast-forward again to 2015. Laura had quit her job, Mike retired from his ad gig, and together they founded a small filmmaking company, Films for Humanity, that they still run today. They both saw a need for not-for-profit agencies to develop a way to tell their stories in a more impactful way. With Mike's background in advertising, he knew that a professionally produced, 3 to 5-minute short film was the best way to stir the human spirit, raise awareness, and inspire action. He also knew that most organizations lack the resources to do anything beyond the bare minimum

when it comes to telling their story. With this in mind, he created a unique business model whereby donors can sponsor a short film on behalf of their chosen cause (www.filmsforhumanity.com/ sponsor-a-film).


The concept, coupled with the growth and reach of social media, was a very effective and totally affordable way to get that message to the world.

Films for Humanity employs professional Hollywood types on an as-needed basis to produce some truly memorable short films that admirably serve the not-for-profits that contract with them. Their work goes way beyond a staffer using an aging iPhone to

tell a story. They make movies, albeit short ones, that both tell a story and demonstrate a need. To do both, and to do them well, is a challenge that is rarely met by an amateur. Laura, Mike, and their production team are pros, and it shows in their work.

Since their arrival on Chaparral Road last fall, Laura and Mike have become part of the heartbeat of the neighborhood. Singletree is lucky to have them, as are their clients from all over the country. They are making our neighborhood a lot more fun, and Films for Humanity is making the world a better place.

Mike said about living in Singletree, "We wake up every morning and smile because we are living in a postcard."







Growing up in the beautiful Singletree community and participating in many aspects of the Vail Valley has helped Bret Pilkington grow into the arborist and ecologist he is today. From working in entertainment on Beaver Creek Mountain with Brian Hall and the Vilar Performing Arts Center to running his family-owned business, Colorado Mattress, and eventually finding his passion in arboriculture, Bret has returned to the valley to maintain the beauty in the place he calls home.

While in school at Eagle County Charter Academy and then Battle Mountain High School, Bret lived off June Creek Road, which allowed him to form the friendships that carry on to this day. He can recall playing soccer with his friends in the park and riding bikes back and forth to each others' houses in the days when sleepovers were deemed "not an option on school nights."

"I still get flashbacks when I drive past the basketball courts and playground in the park. I miss those days, but I am happy to see kids taking advantage of the amazing community places we have available," Bret says. One of his favorite memories is playing "Hide and Seek" on the golf course, where he and his friends would run up and hide while his stepdad, Rob Rollins, held back his childhood dog, Rascal. "Upon release, Rascal would take off at a million miles per hour and find each and every one of us, tail wagging with excitement and the biggest smile a dog could muster," Bret recalls fondly. Those friendships and good memories only grew stronger as they moved from elementary to high school.

In addition, the proximity to the high school provided the opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities such as soccer, baseball, track, fencing, playing music after

school in the band room, performing in and even directing plays, and many more. With thanks to Singletree resident Annah Scully, he found his love of theater by helping her with light, sound, and set development for her productions at local venues for many years.

These countless activities helped him earn both local and school scholarships to the University of Colorado Boulder, where he majored in ecology and evolutionary biology with a minor in philosophy. In college, he studied abroad in both Costa Rica and the Galapagos Islands. He further pursued his passion for the arts by working as production and stage crew in the University Theatre. Combining all these experiences, Bret successfully found a new combination of the arts and his personal quest for working toward a more sustainable world with the CU Environmental Center, where he helped put on many events, including job fairs, concerts, and parades.


Bret's ties to the valley were never lost. One summer, he returned home to accept an internship with local nonprofit Walking Mountains

Science Center as a summer naturalist. "I loved showing tourists and science lovers the beauty and science behind this lovely place," he says, looking back. It wasn't all work for Bret in college — he also fell even more in love with his passion for rock climbing, backpacking, and all things outdoors that started as a sapling in his younger years in the valley. This eventually led him to his profession today.

He now works for High Country Forestry as an arborist, ecologist, qualified spray supervisor, and manager, taking care of our urban forest. "Tree climbing and arboriculture allow me to combine all of my favorite things: hard work, climbing, and a deep-rooted love for the natural world." While growing up surrounded by the beauty of nature in the valley spurred his love of the outdoors, moving to Boulder and Denver for a few years helped him see a different urban forest. "In the cities, people are trying to bring nature into the urban setting while here, we are bringing the urban setting into our natural forest, and it's important that we do it correctly," he astutely observes. Through his eyes, watching the valley expand and grow has been both a heartache and a beautiful thing to watch. "While I'm glad we can show so many other people the

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beauty I have been so lucky to experience my whole life, I just hope we can preserve that beauty for generations to come, and that's what I'm here to do!" Bret proudly proclaims.

Bret is excited to start the next chapter of his life in the valley by making old connections stronger and forming new ones. He hopes to show everyone new to the valley what beauty it has to offer and to offer his educated opinion on how they can properly manage, maintain, and grow this urban forest. Returning to the valley, he looks forward to seeing long-lost faces that warm his heart so dearly and spreading his wealth of knowledge to houses and trees he remembers playing under as a child.

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

Vail Club 50 Offers Something for Everyone

Looking to relax and smell the roses as a Green hiker? Or do you like to put a little more giddy-up in your step as a Blue? Craving more vertical and distance challenges as a Blue/Black? Or ready to truly push your limits as a Double Black? Tennis anyone? And for the cycling enthusiast, is it road or mountain biking? Does hand and foot canasta interest you? Simply looking for new social connections? Vail Club 50 offers all this and more.

Founded in 1988 by a small group of locals and incorporated as a social club in 1992, Vail Club 50 (VC50) exists for the sole purpose of organizing and promoting social events and sports-oriented outings for people aged 50-plus. The group is volunteer-based, with a 15-member Board of Directors and a talented cadre of event and sports directors, coordinators, and event organizers — again, all volunteers — who keep the club and all its activities running smoothly.

