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

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
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Alex, Suz, Kit, Ava, and Boomer Griffin


In the spring of 2021, Alex received an exciting opportunity from his managing broker and the part-owner of the largest Sotheby's International Realty affiliate in the world. They approached him

BAKED FOR HAPPINESS

Sheila Katz shares her personal tips to transform a basic chocolate chip cookie recipe into an extraordinary cookie experience

Not all chocolate chip cookies are created equal. While Sheila Katz is quick to confess she did not 'invent' the recipe, she earns accolades for baking the BEST CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES. These cookies were a huge hit at our Beauty, Health, and Wellness Celebration! So here by popular demand, Sheila lets us in on the secrets for baking these amazing chocolate chip cookies!.

BEST CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

INGREDIENTS:

2 cups all-purpose flour

½ teaspoon baking soda

 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt

3/4 cup unsalted butter - melted

1 cup packed brown sugar

½ cup white sugar

1 tablespoon vanilla extract

1 egg

1 egg yolk

2 cups semisweet chocolate chips

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F. Grease cookie sheets OR line with parchment paper OR use non-stick silicone cookie sheets.

2. Sift together the flour, baking soda, and salt; set aside.

3. In a medium bowl, cream together the melted butter, brown sugar, and white sugar until well blended. Beat in the vanilla, egg, and egg yolk until light and creamy. Mix in the sifted ingredients until just blended. Stir in the chocolate



wooden spoon. Drop cookie dough 1/4 cup at a time onto the prepared cookie sheets.

4. Bake for 15 minutes in the preheated oven or until the edges are lightly toasted. Cool on baking sheets before transferring to wire racks to cool completely.

SHEILA'S TIPS

- · Use only the highest quality ingredients, i.e. Guittard semi-sweet chocolate, C & H Ultrafine Baker's Sugar, King Arthur flour, and quality butter, for instance, Kerrygold Pure Irish Butter
- · Do not over blend the cookie dough.
- Using a large ice cream scoop, scoop cookie dough onto a baking sheet lined with parchment paper or a silicone
- FREEZE the cookies for at least 24 hours.
- Transfer the frozen cookies to another prepared baking sheet and bake immediately for 15 minutes at 325 degrees.

And voila! THE BEST CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES EVER. Thank you, Sheila, for sharing your secrets. We can't wait to try them!

GETTING TO KNOW JOHN TEDSTROM

John Tedstrom has been involved with the Vail Valley Theater Company for the past 20 years. Here he shares with us the highlights of his journey from high school to becoming a performer and a member of the Board of Directors for the VVTC.

What inspired you to become involved with Vail Valley **Theater Company?**

My first love is performing. So I sought the Vail Valley Theater Company out as soon as I heard about them. I was surprised to find such a talented group in the valley, and many people who have professional theater backgrounds. But the most inspiring thing about them is their commitment to developing local live theater in the valley. Those who have such great experiences are willing to share them with others who love live theater and just want to be involved. The more shows I did, the more I saw that many things need to happen to produce the shows and give actors opportunities to perform. So I became a member of

the Board of Directors and Chair of the Marketing Committee.

Let's go back a bit... When did you first become drawn to acting?

I was involved in theater in high school and college and at one time wanted to be a professional actor. I had an inspiring English teacher in high school in Sydney, Australia, and he directed the school musicals. I also found out it was a great way to meet girls.

Tell us about the first time you stepped on stage. What production was it and what was your role?

My first show was L'il Abner in high school. My role was one of Abner's friends. I remember being pretty nervous, even though I didn't have much to do, except sing "If I had my druthers..." and be in the background for the big cast numbers.

And how did that experience exhilarate you?

I was, and still am, half exhilarated, and half terrified every time I go on stage. It's a rush to be in front of people, especially people you know. Yet I put a lot of pressure on myself to not forget my lines, because

when I mess up, I feel I'm letting others down.

So you were hooked! Fast forward to the Vail Valley Theater Company. How did you initially become involved with the organization here?

I connected with the Vail Valley Theatre Company in 2003. I had not done anything in the theater since 1983 in college when my daughter Anna asked me to be in Peter Pan with her in the Vail Children's Theater. She said, "You could be Captain Hook!". After that show, I got the bug again and wanted to perform more. Since connecting with VVTC in 2003, I have performed in over 30 shows in the valley for both the VVTC and Porchlight Players in Eagle.

What roles have you played over the last 20 years?

I played Bellomy in *The Fantastiks*, Dr.
Carrasco (The Knight of the Mirrors) in *Man of La Mancha*, and Marcus Lycus in *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum*. My roles have also included Billy Flynn in *Chicago*, The Narrator in The *Rocky Horror Show*, Larry in *Company*, as well as The Mysterious
Man in *Into the Woods*. When not playing an individual role, I have had multiple parts in the ensembles for the *Evening on Broadway* shows, cabarets, and holiday shows.
Not to mention, I've also done many shows with Porchlight Players in Eagle during the same time frame.

