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


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



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ITALIAN ROOTS: A BIT OF FAMILY HISTORY

We need to go back to the tragic days before and during World War II, a much untold history and the journey that brought Alex's mother's family to Peru where he was born. In the 1930s, Alex's maternal grandparents, Franco and Elena Carbone, emigrated from Genoa, Italy, to Peru. Peru was viewed as a land of opportunity at that time, and the political situation in Germany and Italy did not bode well for the future. Another Italian family of the man who would eventually become Alex's uncle and Godfather, Manlio Pocari, was also living in Genoa, but elected to stay. The Nazis had unleashed a reign of terror in Italy to punish the surrendered Italian army. In the next few months, over 14,000 mostly non-Jewish civilians and disarmed Italian soldiers were murdered, many times publicly. Manlio and his family had hidden in the hills surrounding Genoa for months to avoid the Nazi wrath. It wasn't until after the Italian Army surrendered to the allies on September 8, 1943, that they also fled to the safety of Peru. It was there where Alex's mother, Franca, and her siblings were born, the Carbones met the Porcaris and his Italian family put down their roots.







OH, THE PLACES YOU'LL GO

Alex, having been born in Peru, and now at the age of four, settled with his family in Connecticut. His father took a job in New York City with Ethyl Corporation and in less than two years the family found themselves packing up again for South America. This time it would be as expatriates living in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. They remained there for four years where Alex picked up a good understanding of Portuguese and learned English at the Escola Americana. Following their expatriate stint in Brazil, Alex's family returned to the United States and landed in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. It's here where Alex learned the American way of life. The Lidback family planted big roots in Louisiana. His parents continued sharing their passion for golf with their children, his mother the club champ of every golf club they ever joined and his sister a successful collegiate and eventual LPGA player. Alex, who could usually be found on the course practicing or competing, played for the Baton Rouge Magnet School and eventually the Louisiana State University team while earning a degree in economics.

STRAWBERRIES, CRAWFISH, AND GUMBO

Susan's maternal family, the Walkers, moved to Louisiana from Iowa and started a timber business and her paternal family, the Parkers, landed in Louisiana after originally being Oklahoma Sooners. The Walker/Parker families united in marriage in Louisiana and Susan went on her first camping trip at the young age of six months. She and her brother were taken each summer on family trips to the beaches of Florida and the mountains of Tennessee. She grew up loving the outdoors and when she heard the local church bells chime five pm, she knew it was time to go home for supper. Their family established deep roots in Ponchatoula, Louisiana, the "Strawberry Capital of the World". Susan was not only Strawberry Junior Miss at age 7 but also represented her town in the Aloha Bowl and the scholastic Louisiana Junior Miss. She developed a keen palette for creating fabulous Cajun food from her relatives and is still known for her hospitality, congeniality, and event planning.

FINDING COMMON GROUND AT BULLFEATHER'S

While Alex was attending LSU, little did he know that right down the road from Baton Rouge, his future wife was living and now earning her degree in Political Science at Southeastern Louisiana University. They never did meet in Louisiana but eventually met after university, while they were both living and working in Washington, DC. Alex was in sales working for a Spanish import company, and Susan was a Trial Clerk for the US Tax Court. They met in perhaps, the most American way possible and as many twenty somethings in DC do. They were both attending dollar Rolling Rock night at Bullfeather's, a popular saloon in Old Town Alexandria, just outside Washington. They shared stories about Louisiana, figured out that they had been at the same U2 and Madonna concerts at the same time without meeting, and that they knew many of the same people. He charmed her into dancing and spoiler alert, it all went well. Their adventures together of hiking, traveling, cooking, and cycling began in Virginia but soon his career took him to Texas. Long distance dating, they decided, was for the birds, and Susan eventually made the move to Texas as well, about nine months later.

A MOUNTAIN LOVEFEST BEGINS

In 1993, Susan and Alex were married and settled in Houston, Texas. Alex was now working for an economic consulting firm specializing in issues affecting the chemical industry and Susan was an intellectual property litigation paralegal for a big Houston law firm. While they were both very dedicated hard workers in their fields, in their spare time, Alex remained an avid golfer and took up triathlon while Susan became an enthusiastic gardener. Together they joined a triathlon and cycling club and enjoyed hundreds of miles of cycling centuries and sprints across Texas. In 1997, the young Lidback family grew with the addition of their first child, Arne and Susan traded in her business suits and pumps for cargos and

tennis shoes. She found herself volunteering for everything from PTO and Sunday School to fundraising and charity work.

