



to set up an ophthalmology clinic in Avon, where Morgan practices comprehensive ophthalmology several days a week, and Jon has been very busy as a Steadman surgeon.

Maddie Rose has adapted quite well though she can't seem to find a "comfortable" ski boot. Nonetheless, Jon is hopeful this will be Maddie's year to take up skiing. 





VETERANS DAY TRIBUTE



In December 2021, there were an estimated 18.2 million military veterans in the United States. In Eagle County, that estimate hovered at around 2000. In Dave Lohmann's Singletree living room on a recent Thursday afternoon, there were exactly four veterans, Dave, Steve Sanders, Jim Knez, and your reporter. We were assembled to talk, reminisce, and trade a few "war stories" about our time in the military for this magazine's annual Veterans Day tribute issue.

I can confidently report that Dave, Steve, and Jim all served their country well and faithfully, and I was both honored and humbled to have the opportunity to share their stories with you. Compared to what these three vets contributed during their years of service, mine truly pale in comparison; in fact, there is no comparison whatsoever that can be made, so I will happily not sully this article with any recounting of my service except to say that I received, somehow, an honorable discharge.

But enough about service that didn't make a difference; it's time to recognize service that did.

DAVE LOHMANN entered the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs in 1959 as a cadet harboring the dream of flying fighter jets. That dream was dashed on the rocks of reality, however, when it was determined that his eyesight was not up to the standard that the Air Force set for a fighter pilot. As an alternative, when he graduated from the academy in 1963, the Air Force sent him to Stanford to pursue a master's degree in engineering. After getting his degree, he was assigned, in typical military fashion, the task, in his words, of "solving unsolvable problems."

They Will Never Forget; Neither Should We

As an example of solving the unsolvable, he was sent to Alaska to figure out a way to pump diesel fuel through the arctic permafrost (without it freezing and becoming useless sludge) to heat the quarters and workspaces of the personnel assigned to the DEW Line that stretched from Alaska through Greenland to Iceland. The Distant Early Warning Line was established in the 1950s as a system to detect any aggressive Soviet aerial incursions in time to launch defensive measures and countermeasures. In the '60s, it was the height of the Cold War and keeping the DEW Line fully functional was a national priority.

He also spent a number of years at the Pentagon working for the Secretary of Defense in the politicalmilitary affairs office. During his tenure there, his primary responsibility was to prepare Air Force brass for congressional budget testimony.

Dave spent a total of 26 years in the Air Force, moving 13 times and retiring in 1986 as a full colonel. His proud military service was passed on to two of his four sons, who also served. Between the two of them, they have completed five combat tours in the Middle East!

STEVE SANDERS graduated from Loyola University dental school in 1965 as the Vietnam war was raging in Southeast Asia and the draft was in full swing. He saw the inevitability of one of those dreaded letters that began "Greetings from the President of the United States ... " hitting his mailbox, so he reluctantly chose to volunteer rather than be drafted. Dental degree in hand, he stepped into his local Army recruiting office in Chicago, seeking a commission as a captain



in the dental corps. He was, rather surprisingly, told that the Army was not currently in need of any dentists. With what one can only imagine was a resigned shoulder shrug, he moved on and began his dental residency. After a few months, the Army must have reassessed its needs because they contacted Steve and offered him the choice of coming into the Army immediately as a private or finishing his residency and coming in as a captain. Well, for Steve, that was the ultimate no-brainer. He finished his residency and reported to Ft. Stuart, GA, for duty in the dental corps as a freshly minted captain.

Apparently, Steve's time at Ft. Stuart was a bit of a challenge for him and two of his fellow dental recruits, as they, in Steve's words, "didn't really get along with the commanding officer."

As a result of this difference of opinion and the chain of command being what it is, Steve and his two buddies soon received orders to ship out to Vietnam. In August of 1966, he headed for Southeast Asia and was stationed in Long Binh for a 12-month tour of duty. Fortunately, the only real danger Steve and his colleagues faced that year was during the infamous Tet offensive when the ammo dump at the Long Binh base was targeted and blown up.

