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


PIPER SASSI



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

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
COACH BRITNEY BRANSON ELEVATES VAIL CHRISTIAN GIRLS' VOLLEYBALL TO WIN A LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP

Born and raised in Singletree, Britney Brown Branson returns to the valley following a professional volleyball career to lead the VCHS girls' high school team to winning season

f you've lived in the valley these last twenty years and raised kids or followed local sports, you probably know about the 2006 Battle Mountain Huskies Girls' Volleyball State Championship team. The Huskies recorded a 90-0 record with sets won in 4A and posted an overall record of 30-1, thereby capturing a Regional, District and State Title. Their one loss was to a strong 5A Doherty high school team during the regular season. It was an impressive feat for the program and BMHS' first and only State Championship crown for girls' volleyball. The teams of Eagle County have been chasing that high ever since, and Singletree's own Britney Brown at the time, who won in 2006, is leading the charge at Vail Christian High School as their head coach to relive the memories from that glorious season.

"Volleyball had been my life for so long, it was my passion growing up and it was so incredible in 2006 to have so much community support as a high school athlete; everyone was pulling for us!" Britney fondly recalls. "The feeling of success and the memories our families and community created for us was so defining in my life that I knew I wanted to come back to our valley and provide that same opportunity for the young girls in our community today."

"We would travel to Denver three times a week for practices and then usually have tournaments on Sunday. It was a big commitment, and my family made a lot sacrifices for that to happen. It was the best decision I made for my volleyball career. I truly believe I was recruited due to my club experience and exposure to college coaches through club volleyball." To this day, Britney feels beyond grateful for the opportunities her coaches and parents made possible so that she could enjoy the full experience as a young female athlete. Britney wholeheartedly believes she would not be where she is today without those wonderful people in her life.

FROM BATTLE MOUNTAIN TO CHINA AND SWEDEN

After her winning season as a Battle Mountain Husky, Britney continued her athletic career as a Husky for the collegiate Division 1 Northeastern University volleyball team on a full ride athletic scholarship. Britney had a remarkable career as a four-year starter. She earned All-Conference in 2008, 2009 and 2010, and was named the Colonial Athletic Association Player of the Year in 2010 as well. Britney began her coaching career as a Student Undergrad Assistant Coach for the 2011-12 season at Northeastern after completing her collegiate career. Reflecting on that experience, Britney remarks, "I learned so much about coaching that year. Since I had been a starter my whole career, it was incredible to see the

game from the bench. I discovered a different perspective of the game and understood the game strategy from another viewpoint."

After Britney graduated with a bachelor's degree in business marketing, she was invited to try out for the United States Olympic Team in

Colorado Springs for the 2012 Olympics. With the final roster pretty much solidified, the Olympic team was only looking for alternates. Britney sparked some interest from the staff and was presented the opportunity to play for two weeks in China with the USA National Developmental Team.

Once Britney returned, she prepared for another international opportunity, playing professional volleyball in Sweden for Lindesberg Volley. Britney explained the options at that time, "If you wanted to continue playing volleyball after college, the only opportunity was the Olympic team or playing professionally overseas. As of this year, the United States has its own professional league called Pro Volleyball Federation."

Britney had an incredible experience playing professional volleyball for a year. "It was pretty exciting to be playing your favorite sport and to be receiving a paycheck all while traveling the world," she says looking back. Besides playing all over Sweden, they traveled to France and Denmark.

As Britney was completing her first year of professional volleyball, it was her fifth year in a long-distance relationship with her now husband, Matt Branson. They were both ready to be in the same zip code and Britney remembers calling her mom and saying, "I am ready to be on my own, get a job, pay bills and prove to myself and others that I can survive on my own."

TIME TO RETURN TO THE USA

With that goal in mind, Britney ended her professional volleyball career in the summer of 2013 and moved to Cheyenne, Wyoming, where Matt was residing. They purchased their first house together and Britney accepted an assistant coaching position at Laramie County Community

College. Britney was excited to give back to young women and to be a part of their journey as she could relate on personal, academic, and athletic levels. She spent four seasons at LCCC and helped start a volleyball club for the high school athletes in Cheyenne called Windy City Volleyball Club. Even though her own volleyball career had ended, she loved being still involved in the game and working with young female athletes.