On a tiny budget, and the USA/Canada dollar 2/1, the first family mountain vacation was to Jasper, Canada where they hiked with Arne on dad's back. Andrew was added in 2000 and the trek to Jasper became an annual event, first with Andrew on mom's back to eventually both kids leading the way to scaling boulders, rafting the rapids, tackling the scenic trails and skipping stones on the many lakes and rivers they encountered. They eventually expanded their mountain trips to include Yosemite, California, Wyoming and Costa Rica for more hikes, bouldering and new repelling adventures.

LIFE IN LONDON

In 2007, Alex's firm transferred the family to London, England. They lived and worked there until 2009, and the kids attended TASIS England, located in Virginia Water, Surrey. While there, the family explored the mountains of Europe whenever the kids had school breaks. Zermatt was a favorite for both skiing in the winter and hiking amongst the edelweiss and cows in the summer. They left London in December 2009 when Alex's firm moved him back to Houston from whence they had come, and, Houston being Houston, mountains were few and far between.


BACK TO THE MOUNTAINS OF EUROPE

They spent the next three years in Houston until, once again, they were transferred back to the UK in 2013. Alex had changed employers, but his expertise in all things English and the global chemical industry led to them being sent back to London. Prior to agreeing to the transfer, they held a family meeting and the quick decision was unanimous that back to Europe they would go. It was during this expatriate residency that the Lidbacks really deepened their love of the mountains. The Swiss and French Alps provided picturesque miles of peaks and valleys to hike and pistes to ski. New favorite discoveries included Grindelwald and Wengen and there were repeat trips to Zermatt.

In 2018, their second European stint ended and it was back to Houston for Susan and Alex. Arne was now finishing up a Mechanical Engineering degree at Purdue University and Andrew was starting a Computer Science degree at Arizona State University. For Susan and Alex, the mountains still inexorably drew them in. In the summer of 2019, the family decided to explore more of Colorado and came to the Vail Valley. They were here for two weeks and loved every minute of it. In 2020, the pandemic struck and resulted in Alex's corporate office shutting down for the duration. That was the bad news. The good news was that all he needed to continue his job off site was a laptop and a strong internet connection. With Alex's laptop and a West Vail Airbnb bandwidth, the couple had the chance to fully embrace the mountain lifestyle. The family visited during every season and found a love for the Valley. The snow, the sunshine, the mountains, the hiking, the Aspens and the people; they fell in love with it all.

LIVING THE DREAM IN SINGLETREE

It was in 2022 when Susan and Alex finally decided to end the commuting and begin to live the dream they had harbored



for many years. They contracted a fabulous Valley real estate professional and made it happen by buying their current (and, hopefully, final) home in Singletree. Although it was their love for the mountains that finally prompted their desire to become full time residents, the move to the Valley also brought them closer to their now-grown children, Arne now living in Santa Fe and Andrew in Scottsdale.



As both a neighbor and a friend, I cannot tell you what a great addition to our community the Lidbacks are. Alex, who works at home, skis, hikes or rides in his free time and continues to travel the world as a consultant to the chemical industry. Susan, a fashion consultant for Cabi Clothing, serving a loyal list of clientele from both the UK and the USA, can be found hiking, skiing, or gardening in our valley. They enjoy skiing the slopes of Vail, Beaver Creek, and Arrowhead, and hiking on the Singletree BLM and Eagle County Trails. They even recently completed their first 14er by summiting Quandary Peak at 14,275 feet. They continue to travel near and far and just this year went to London, Hawaii, Sweden, Germany, Denmark and Norway. They also continue to entertain and invite friends, family, and neighbors for gumbo traditions and block parties.

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




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

Cabaret: The Importance of Community Musical Theatre!