In addition to attending to the dental needs of his fellow service members, Steve made frequent trips to the local village to do all he could to bring modern dentistry to the local kids who had never seen a dentist before. Steve humbly referred to his year in Vietnam as "an easy tour," but no time in a war zone should ever be referred to as "easy." It was, after all, a war zone!



JIM KNEZ received his draft notice in 1965 and, like so many other draftees, wanted no part of serving in Vietnam. But, unlike many other draftees, he felt the obligation to serve, so there would be no one-way trips to Canada for Jim. Instead, he visited his local Navy recruiter to enlist. The Navy determined that he had the qualifications to fly a C-130 transport, but not in the usual fashion. Jim was assigned to a topsecret squadron assigned with the task of maintaining communications between the fleet of American guided missile attack submarines in the North Atlantic and the Mediterranean.

Jim flew a C-130 packed to the wingtips with top secret

communications gear that included a spool of antenna wire. When they were assigned a mission, they would fly to the designated station and begin a slow but constant orbital path while deploying this antenna wire in a huge spiral until it almost reached the surface of the water. They would stay on station and orbit like this for up to four hours at a time, keeping crucial communications open between base ops and the submerged fleet during times of extreme tension and potential danger.

Jim spent three and a half years as this vital link between decision and implementation at a time when tensions between East and West were at their highest. When he left the Navy, Jim took his training and experience to Delta Airlines and served as a pilot of commercial jets flying both domestically and internationally.

These three vets have experiences and stories as diverse as the military itself and records to be proud of, but they are just three out of the millions who have served this country proudly and effectively. We owe them so much more than the mere "thank you for service." Like the others, their stories need to be shared and remembered because, in the oft-quoted words of the philosopher Santayana, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."





It was November of 2006, two months after the loss of our "firstborn," as we used to call Cody Rose, our 100-pound, 13-year-8-month-old yellow Labrador we had raised since she was a puppy. Our home in Virginia, where we had lived for nearly 25 years, went on the market, and we packed up and moved to the Vail area.





Moving into a tiny condo in Avon we had purchased years prior, our intention was to build a home on a lot in Cotton Ranch. However, after working with an architect for nearly a year, we decided we liked the convenience of living closer to Vail and purchased a duplex in Edwards.

With our new living arrangements mostly settled and still mourning the loss of our first girl, we decided it was time to start looking for another yellow Labrador. We scoured the ads and eventually found a veterinarian/breeder in Craig, who was expecting a litter of yellows in early May. We had our pick of the three girls and got the call in mid-June that we needed to come and pick up our new dog.

Upon arrival at the breeder's, it was immediately apparent which one of the three we were going to choose. Bella Rosa, as we named her, was the runt of the litter, not even eight pounds, but already sitting straight up and making eye contact. She went after the little ball we had brought with such intensity and fearlessness while the other two puppies seemed to shy away.

Bella peacefully slept in my lap for the first two weeks while I was working from home. However, right around week three, something changed in her; she seemed to "come alive" and proceed to become an absolute terror! Stubborn and determined, she was kicked out of puppy kindergarten because she refused to be calm, listen and learn commands; she preferred just playing with the other puppies and barked and howled loudly when she didn't get her way. Back at home, we were at a loss as to how to stop her from biting us and tearing up everything in sight. She absolutely hated going for walks and would constantly whine and nip the back of my heels and calves when she wasn't tugging on the leash. Her personality couldn't have been any different from our "firstborn" ... what did we get ourselves into?

While my husband repeatedly wanted to send her back to the breeder, I, on the other hand, took to reading everything I could about puppy training, trying this and that, with limited success. Eventually, she grew out of the biting and started wanting to go for walks, but she would pick up every single stick she found and eat it. Trips to the vet were frequent; at least we had the foresight to get pet insurance! At one year old, she chewed through and swallowed some plastic fencing, which cut through her intestines and led to emergency surgery and a resection.

Luckily, she recovered and was still with us when we moved to Singletree a few years later.

By this time, we had graduated to hikes which she thoroughly enjoyed, especially if we were hiking next to a stream, and the muddier, the better! One winter day, while hiking June Creek, Bella discovered a dead fox down a ravine and up the opposite side, where it was not easy for me to reach her, especially with snow on the ground. As much as I scolded and "commanded" her to come, she wasn't going to do so until she was done with the animal. She finally rejoined me, smelling horrible, and home we went. Three days later, it was back to the vet, another emergency surgery to remove the fox pelt she had devoured but could not digest.