It was always Britney's desire to get back to the Vail Valley. A year after Matt and Britney were married at the Sonnenalp Golf Club, they welcomed their first daughter, Avery. In 2017, an opportunity came along from a former Singletree resident that they couldn't pass up. Matt, Britney and Avery moved back to the valley and in March of 2018, the young couple purchased the well-established windshield repair and replacement company, Novus Glass, from Steve and Dennie Moore.

Over the next five years, the Bransons would navigate how to run a business, raise their family, and give back to the Eagle County Community. Matt and Britney welcomed two more daughters during this time, Olivia and Remy. Britney jokes, "We have half a volleyball team!" When asked if she will encourage her girls to take up volleyball, she chuckles. "Only if they want to. Secretly I hope they all like volleyball, but I will be supportive in whatever brings them the most joy, growth, and success."

TAKING THE REINS AT VAIL CHRISTIAN HIGH SCHOOL

After five years of adjusting to their new life here in the valley, when the VCHS opportunity became available this past spring, she finally felt it was the right time to take on a head coaching position. "I always wanted to lead a high school volleyball program in this valley but wanted to make sure I could give 110%. If I was going to be able to make a difference, have success, and build a program, it would take a full-time

year-round commitment."
Britney accepted the position and took over the Saint's girls volleyball program this past fall (2023).

As a former collegiate/ professional athlete, an independent business owner, and a mother of three daughters, Britney brings invaluable skills and

experience to her role as coach for the VCHS girls' volleyball program. The first step in leading a program is building a foundation and that would start with recreating the culture at Vail Christian. To participate in the Saints volleyball program under the direction of Coach Britney, each athlete and their parents are required to sign a six-page culture contract that details the culture rules, expectations, morals, and values.

Britney has a very intentional vision for the future at Vail Christian, and for it to become successful and to happen naturally, there must be rules and expectations for that foundation to be solid. "I told the athletes and parents that I want our gym to be the most professional, sharp, business-like, and friendly gym every opponent comes into, and I want our competition to enjoy playing us because it's such a positive experience." Britney believes in the importance of holding young adults accountable, creating challenges, and pushing athletes beyond their limits in a healthy way, to help them grow on and off the court.

"The most important goal of mine is to help build these young females into strong, confident, independent adults that can be successful in life when they graduate from high school. I love coaching this age group. I believe this is when you see the most growth from an athletic and personal development standpoint. I feel so lucky that I get to give back to our community and to these young high school student athletes. There were so many memories on and off the court created by my coaches, family, and community, that I wanted to make sure to bring in some new traditions that

would create lasting memories for our Vail Christian student athletes," Britney explains.

Some of those new traditions included game day meals provided by the parents for every home game, decorating the gym for a variety of themed nights, different colored spandex for the seniors at the homecoming game, staff appreciation night - where each athlete invited a staff member at VCHS to honor and thank, parents' appreciation night, breast cancer awareness night when we donated funds to the Shaw Cancer Center, and many more.

In addition to introducing traditions, Britney initiated a team volleyball camp, led by a college coach. She brought on a nutritionist to discuss nutrition and athletic recovery with her Vail Christian athletes. She also hired a member of the Vitality Collective to run a foam rolling class for her athletes as a recovery method. Britney says, "I think it's important to use the wonderful resources offered in our valley as well as to utilize the connections I have developed over my years in the volleyball world. We were able to offer these resources to our athletes because we added fundraising to our program. It's so important to teach our young adults that if you want perks and privileges, you must earn them and work for them, they don't just come to you."

Britney has enjoyed experience with success at all levels and she exhibits a deep understanding of what it takes to be successful - what works and what doesn't. "Each coach has taught me a variety of different skills from playing to coaching, and I have put the skills that I believe work in my coaching toolbox - which I plan to use with each group at Vail Christian."