Allie Decent revives her passion for theater by performing in the Vail Valley Theatre Company production of *Cabaret*

My soul is fed with spiritual food, of the theatre kind! I've always done theatre as a kid and young adult, way back in Ocean City, NJ and Philadelphia, PA. When I moved out here to Colorado, I left the theatre troupe behind and figured I'd work on the grind of living here in the mountains. On the outside, I had it all. A house, a husband, a beautiful daughter, a career, time to golf and ski, a rocking bod, the works! But something was missing, and I finally figured it out after Singletree local Lauren Bonati (and fellow soprano) kept pestering me to audition for a local theatre production and use my talents as an opera-trained soprano from the East Coast. I have to admit, besides shocking people when I sang them happy birthday and making up silly songs for my daughter in the car, I hadn't performed since 2007, so the cobwebs in my throat were as established as Congress. I ended up landing a role and performing in the Vail Valley Theatre Company's (VVTC) production of *Cabaret* at Chasing Rabbits in Vail from July 16-21st, and it saved my life!



I didn't jump into it right away, however. Even those of us with great experience in performing feel a little shy after 15 years, so VVTC offers seasonal choir and dancing classes for only \$50 for 5 sessions through partners at Colorado Mountain College. Starting in January of 2024, I struck up the courage to ask my husband if I could go sing with other theatre types, and he figured he could parent by himself at least one night a week so off I went! The rest, they say, is history.

After being praised for my vocal talent and adorable personal skills, I built up the hutzpah to audition for the summer production of Cabaret, directed by Battle Mountain High School's Art Teacher David Mayer. Now, let's do some background. I have never watched *Cabaret*, nor did I understand the marrow of the message in this elusive musical. It certainly wasn't on the 8-tracks and recorded tapes my father played of Broadways Greatest Hits throughout my childhood from the audio room. Yes, I'm that old, we had a whole area of the living room dedicated to the most current line of audio equipment. Now, my parents just have an Alexa. The reverberations, sadly, aren't the same.

It says a lot about a musical to claim that *Cabaret* came into my life and dug out the rotted innards of my Being and filled them with light. After all, I performed in *La Boheme* with Opera Philadelphia, and I never felt such raptured torture in the portrayal of the delicacies of human existence as I did with *Cabaret*. Maybe it's because I am older and wiser now, and the pain of loss and betrayal are known to me









intimately as I create a character that bears their scars as a badge of proof that they were here, that they mattered, that life is beautiful. Not only did I prove to myself that I can rise and reign under pressure, but I also learned skills within the globe of theatre uncharted throughout my repertoire.

For those that don't know, *Cabaret* is a musical that tells the story of the lives of performers and people surrounding a raunchy nightclub in Berlin during the rise of fascism in 1930. Kind of like a very depressing and definitely not romantic version of *Love Actually*, where the storyline focuses on two leads and follows a few rivulets of background characters over the course of about 6 months of their lives as everything they know and trust about the world falls to bits.

Written by Joe Masteroff in 1966, it's known as a more realistic than artistic rendition of the true world of the 1920-30s sex clubs scattered throughout the un-tethered post-war inflation-burdened fledgling nation of Germany. That's a lot of hyphenations, but I do that on purpose. The

entire production is itself a hybridic commotion of the social fluctuations and ambiguous (dare I say ambisexual) cloud that hung over the fledgling nation at the time, and as a cast member, I harbored compassion for the true historical drama that played out. It's understandable that a nation burdened by losing a war they thought they'd win, taxed with reparations by all the other nations, and falling into apparent chaos with all of Europe's "freaks and deviants" coming to live freely within the lack of governmental controls over societal norms, would eventually fall to a reactionary fascist Nazi government within that decade.

Cabaret starts with a raunchy traditional kick-line filled with Kit Kat Klub Girls & Boys strutting their stuff in bustiers and lace panties and an M.C. who bulldozes your senses and sexual appetites into complacency that you are just in the audience for an experience, for

an evening, for a thrill. You would be proven wrong by your assumptions as the musical progresses. As a cast member, hearing the hoots and jeers of the audience members while on stage when we hit the kick-line of the opening number "Willkommen" was definitely an adrenaline rush I will be pursuing until the end of my days. But those hollers were usually by audience members who, like myself in April during tryouts, knew nothing of what was coming. The ones familiar with the storyline were sanguine in their chairs, sipping their drinks, and ready for the true tale. I'd have to name all the cast members to do them each justice for the work they performed night after night, but since we are a Singletree magazine I'll stick to the performance of John Tedstrom, whose article you read earlier this year, and Charis Patterson, local Edwards acting legend and performer in The Fabulous Femmes.