Like most labs, Bella fell in love with water and even competed in the Dock Dogs competition one summer. However, she could not understand why she had to wait

her turn with the other competitors, so one season of putting up with the pulling and whining was enough! While Bella has always loved snow, almost every other dog she encounters, and most people (especially those with treats in their pockets), she doesn't really like the summer heat and is terrified of thunder. She's looking forward to the change in seasons; in fact, she even has her own Epic Pass with her picture on it!

Despite the surgeries and a stroke a year ago, which left no visible effects, today Bella is a happy, mostly healthy

14-and-a-half-year-old. We think the active lifestyle in Colorado can be credited with keeping her weight below 60 pounds. She's no longer the fastest dog in the park but still enjoys her daily walks and wants to chase squirrels and bunnies; at least now, she has learned she will never catch them. Somewhere along the line, she also became "daddy's girl," even though her early days with him were initially numbered! And as stubborn as she can still be, we love her dearly and can't imagine how empty our lives these past 14-plus years would have been without her.














The Tale of an Almost Ancient Mariner

"Join the Navy and see the world!" proclaimed the very popular Navy recruiting slogan during and after World War II. As a landlubber kid growing up in the Germantown section of northwest Philadelphia, adventure on the High Seas seemed a rather remote idea. Although the Philadelphia Naval Base and Shipyard, the final resting place for the "Mothball Fleet" of decommissioned warships, and the annual Army-Navy game graced the city with some naval traditions, my closest, early encounter with the ocean

was at the Jersey Shore, digging holes on the beach.

My dad had been drafted at age 34 to serve as a medic in the Army, ultimately outside Marseilles, France, in the latter years of the war, while my uncles served in the Navy or Army.







As Baby Boomers growing up in the 1950s, my brother and I were glued to our tiny TV screen for the "Victory At Sea" series about the Pacific naval war, while the emerging Cold War generated air raid drills at elementary school, and the conflict in Korea, the Soviet invasion of Hungary in 1956, Castro and the Cuban Missile Crisis in 1962, and conflict in Southeast Asia raised serious doubts about post-WW II peace and expanded my focus on world events. Though my family had traveled during the 1950s in our 1956 Chevy station wagon from Maine to Florida and from New York and Canada west to Colorado, lacked overseas experience.

My future course changed when I, as a high school senior in early 1964, was selected for the Naval ROTC program at Brown University in Providence. Added to the required broad liberal arts curriculum, studies in leadership, naval history, warfare, sea power and seaborne commerce, as well as drills, marching, parades and summer midshipman training, opened vast new chapters for the future. My first voyage on a Navy destroyer carried me from Newport to New York City for the World's Fair in summer 1965, while my first airplane flight was subsequently on a six- or seven-hour anti-submarine tracking exercise from an air base in New Brunswick, Maine. Subsequent summer training included flight indoctrination training in Corpus Christi, Texas, amphibious landing in Little Creek, VA, and my first venture to Europe in 1967 about the aircraft carrier USS Saratoga, with port calls in Toulon, France, Palma Majorica, Pireas/Athens, Greece and ample "liberty" upon our return to Rota, Spain.

Our most important takeaways from the training were the importance of leadership, teamwork and camaraderie, competence, reliance upon the most experienced of sailors and the fact we were "all in the same boat" while fulfilling our mission. These invaluable lessons were carried over long after active service was completed, as does our respect for those who have served. Veterans look out for and respect each other.

As most sail and boat enthusiasts may know, the Navy has its own jargon: from bow to stern, locations are either fore or aft, port or starboard, topside or below decks. Stairs are "ladders," bathrooms are "heads," dining areas are either the "mess deck," "chief's mess," or "officers' wardroom." Access to a ship is via the "quarterdeck," while the navigation and control of the ship are from the "bridge." Each compartment is accessed either through a horizontal "hatch" or a vertical "door." Any new sailor or visitor may get confused and lost aboard ship without such critical knowledge.