A MEMORABLE FIRST SEASON

In Britney's first season, the Saints went undefeated in the Western Slope and were League Champions. They hosted Regionals and fell just short in a fifth set to go in the State tournament. Vail Christian finished the season with an 18-5 record. The team posted 3 First Team All-Conference honors,

3 Honorable Mention All-Conference honors, 2 All-State honors, and a 2A Western Slope Coach of the Year honor. That would be Britney!

"To say this first season was memorable is an understatement, it was the most amazing three months, and my family absolutely loved this fall at Vail Christian. We have a great group here and I love my staff and feel like we are starting to build something incredible here at VCHS. Even though we were successful this first season, we are not satisfied. My end goal is to win State. I told our athletes and parents that it will happen one day and I intend to be a part of it. But until then, we go to work and keep getting better every day. I plan on continuing to use my resources to make this the most special, meaningful, and intentional experience for my athletes, staff, school, and community. I was fortunate to experience it in our valley when I was in high school, and I plan on giving back to this community to be able to provide forever memories for these young student athletes."



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
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"Superhero Volunteer" Patrice Ringler Expands Her Role to Embrace the Essence of Roundup River Ranch

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
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
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On the Fox Glacier

About one-third of the five and a half million population of New Zealand lives in its largest city, Auckland. For scale, the next largest city, Christchurch, is one-sixth that size.

Besides the maritime vibe - it hosts the largest marina in the Southern Hemisphere - and its Māori influence, the size of its population and the feel of it is not unlike metro Denver; only 30 years or so behind. While there is much to commend it, particularly the lovely Quay, the stunning black sand Piha beach with sand as soft as flour, and the thick-as-a-dream Arataki rainforest, Auckland misses the whole point. What is impressive about New Zealand - the land of the long white cloud - what is truly awe-inspiring, is the countryside.

Other than Auckland, which is after all a city - and I suppose every country must have at least one - if there is any part of New Zealand that is not take-your-breath-away beautiful, the Kiwis had done a clever job of concealing it. From tip to tail, stem to stern, from the north of the north island to the especially stunning south, the natural beauty is one lovely eyeful after the next.

A great jumping off place for adventure is Queenstown in roughly the middle of the South Island. Hard beside the broad and beautiful Lake Wakatipu (New Zealand's largest

lake), Queenstown, with a population of about 30,000 souls, is framed by the applynamed Remarkables, a mountain range like

up-thrust dragon scales (skiable for the brave and hearty in winter) which are chameleons of rock and grit that change shape and color with the shifting light winked from the lake. Although we visited in January - the Southern Hemisphere's dead-of-summer - the Remarkables gave the foreboding impression that even an accomplished skier with Vail legs would have his hands full in taming them.

The lake is ringed with eateries, buskers, sunworshipers, and craftspersons selling hand-mades from





rough stalls, and just a few steps off the lake front, are boutiques with a heavy emphasis on

mountain wear and gear. The sunsets are spectacular. A short, steep walk from the lake is the Skyline Gondola which ports mountain bikers, view-gazers, the hungry, and would-be paragliders up a steep slope where one may dine with

an incredible forever view high above the lightning bolt shaped lake at lunch or dinner. The lunch selection and quality are excellent but pale in competition for the views.

After lunch, we waddled our overfed way to the luge track where we rode a chairlift up, mounted our wheeled steeds, and wove our way back down a winding, high-speed course to the restaurant aerie below. What better way down to terra firma far below, than to paraglide the 2,000 or so feet which most, but not all of us elected. The "us" in this instance were the usual suspects, my sons, Asch & Parke, their SOs, Natalie and Abby, and, of course, my SO/wife, Deb, who is always game for some rattling new adventure.

After some well-deserved breath-catching, back up the hill we went to the Kiwi Park wildlife sanctuary which boasts, among other exotic members, a klatch of Kiwis in a pretty good facsimile of their natural environment.