John played the surprise Nazi sympathizer, Ernst Ludwig, in the VVTC production. He was absolutely remarkable, incredibly endearing, and completely



traumatizing. His character's progression from friendly nice guy on a train to Berlin and overall show villain slapped the audience across the face as gasps flickered throughout the room before the finale of the first act. Some audience members started laughing, they were so uncomfortable and terrified. I think one calls it "frightened out of their wits."

John's character has a progression and timeline that mirrors the musical almost exactly, which gives the audience a meta-cinema experience that confuses senses and sense of time and place within the production. The cast felt very similarly throughout the performances, which we attributed to the location within the very sexy and scary Chasing Rabbits in The Solaris, but upon further reflection, was likely the strength

of the main character performers like John. It was truly an honor to be in their presence.

Charis Patterson was our M.C, and she was delightfully charming, fantastically foreboding, and thunderously tragic. Originally cast as a male character, since the show's inception and freestyle storytelling allowance as only this musical can offer, the character has become sexually ambiguous. Overall silly as the mime-clown of the show, Charis took us on a ride that dazzled and dazed, demented and demurred. The audience never knew what they were going to get when she stepped on stage to introduce a number, crack a joke, or remove her cloak.

In the final scene, when the cast came out carrying our shoes to drop them on the stage in a pile, so redolent yet direct in its reference to those found outside of each crematorium when the allies stormed the concentration camps, Charis maintained composure as the pillar of the production. She stood on stage in her German slick trench coat and hat, while the cast (okay, me, I cried every night like a baby) and the audience began to sob with collective horror. Upon the final characters' entrance and position, with gravitas, she removed her costume to reveal that of a concentration camp uniform, bedraggled and

weighed with the memory of human suffering and loss. All with her face a dripping mask of mime-like clown grotesque proportions.


Needless to say, we had standing ovations every night of the 6-night production. We also had people leave at intermission because they came for legs and saw Nazi uniforms and death in the future. Not everyone wants to be reminded of their own humanity, their own complicit acceptance of modern-day social warfare. The director and production manager were approached by attendees of Cabaret from the London production earlier this summer, and the tearful couple told them that our version and our production and our cast was better than in London. Our valley is abundant with talent, and yes, we have day jobs, and yes, you should come see our next production or try out for the next round. Trust me, it's worth it.

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Indoor Pickleball - NOW Please!

Enthusiastic players in the Vail Valley seek to bring the game inside for year-round fun, fitness, and community with a dedicated pickleball facility

The days are getting shorter, the temperatures are beginning to dip. What is the number one topic heard on the pickleball courts of EagleVail, Golden Peak, Arrowhead, Avon. Beaver Creek, Cordillera, and of course, Singletree? The answer: "When are we EVER going to have a great indoor place to play pickleball?" It's impossible to keep up with recreation in the Valley and not be aware that pickleball is a rapidly growing sport with

inclusiveness for those of all ages and abilities.

The Challenge: The Lack of Indoor Pickleball Facilities

Indoor Pickleball Facilities
Today, there are perhaps
thousands of people from
Vail to Gypsum who play
anywhere from a few times
a month to a few times a
day. There are nearly 50
outdoor courts spread
throughout the valley which
are used from the first rays
of sun in the spring to the
first snow of the winter.
But when the snow falls,

and the temperatures are below freezing, where do the pickleball players go?

There are a few indoor courts at elementary schools in Vail and Avon available for limited times on temporary courts and on surfaces that are not ideal for pickleball. There are 3 courts at the Edwards Field House - maybe three of the worst indoor courts in the country, and 3 courts available in the morning at Mountain Rec in Gypsum. And that's about it.

The Need: Reaping the Benefits of Pickleball Does it matter that

pickleball in the Vail Valley essentially goes away in the winter? Yes, it does. There are numerous medical and mental health studies that show that the exercise and camaraderie and just plain fun that pickleball brings to communities is not something to be dismissed. The sole "blue zone" (groups of people that live very long happy lives) in the US is in Loma Linda, CA; there,

pickleball has been integrated into their community for decades. Many school systems in California have taught their kids pickleball starting at very young ages since the 90s. It's easy to learn (even for very little kids), it's cheap (the nets, paddles, and balls are a drop in the bucket compared to most other sports), and it doesn't take up much space (you can fit 3 - 4 courts on a full size basketball court and these courts can be set up and taken down in minutes).