What has been your favorite performance and why?

Billy Flynn in *Chicago*. Billy is a fantastic role and was such an honor for me to play. We had a really talented cast and crew, a great director, a full band with a world-class musical director; and it's an iconic role in an iconic show.

What has been your most challenging role?

Playing the Narrator in The *Rocky Horror Show*. It's a fun and completely off-the-wall show that I loved being a part of, but it's also the only show I've done where there is a counter script that the audience yells back at the cast. The Narrator catches a lot of grief in the counter script, but once I figured out I could ad lib and yell back at the audience (and got the director's approval), it became very energizing.





If you could choose to play any role in any production, what would it be?

If I had the skills to play any part in any production, which I don't, it would probably be playing any role in Hamilton. More realistically, I'd like to play Javert in *Les Miserables*. I know it's not the most uplifting show, but the voices and the music are out of this world.

As a performer, what are the greatest challenges you encountered in your roles with the VVTC?


Through most of those shows, I was very busy working and traveling every week to somewhere in the US. One of the biggest challenges was scheduling so I could attend rehearsals and shows without disrupting the cast. I have been so fortunate to have a flexible family, directors, and fellow cast members to help me manage my schedule and pursue my passion for theater.

What is the most gratifying or rewarding aspect of your involvement in the VVTC?

Connecting with my community, friends and family and entertaining them with great storytelling. I will remember forever how special it has been when my family attended our shows, and I have made many lifelong friends through the theater. I cherish the powerful memories we've created together. My Dad and brother Peter have attended almost every one of my shows, and my wife Carri has been to all of them – "multiple times", she says as she rolls her eyes!

When asked, How can someone get involved with the Vail Valley Theater Company?', how do you respond?

I always say... if I could do it, with the schedule I had, anyone can do it. For those 20 years, I traveled literally every week and I made it work. There are so many ways to get involved including performing or playing other important roles (directing/assistant directing, stage management, props, set design and painting, production, music, lighting and sound, marketing, and more). Or check out one of our dance classes or improv workshops to get started! We are always looking for great people to come out and play with us.


Bronco finds joy in sleep, nature, barking... And brisket too!



WALKING LIKE AN EGYPTIAN AND ROCKING THE CASBAH

ing Tut was toes up in the Valley of the Kings. But we'll get to that later. First, though, there were the pyramids, rivers of sweat, and camels (which the Egyptians, correctly perhaps, insist on calling dromedaries) - in that order - to discuss.

After two long legs - Denver to Munich, then Munich to Cairo - we arrived in time for bed in the bustling, chaotic, capital of Egypt. The "we" in this case were my wife, Deb, our adult sons, Ascher and Parke, the boys' girls, Natalie and Heather, our good friend Steve Holden, and me. After a night's rest hard against the Nile - the world's longest and perhaps most storied river - we were off, rather than to see the Wizard, to see something even better: the pyramids and the Sphinx.

Besides being special in their sheer hugeness and magnificence, the fact that they were constructed back in the day when a power tool meant a brawny workman, to see them in their upclose-and-in-person selves was special. What is perhaps a bit well less known than their familiar profiles, is that, for a small fee, you can pay to sort of be swallowed up inside the Great Pyramid and hike through a narrow sauna of an uphill tunnel to the tomb of the late great Pharoah Cheops. This, however, takes a little 'splainin'.

Living in a winter sporting town, most folks here are likely familiar with the sport of Olympic speed skating. Bear with me here for just a sec. You see, in order to scale the roughly billion stairs, and huff up the gut-

busting inclines, one must assume "the position". In this instance, the position one must assume (as, in places, the ceiling is as low as about 40 inches) is, unless one is a Munchkin, or a child, approximately that of a speed skater's tuck. Which, presumably, is pretty good for speed skating but, when one is inclining up stairs and steep ramps beneath a back-breakingly low-top ceiling, is less ideal than when swirling around a slick ice oval. By the way, did I mention that only a Russian seeking out a banya would be happy in the sweltering humidity and heat? Oh yeah, and it's about as narrow as a coffin for the two-way human traffic.

After a good drenching, it was camel time. Oops, dromedary time. To mount and ride in the shadows (if

there were any in the baking desert sun) of the pyramids. If one has never before done the aforesaid, the saddle of a camel/dromedary is *waaay* up off the ground and the way they get up, once you have slung a leg over them is sort of like a set of pneumatic hoists where the back side comes up first and then the front.

Camel time can only reasonably be succeeded by a visit to the Sphinx who had been waiting patiently for our visit for about 6,000 years. The Sphinx sprawls out in all its indifferent magnificence at the feet of the pyramids and, considering its advanced age, is remarkably well-preserved.