My first tour of duty was aboard USS Dale, a guided missile frigate based in San Diego. I progressed from Officer in charge of defensive gunnery to First Lieutenant in charge of all deck evolutions and Officer of the Deck in charge of steering the ship at sea. This presented great opportunities for leadership and skill development. Our entire day at sea was divided into four-hour "watches," with the "mid-watch" (midnight to 4 a.m.) being the least enjoyable, especially when coupled with our regular work day from Reveille at 0600 hours until Taps at 2200 hours. At sea, drills, underway replenishment,

and other evolutions could stretch nonsleep hours to thirty or more hours at a time. The allure of "liberty" at the next port of call helped bolster spirits.

USS Dale was well suited for normal sea ops, especially for patrol, plane guarding behind aircraft carriers, and port calls. In 1969, we traveled from California ports to Hawaii, the Philippines, Japan, Korea, Taiwan, the patrol area off South Vietnam, Hong Kong and ultimately New Zealand truly seeing the Western Pacific. At each port call, the crew had ample opportunity to sightsee and interact with the people in each country.

I next served on USS Pledge, a much smaller, wooden minesweeper based in Long Beach, after undergoing training in Charleston, SC. After serving aboard Pledge in the southern California op area after a shipyard upgrade, I received my orders to Vietnam in early 1971. I then attended training in the Vietnamese language and operations at Coronado, CA.

I was assigned as senior advisor to the harbor defense unit in Cam Rahn Bay, the large logistics seaport for U.S. and Vietnamese forces located at the midpoint on the east coast of South Vietnam. Starting in August 1971, my group of about twenty U.S. Naval Advisory Group personnel and I worked side-by-side with our Vietnamese Navy counterparts, as well as with other U.S. Army units, to provide patrol defense of the harbor and its logistics. We were invited to the homes and schools of our Vietnamese Navy friends and learned their traditions, needs and concerns. Many had previously fled from the North. Liaison and leadership became our focus in the mutual effort toward defense against attack. Toward the end of my tour, I traveled to Saigon and on to Vung Tau, where I worked to train Cambodian Navy personnel on similar defense efforts.

I transferred from Vietnam in May 1972 and grabbed the scheduled military airlift command shuttle flight to travel eastward from Saigon to stops in Bangkok, New Delhi, Karachi, Bahrain and eventually Spain, spending several or more days at each stop, "seeing the world" and enjoying contact

with the people. Making my way to Gatwick in London, I returned to the U.S. and served as an assistant legal officer at the Philadelphia Naval Base through the summer of 1972, when ${\rm I}$ completed my active duty.

After returning to Europe in spring 1973, with Eurail and Britrail passes in hand, where I visited much of Western Europe, including Scandinavia, I arrived in Denver in August 1973 to attend the University of Denver College of Law. In need of some funds to attend law school on the GI Bill, I signed up for the Naval Reserve at the Federal Center in Lakewood, Colorado, intending to participate while in law school, but surprisingly remained for 26 years of additional service both in Surface Warfare training units and units assigned to overseas commands in Japan, South Korea and in Hawaii. As a naval reservist, I traveled to and trained throughout the U.S., as well as traveled and trained 26 times to South Korea (including a mobilization for over a hundred days to Korea in the mid-1990s with Seventh Fleet) and 19 trips to Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

To have thought in my high school days that I might join the Navy and actually "see the World" and spark an interest in much more travel to visit additional spots on a proverbial "bucket list" would certainly have been farfetched. Yet, it has happened. Ironically, my younger brother, having drawn a low draft lottery number in 1970, also joined the Navy and garnered more than 25 years of Naval and Federal Service in the Panama Canal Zone.

Importantly, my chance to work with incredible, dedicated military service people throughout the U.S. and overseas, including my current Rocky Mountain Navy group in Denver and the Minturn Mt Holy Cross VFW Post 10721, who continue to serve, mentor, and give to their communities and look out for the needs of fellow veterans and first responders, as well as all those who put their lives on the line to serve and protect us, has been both invaluable and a blessing. To those willing to put their lives on the line to serve the USA and to protect and maintain freedom for all of us, all of our citizens, and I owe our undying gratitude.