If you're unfamiliar with the fun of pickleball, stop by any of the courts in the valley when there is 'open play' - that is everyone plays with everyone generally without regard to ability or age. People are laughing, trash talking, and not caring one little bit about the score. And yet in the winter, here in the Vail Valley, the fun stops, the ball stops bouncing, and people stop moving. Yes. Here it is all about outdoor

activities in the winter, but there are many who want to continue to play pickleball year-round.

So, why don't we have indoor pickleball in the valley? There are 55,000 plus residents with more moving here all the time. That is split between Eagle/Gypsum with about 15,000 down valley and the rest between Edwards and Vail. Clearly this number swells considerably in the winter.

The Model: Indoor Pickleball in Steamboat Springs

The community model for all to emulate (and envy) is Steamboat Springs. They have just completed the Steamboat Tennis and Pickleball facility. This non-profit facility has a brand new building housing 12 state of the art pickleball courts, 8 cushioned outdoor pickleball courts, 6 outdoor, and 4 indoor tennis courts. It was funded by donations

I began playing pickle ball in Florida when, at the age of 75, arthritis in my hips and shoulder prevented me from playing tennis. Kim had wanted me to try pickleball and initially I poo-pooed the idea but went to Walmart and got a paddle and tried it and instantly became addicted. Ten years later, with the help of two new hips and a new shoulder, I play four or five times a week. For an octogenarian like myself, it has been transformational on many levels: physical, mental, emotional, and particularly social. It may even help to prevent Alzheimer's. Indoor facilities would be great and might prevent me from migrating to Florida in the winter. It would certainly benefit the local community whose pickleball numbers continue to grow exponentially!

Connie & I were introduced to pickleball in the summer of 2013 when we went to the public tennis court across the street from Golden Peak in Vail. When we got there, the west court was occupied by people waiting to get on to the east court that had been converted into 2 weird courts where people were playing a game we were told is called "pickleball". When we asked the people to get off the west court so we could play tennis, we were introduced to Joe Rink, one of the founders of PB in Vail Valley, who convinced us to try "pickleball" instead of playing tennis, and from that day on, we became PB addicts and never played tennis again!

We play a couple of times a week from spring through the fall at the Avon and Eagle-Vail courts. We don't play much in the winter season because there is no good quality facility available in Vail Valley.

While the physical benefits are obvious, the mental challenge of staying focused during a game is very difficult, but very rewarding when successfully accomplished.
The unexpected benefit of pickleball was the social aspect that PB offers in terms of meeting so many new people who have become some of our closest friends. Additionally, even during a competitive game, there is always room for good natured jesting and comments with each other that are unique to PB!

We would strongly welcome an indoor pickleball facility in Vail Valley so that we could continue to enjoy the fun of PB during the winter season, as well as the rest of the year!

Since PB has been the fastest growing sport in the world in recent years, it would be wonderful to have an indoor PB facility in Vail Valley to meet the playing needs of locals in our community, throughout the year, so they could experience the benefits of PB that we have!

from the community. A private, anonymous donor gave \$1,000,000, another gave \$350,000, and a third provided a match up to \$1,000,000. The rest of the \$11 million program came from community donations - large and small. Because it is a non-profit operation, the costs to play are low and there are 'scholarships' available for low-income players. There are programs for the lower and upper schools as well as programs for mothers with ways to watch their kids. It's an incredible asset for Steamboat.

The Solution: Potential Options in the Vail Valley


As it stands now, there are several locations that could be suitable for indoor pickleball in the Singletree/Avon area. The unoccupied space next to Sun and Ski in Avon, the old Office Max, has been empty for over a decade! 3rd Shot Pickleball, a commercial pickleball company with two beautiful locations in Denver came very close to opening a facility here - a centrally located easy-to-convert facility with space for 7 courts. In fact, 3rd Shot had a lease signed but backed out on the last day of their due diligence. Those of us involved in helping 3rd Shot make this work suspect it was purely a financial decision. They had a profit motive, high rent, and a basket of unknowns. So, the space sits empty.