The Pancakes


The next morning, off to Fjordland National Park at the southwest tip of the South Island, the gem of which is Milford Sound which Rudyard Kipling called the eighth wonder of the world. Hillsides bewhiskered with too many thundering waterfalls to count, cloud-haloed dunce caps of sheer rock jutted from the crystal waters whose broad hips define the sound. We boarded our forty-or-so passenger ship for a sun-and-sea-and-waterfall-splashed cruise into and upon the Sound which is a slice of heaven upon which God has bestowed special favor.

The full day Queenstown-to-Milford back-and-forth confirms the adage that it is the journey, not the destination as, although the Sound outlasts adjectives to describe its beauty, the way to its wonders, through gorgeous countryside offering a thousand stunning vistas and leg-stretching stops which could have been destinations in their own right, made the trip itself a blessing.

On our next day, back in Queenstown, after eating dust on rented ATVs up the steep slopes near the Skyline, we dined along the quay, and then took a sunset cruise on the TSS Earnslaw, a vintage coal-fired steamship

(the only remaining commercial steamship in the Southern Hemisphere) that has been plying the waters of the lake for more than a century. It chugged and huffed and charmed across Lake Wakatipu to Walter Peak High Country Farm, a gracious low-slung red-roofed farm complex that offers farm tours, dining, hiking, and more arrayed before a muscular range of protective mountains.

The next morning we picked up our rented van and were off first to Kawarau Bridge in Gibbston, the bungy-jumping capital of the world. To not stop here - even if not to take the leap itself - would be akin to shunning the Eiffel Tower in Paris. The bridge, which is beautiful in its own right, spans a rocky gorge through which, draining from Lake Wakatipu, the teal waters of the Kawarau River pulse. One may elect - or not - when leaping headfirst from the bridge to end the





jump with a bracing head-to-chest dip in the river, after which one is gathered like a mayfly from a spider's silk by the rescue team into a Zodiac then carted back to shore where, on wobbly legs, one makes their way up the stair cased hillside to the jump center. Check.

Next, we were off to Roys Bay and the renown Wanaka Tree which defying physics, nature, and logic itself, sprouts from and holds majestically forth in - not near - the water. Of course, like everywhere else - especially in the South Island - the lake is ringed by mountains. In fact, if I were pressed to define the South Islands in as few words as possible, it would be "mountains and water." To include - let alone describe - every lake, bay, sound, and range - would be too wearying to include.

Around Lake Wanaka we went to Mount Aspiring Park, its river and waterfall, where, besides the natural beauty, visitors have undertaken to construct cairns of the river rocks washed up beside the shore, then on to Whakapohai Wildlife Refuge for a moderately long hike to Monro Beach where rumor hails that penguins are known to roost. While we were disappointed to see no penguins, the hike through the tropical forest was rewarded with the rocky beach which, except for sandflies, we had entirely to ourselves. One thing should be said, New Zealand has no predators at all - not even snakes - and so a hike through the primeval forests, except for the occasional swat of an insect, is a relaxing stroll.

Evening brought us to Franz Joseph/Waiau where glaciers muscle to meet the sky! After weather cancelled our planned heli-hike on the Franz Joseph Glacier, we used the time to enjoy several short hikes in and around the Westland Tai Poutini National Park, little more than an arm's reach from the small stretch of town. While beautiful on its own, the next day brough the real treat. We drove the short way to the tiny town of Fox Glacier where, after being equipped and coached, we boarded the helicopter that would take us to the foot of the glacier for our climb.

Unlike Argentina where we had glacier-hiked before, where the glacier had the consistency of a sno cone just pulled from a freezer, Fox Glacier was sheer ice. One slip, one fall, one misplacement of your crampons, and, at the least, you were destined for a bumpy slip-and-slide, that you would remember by your bruises. As the day warmed, however, the glacier became more forgiving and our crampons dug with greater surety and ease. It was a sheer and spectacular day on the ice!