A trip to the spectacular Egyptian museum which is filled with antiquities and, much like the Louvre, the Hermitage, or the British museum, cannot be properly seen in less than a lifetime, completed our first sweltry day.

On to Aswan where after overnighting at a spectacular hotel on an island - the Elephantine - cleaving the Nile into neat halves - we spent the morning exploring the *souk* or marketplace. Car

salesmen, multi-level marketers, and carnival barkers pale in comparison to the aggressiveness of the shopkeepers fronting their narrow stalls. "One dollar!" "Everything free!" "Please!! I'll pay you!!!" Anything to lure you in. It was dirty, hot, and fascinating.

The afternoon saw us check in to our Nile Cruise boat - 60 rooms, a restaurant, a lounge for after-dinner entertainment, and a great rooftop deck that spanned the length of the ship. We followed that with a sail on the Nile on a traditional sailboat - a *felucca* - to a Nubian village and tea. Camels, hawkers, *muezzin* calling the faithful to prayer, residents going about their lives in traditional dress, and an utter frenzy of activities.


The next morning, it was off by bus then water ferry to the remarkably well-preserved ancient temple at Philea which was punctuated with magnificent statuary, carvings, hieroglyphs, temples, and columns, all older, by double, than since the beginning of the common era. Later in the day, we sailed on to Kom Ombo, another site of such splendor, words




Surf's up beside the Hasan II mosqu


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
simply fail. An interesting feature - one I would venture, you will not find just anywhere - is the croc museum which, rather than displaying various iterations of spongy clogs, instead stars a lineup of long-ago mummified Nile crocodiles.

Upriver then to the locks near Esna which, I am certain, are less impressive than the locks at the Panama Canal, but which have a rather unique attribute. As the ships slow to enter the locks, boatmen in tiny rowboats and along the clamping jaws of the locks, swarm in like schools of carnivorous fish to sell their wares. The way they do so is to throw their goods the 50 feet or so to their potential customer on the sundecks of the ships, haggle the price from below to up above and vice versa and, if a deal is struck, the money is thrown down in a weighted sack. If a price is not agreed upon, then the item is returned by pitching it back down in the weighted sack. When the ship slowed, several of the boatmen/hawkers hitched their boats to the ship and were towed along, still selling from below, much like the pirates in the Tom Hanks flick, Mr. Phillips.

On to Luxor - the real one, not the Las Vegas knock-offand dazzling Al Karnac. Yes, another bloody ancient temple, but astonishing in its architecture, scale, and the sheer will and manpower required to construct it. All for the glory of the gods and Pharoah.

Before returning to Cairo, we completed our tour of the ancient world with a visit to the bone-dry, utterly inhospitable Valley of the Kings where 22 Pharaohs are entombed, their elaborate, richly-appointed final resting places carved deeply down - and sometimes up - into the






rocky hills. It is here, you will find King Tut, toes up, with a sheet modestly covering his withered self from chin to ankles. He stares straight up as if contemplating either eternity itself or precisely how all these gawkers have somehow made their way to have a look.

A quick flight that night took us back to Cairo where the next day's adventures took us to the labyrinthine souk. While you may be able to get anything you want at Alice's Restaurant, you can get even more at the Cairo souk. Camel meat? Check. Papyrus decorated in the old style. Check. Handmade goldwork? Yes, of course. Marquetry, handmade lamps, rugs, live chickens, bunnies, ducks, songbirds, tonight's groceries? You name it. Check, check, check! In and out of the hovels-cum-workshops-cum-craftsmen's studios, up and down narrow staircases where hidden treasures called, tea at a local's hookah bar. Hot. Dirty. Smells that assaulted. Cats, cats, cats everywhere. Dogs. Kicked soccer balls. A feast for every sense, even ones, that until then, we didn't know we possessed. In contrast, dinner at the Cairo Tower, a revolving restaurant high above the dizzying skyline of the city of 7 million bustling, hustling souls.







Before we left Cairo for the nearly 6-hour flight to Morocco, a few last words. Chaotic. Fascinating. Robust. And perhaps the most thoroughly insane drivers anywhere in the mechanized world. We quickly learned that to walk like an Egyptian has not a wit to do with the Bangles, haute couture, or spotlighted runways. Oh my, no. Instead, what it consists of is dashing headlong into on-coming, sideways coming, and coming from every which away horn-blaring traffic without the slightest concern for life or limb. By comparison, New Yorkers are a bunch of namby-pamby pikers.


Casablanca was different. Clean. Refined. Green. Pride of ownership, perhaps, that at times, seemed lacking in Egypt.