Over the course of 2017-2019, VC50 held 560 social, sport, and singles events led by 445 volunteer members. In the summer of 2021, the Club staged 31 social events alone with more than 1,000 participants and almost 100 hikes and numerous bike rides. This past winter, 115 volunteer leaders led 36 snowshoe events, 42 alpine skiing events at both Vail and Beaver Creek, 20 ski touring events, 11 uphill ski/skin events, and 22 social events.

The 2022 summer season is HERE, and it promises to be even bigger and better! VC50's calendar is full of exciting sports events. In fact, members can participate in an event almost every day of the week if they so desire. Beginning June 1 and running through September, VC50 offers biking on Mondays and Fridays, hiking on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and tennis on Thursdays.





Hiking is the club's most popular activity, and there are already more than 70 hikes planned — at various levels of difficulty. Additional hikes will be added to the schedule as the season progresses. All this fun also comes with responsibility. As heavy users of U.S. Forest Service trails, VC50 members appreciate the opportunity to give back. To that end, the group designates three days during the summer to partner with the Forest Service to do trail maintenance. Look for members of the group on the Stag Gulch trail with their loppers, rakes, picks, shovels, and saws in tow and smiles on their faces!

VC50 has about 800 members today, including many residents of Singletree as well as diverse individuals from all over the world (literally) who now live in the Eagle River Valley full- or parttime. The club offers members multiple opportunities to meet new people and enjoy an active lifestyle, both indoors and in the amazing outdoor environment in the Eagle River Valley and surrounding Rocky Mountains. Here we highlight the experiences of several Singletree VC50 members:

Linda joined VC50 first when they had a second home in Cordillera, and she would come out alone sometimes while Dave was working full-time and she had a more flexible schedule. 



Ghost Town Allure and Photography

SAINTS JOHN THROUGH THE EYES OF RAYMOND BLEESZ IN 1968

Explorations of Colorado's historic mountainous mining ghost towns have been a pastime that has fascinated the general public since the time of mining bonanzas in the mid-1880s. Eventually, the recreational activity of jeeping post-WWII led to further exploration and discovery of early mining sites and ghost towns of the past. Saints John ("Sts John") is one that was, and still is, particularly alluring.

My interest in jeeping the high country of Colorado in my youth can be dated back to the late 1950s. But it was a specific excursion in 1968, one of which was of historical importance to me, that led me to this short story of jeeping the Sts John mining site and the photographic endeavor which, in turn, led to further research at the Denver Public Library and the Western Mining History site. The noted photographic archives of the DPL is one of the best in the country.

At the age of 24, I was in my early stages of photographic documentation as a neophyte photographer. It was eight years later, in 1976, when I made a full commitment to fine art photography. But in 1968, I had recorded some important photographic evidence that remained dormant until very recently. A film strip recently found in my archive of photographic material came to light.

I used Kodak color negative film at the time of this specific jeeping trek to Sts John, a site at 10,764 feet about sea level in the Montezuma Mining District in Summit County, adjacent to Keystone, Grays, and Torreys peaks. Color negative film has a short life span and undergoes

film deterioration as compared to colored transparencies or BW negative film; hence the images were of rather poor quality.

On a specific summer day, with lighting somewhat dull and summer temperatures cold, I undertook a jeeping trip to Sts John. The prospector, John Coley, found silver in 1863–64 and named the site Coleyville; however, the site ultimately became known as Sts John. In my research, I learned there had been various names used for this mine — Coleyville, St. John, and Sts John. The mountainside was extensively mined with numerous mine portals, buildings, a large smelter, a flume, a brick smokestack, a large boarding house, an assay office, a guest house, and a foreman's house. The total population was 71 people, according to the census of 1870. A Boston Mining Company built the large smelter and employed numerous miners. The company town had a library but no saloons.

The mine was active into the 1880s and ceased with the silver bust by 1928. Sts John became known as a ghost town for jeepers to find and explore. Although I took numerous photographs of the mining site, its buildings, and its mining relics, it was the boarding house that attracted my photographic attention. Buildings at the time were in distressed conditions; many had collapsed, such as the assay office, or near so; and the smelter, in particular, had collapsed due to time and winter conditions. But the boarding house stood and looked quite fragile at the time in 1968.

I vaguely recalled the site as Sts John, which recently led me to dig into the photographic archives of the DPL. Due to spelling differences and various names for the site, the research took a lengthy period of time to archive and study. The DPL presently has in its archives six to seven images related to Sts John mine. Early black and white images and a few images dating from the 1950s were donated by two other photographers, Al Bachman, whose images were Kodachrome transparencies, and a Robert Brown, who likewise donated his 1957 images to the DPL.

It was Brown's photo of the boarding house which most attracted my attention. Brown's work was a nice full image of the boarding house, which upon close inspection, reveals the "portal" or "formal entry" into the building. This BW image compares to my

colored image, which shows the collapsed "portal," as well as the assay office, which is partially collapsed, and another building. Finally, Bachman's 1969 image portrays the collapsed assay office as well as the fully collapsed boarding house on the far right.

Many of those images are copyrighted, and usage or fees for their use are required. I set about the chore of obtaining a copy of the DPL's image of the boarding house to make a comparison of my own image to the archived version. The results, my research, are shown in this article, along with further archives. Backman's photo shows the collapsed boarding house a year after I made my image.

Photography has always been used for "documentation, research, and storytelling as well as art." Such is the case here. Moreover, historical images such as these also serve to inspire us to embark on our own excursions to explore our Colorado ghost towns. Adventure awaits!