The next morning, we hiked the Hokitika Gorge. Although I said above that one would exhaust oneself naming every spectacle of rock and water, Hokitika deserves special mention. A spectacular hike, across suspension bridges and stunning foliage is rewarded with clear teal water and a deep-and-wide pool crowned with rocks suitable for a quick plunge.

In Paparoa National Park, one finds the Pancake Rocks, a curious huddle of rock formations standing in the tidal zone that look more like manmade ruins than a natural phenomenon.

Bed in Westport, then in the morning off to Kaiteriteri Beach for a two-hour boat ride to Abel Tasman National Park across a broad finger of the Tasman Sea where we would sleep,

The 20-room Awaroa Lodge was lovely. The seas as we set out to kayak the next morning were rough.

The payoff, though, was when we made our way to a several-miles-long beach where we were (you guessed it) the only inhabitants. Something else that should be noted about Kiwis and their country; there is an apparent respect for the environment and little, if any litter. The broad uninhabited beach showed no signs at all of any prior human contact; it was as pristine as a fairy tale. We hauled up on the beach, found a hiking trail, and after a short hike, plunged back into the roiling waves for the beach at Awaroa, the lodge, and food!

Leaving Abel Tasman by boat back to Kaiteriteri, we were on to Nelson for the short flight across the Cook Strait to the North Island. Domestic flights in New Zealand are a throwback


to a more innocent age; no security checks and, yes, you can bring your filled water bottle on the plane!

Leaving Auckland the next morning, it was on to Waitomo to see the glow worm caves. What, if you are unfamiliar with it, exactly is a glow worm?

The odd lifecycles of the tiny creatures deserve a quick diversion. In their pupal stage, the "worms" live in the walls and ceilings of the tall-roofed caves we ventured into. Plugged into their crevices, their fluorescent light is an LED lightshow to attract prey into the hair-thin tendrils dropped down from their lairs like a fine net or curtain that extends perhaps a foot or so below where they are bored into the earth. Among those attracted to their "webs" are their parents and many of their siblings whom they happily consume. The fluorescence is a beacon attracting the unwary to a glow worm repast. After 11 months or so, the pupae mature, fly off, mate, and unable to eat (as adults, they lack a digestive system), they become their offsprings' meal and die. Notwithstanding the peculiarity of all of this, the sight of glow worms, taken in by both a hike into the caves and a rowboat sized boat ride along an underground stream is akin to the light show at a planetarium.

Rotorua—land of geysers—was our second destination.

Yes, the whole town stinks of sulfur but it is the geysers and the hot springs that one is there for. Natural hot spring spas abound throughout the Rotorua area, but what is especially worth a visit is the Tia Puia Māori Culture Center which offers an excellent buffet with geyser views, an instructive and entertaining Māori cultural presentation, and free roam of the grounds, dotted with geysers (including the largest in the Southern Hemisphere), boiling mud pots, sink holes and a fog of sulfurimpregnated steam.



It is a twelve-or-so-foot-in diameter clear ball in which a smaller clear ball - a chamber for two - is attached by a bungy-cord-looking apparatus to the outer ball. In go you, your SO, a bucket of highly chlorinated warm water and then, down you go, bouncing and sloshing down a lovely green hillside.

We were next off on an adventure to Matamata which likely means nothing to you but what is found there likely does. Matama is the home of Hobbiton, the fully maintained movie set home of the Hobbits where the Lord of the Rings movies were filmed. Not only are the grounds beautiful and wonderfully maintained but part of the tour includes a visit to a Hobbit Hole, a Hobbit dwelling which was surprisingly expansive and well-appointed, and then refreshments at the Green Dragon Inn, the pub where Hobbits bent both ears and elbows in drink.

Then, it was off to Auckland where, after visits to the rainforest, the black sand Piha beach, and walks along the lovely quay, it was time to end the dream and point our way home. Without exception, the Kiwi folks were warm and welcoming. Crime, littering, and vagrancy are all but

> unknown. In 16 days of British side driving about the islands - both north and south - we never encountered a rude or aggressive driver. Courtesy appears to be the norm.