When one thinks of Casablanca, one likely thinks of *Casablanca*. The movie: Humphrey Bogart, Ingrid Bergman, Rick's Americana Café. What one may not think of is Casablanca, the surf town. Surfs up, dude. But, among other things - women in *abayas* and *hijabs*, even at the beach, the soaring Hasan II mosque, couscous, pastilla, and tajine - Casablanca is a beach town. The La Corniche walk along the coast is lined with palms, shops, cafes, bars, and amusement centers. In most respects - the *hijabs*, *abayas*, and

five-times daily calls to prayer and the imposing 1.2 million square foot Hasan II mosque notwithstanding - it could be anywhere; Mission Beach in San Diego, Bondi Beach in Sydney.

The Hasan II mosque deserves special mention. As noted above, it is massive. Its west flank dips into the Atlantic, the salty waves thrumming steadily against it. Completed in 1993 at an eye and blood vessel popping 10 billion dollars, every detail is perfection. Besides the artistry of every niche and corner and the enormous retractable roof, one could hold a regulation football game inside. Or two. Or three. Inside, it accommodates 25,000 of the faithful locked in genuflecting prayer and outside, another 80,000-men and women separate. The ablution room, a level down from the main hall, where men ritually bathe before prayer is a phantasmagoric feast: huge, mushroom-shaped fountains in the dozens out of which cleansing water flows, as if designed by Lewis Carroll in an opium-fueled creative burst.

But wait, there's more. Lots more in fact. Casablanca is a big, bustling, muscular, energetic city, full of squares and motion. The King's palace with its stunning ceramics is worth a look, as is the *medina*, the ancient city quarter.








We would come back for a final special evening, but for now, it was on to Rabat.


Which is another coastal town. Our hotel - a converted private home in the Moorish style and offering not more than a dozen guest rooms - was in the thick of the *medina* and was approached through a winding warren of little more than alleyways, most barely wider than our shoulders, along which shop vendors industriously vended, pedestrians made their waddling ways you and hither, bikers biked, and motorcycles furiously shot. Dinner at 9:00 (early for North Africa) at Dar Rbatia for a traditional meal, the center of which was a luscious, steaming tajine, a dish that takes its name from the cone-hatted clay vessel in which it is both cooked and served. The meal is served on low seats and tables ensconced within pillows, cushions, tapestries, and magnificently ornate lighting and carvings on the walls and ceilings. Because we were so early, we had the place—and the attention of the staff-entirely to ourselves.

Before I go to the sights and scents of Rabat, one word about both Egypt's and Morocco's scrumptiously sinful deserts: honey. In a thousand permutations, often mated with stacked, connived, spun, and lightas-air filo. Everywhere. All the time. And, yum!

Rabat is home to a colorful Jewish quarter, the royal palace and its impressive flowery grounds, and the casbah (which we, incidentally, rocked and which



overlooks the ocean). Despite the Clash's 1982 hit suggesting that a casbah is maybe something else, what it is in fact is a citadel or fort that is now an artists' colony with cannons




watch over the beachgoers (rather than the storming hordes) below. It is austere, uniformly white inside, and reminiscent of Greece's Santorini.

A stop in Meknes for lunch and yet another ornately appointed restaurant, the Palais Terrab, and then, before settling in Fes for the night, we toured the Roman ruins, with their marvelous mosaic floors and towering pillars, of Volubilis. Reaching Fes, we stayed again in a converted Moorish home smack in the middle of the teaming medina. This particular medina, dating back to the 11th century, houses 500,000 inhabitants within its cramped 300 hectares. Dense.


Fes is a throbbing nest of life. We visited the old synagogue, and the royal palace, caught a view of the old city from a vantage high above, and visited a collective devoted to the hand-made production of bright and intricate ceramics. After roaming through the narrow streets and ways of the old city - some of which are so narrow that one person can scarcely navigate them without crabbing sideways - we landed at a Nubian pharmacy, then handmade rug manufactory, lunched at Asmae, visited the oldest university in the world and a madrasa, and finally landed at the ancient dye pots - still in use - which reek to each of the 7 levels of Muslim heaven from the smell of tanning hides, dyes, and the enormous vats of pigeon poop that are essential to the tanning process.

Back again to Casablanca where we did, indeed, dine at Rick's Café which was elegant and invigorated with music, fine food, and the fusion of old-world North Africa and a bygone time in Hollywood.

Egypt on the east edge of North Africa and the bridge to Asia is hot, dirty, chaotic, friendly, and rich with ancient







history. Morocco on the west verge is calm, comparatively clean, modern, friendly, and elegant. Both are at geographic and cultural crossroads - Egypt to the Middle East and Asia, and Morocco only a finger's reach from Spain and whose blood still boils from its long occupation by France. Both wear Janus masks of sorts, looking proudly backward into their rich histories and forward into bright, uncertain futures. A trip to both is a cultural and historical whirlwind that will enlighten, thrill, surprise, and offer heretofore unimagined titillation of your every sense.











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
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PRIDE IN THE PATH: 14 VOLUNTEERS MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN OUR NEIGHBORHOOD