Other possibilities that are under consideration include (1) renovating and expanding the Edwards Field House, (2) building a facility on available land in EagleVail, and/or (3) hoping a commercial venture decides that the Valley is economically feasible for pickleball and builds one on the land north of



Walmart. Any of these options will take years to develop and build. It is only recently that the currently available indoor courts have become inadequate for the demand. And it's only recently that the community has started to raise issue the issue with local governments and local commercial property owners. There's a long way to go.

To make a non-profit, community sponsored facility a reality, it will take a LOT of people, and a LOT of work, and a LOT of money. If you're willing, interested, and want to get involved, please contact Mike Kieler at mkieler80401@gmail.com.

Day 2: Taking in the Wailea Farmer's Market and Honeymoon Beach


While still on mountain time we made the most of our morning by grabbing cinnamon rolls from Maui's renowned





Day 5: Fresh and Fabulous Food



Like Father, Like Son: A Tale of Two Aces

What Are the Chances of Ever Hitting a Hole-in-One?

The odds of hitting a hole-in-one are slim—about 1 in 12,500 for an average golfer per National Golf Registry. This means that for every 12,500 times a golfer tees off on a par 3, it's expected that there would be at least one hole-in-one. For golf professionals, the odds improve to 1 in 2,500, slightly better, but still very much a rare occurrence.

Many golfers never achieve a hole-in-one during their lifetime. But for Mark Lathrop and his son, Parker, lightning struck twice within just three weeks.

Mark's Stunning Shot

On July 20, 2024, while playing Hole 14 at the Sonnenalp Golf Course with his daughter Emma and son-in-law Christian Cambier, Mark took aim at the pin, which was tucked away at the back of the green. As his ball soared through the air, Mark watched hopefully but had no clear view of where it was rolling, although it seemed to be going directly towards the pin.



After he had hit the ball, Christian said that the shot was "really good." Mark made a light-hearted remark, "Yeah, it'll probably go in the hole," to which his son-in-law replied, "No, seriously, I think it actually did go in!" Hopeful but uncertain of the outcome, they drove up to the green.

As they approached the green, two men came running out of a nearby home, shouting, "It went in! It went in!" Mark, still in disbelief, walked over to the hole and was shocked to find his Titleist 1 nestled at the bottom of the cup. He was truly stunned! This was his second career hole-in-one, but his first at Sonnenalp after nearly 30 years of playing the course.

A Sign of Things to Come on Hole 2

Just two weeks later, on August 4, 2024, Mark nearly made another hole-in-one on the Sonnenalp Golf Course, this time on Hole 2. With the pin being located in the front right part of the green, Mark hit his tee shot, which struck the pin in the air, and almost dunked the ball in the cup for another hole-in-one. Parker was convinced that his father was going to get his third hole-in-one before he himself achieved his first one.

Parker's Ace

On August 10, 2024, at 7:10 AM, Mark and Parker teed off for another round. Parker's start was rough, with a double bogey on the first hole, but he remained optimistic as he approached the second tee.

As the ball left his 8-iron, it was clear to him that the ball was on a perfect trajectory and tracking directly towards the pin. The ball landed on the front right part of the green, rolled steadily toward the hole, and disappeared into the cup. Parker yelled, "It went in!" and Mark, in disbelief, asked, "Did it really go in?" "Yes, it did!" Parker confirmed.

Celebrations ensued and Parker woke up Singletree residents with celebratory hoots and hollers at 7:25 in the morning. James Thomason, a resident nearby, had heard the ruckus and was convinced that someone was hit by a car. Parker would not comment on the matter, as he could neither confirm or deny his actions immediately following his Ace.

Reflecting on the moment, Parker said, "While the athletic achievement is meaningful and still very surreal, it was awesome to be able to make a hole-in-one with my dad. He was the one who taught me how to golf and we have shared a lot of time on the golf course. It was a far more emotional event than I would have expected. Of course, you're pumped up because you did what all golfers dream of, but for me, it was a very nostalgic reminder of all of the great memories I've had on the golf course."

This summer has been unforgettable for the Lathrop's. While their streak of luck on the golf course may have run out, the memories will last a lifetime. Who will be the next family to follow in their footsteps?