New Zealand is an outdoorsperson's paradise. With its laid-back ethic, a thirst for adventure, and scenery that stuns at every glance, it is a special, verdant corner of our varied planet not to be missed. To me at least, New Zealand evokes a simpler time where the sun hangs long in the summer sky, where the rivers, lakes, coasts, and mountains dazzle, and where, if one closes one's eyes tight, Hobbits lurk among the sheep upon each rise and fall of the enchanted landscape.












Transformation Through Visual Experiences: Accepting Loss With Art

Margo Thomas moves from grief to calm to saying goodbye to mom

"It wasn't until October 2022, 10 months after my mom passed away, that I said goodbye. I went on a 6-day silent retreat at the Crestone Mountain Zen Center. There I lived the meaning of the Enso (Zen circle of togetherness) through daily meditation and reflection. Three Ensos came to life in the form of art: Grief, Calm, and Saying Goodbye." This is my story of transformation: from grief to calm to saying goodbye.

My mom passed away in December 2022 after a long battle with dementia. We were so busy taking care of her, and making care plans, then funeral arrangements during that time. It became factual and mechanical. Like a news story: "My mom passed away about a year ago after a long battle with dementia." Then sadly her husband passed just three months later. Again, a flurry of arrangements for the funeral, double internment, estate sale, and a celebration of life. And then my beloved mother-in-law passed just a few months after that.

In October 2022, 10 months after mom died, I was able to say goodbye. The Crestone Mountain Zen Center

was gracious enough to offer an artist residency for me: a small cabin with just enough room to set up. Crestone Mountain Zen Center is in Southern Colorado above the San Luis Valley on the western slope of Crestone Peak. Zen Practice is the craft of mind and body realized through the experience of stillness and nonduality. Our effort is to make Zen Buddhist teachings conceptually, emotionally, and practically accessible to contemporary Western practitioners. Guests are left alone to meditate, hike, and pray. They served three delicious family-style meals each day, our only chance to interact.

There I sat in my little cabin, looking out the window at a pretty boring view of the San Luis Valley. As I participated in meditation and fiddled around with my art supplies, I drew a blank. I mean, was I going to paint THIS scene? Which I did. And it turned out OK. But not inspirational.

Then, I noticed a photo on the wall of my cabin. It was of an Enso (the Zen circle of togetherness). A plan was starting to form! I thought, "certainly there has been a lot of togetherness over our shared grief!"

And the first Enso came to life: Grief. Teardrops and all.

and complex. Yet I used calming colors. To demonstrate that grief also contains hope of a peaceful tomorrow.

The morning prayer bell woke us up around 5am. We all congregated in the Zendo for morning meditation and the Buddhist ceremony, Zazen. The first time I attended was in the evening. There we were, a small group of people staying at the Zen center and the monks. Zazen took place in their beautiful Zendo building. We sat motionlessly for 40 minutes.

This is not a guided practice. Instead, it provides healing energy to go deep. Which is what I did easily. I know sitting completely motionless for such a long time may seem impossible. But in that environment, it was easy! A calm I've never known. Oh Calm!!! Yes, that shall be my next Enso!!

On the fifth day of the retreat, I visited the nearby Karmapa Stupa after a long hike. It was a beautiful day and I looked forward to sitting peacefully. There was just one other woman there. She appeared to be crying and praying

at the same time. I tried not to look. But I just had to watch her! I thought "she must be saying goodbye to a loved one."

Wait a second, I could do that too! "Mom, I love you. I miss you. Thanks for the inspiration. Sorry, so sorry, you suffered for so long. Ummmm Goodbye." No tears, just a peace and knowing.

I wondered what I could do as a tribute to her. My mom was a devout Catholic. Her lifelong advise was "Keep The Faith." I made a promise to her: return to the Catholic faith. When I came home, I joined the local parish and have begun attending church. My third and final Enso came into focus: Saying Goodbye.


